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





ABOUT THE YARN

Wool Couture Cheeky Chunky is a 100% merino wool yarn available in 26 different colours and ranging from pastels to brights. This super-chunky yarn is quick to knit up, making it perfect for bigger projects like jumpers. Care for this yarn by hand washing and laying flat to dry. One 100g (65m) ball costs £8.99 from woolcouturecompany.com

NEED AN ALTERNATIVE?

Any super-chunky yarn would work well for this project. Check your local yarn store for other suitable yarns.

Red Star Christmas SWEATER

BE YOUR OWN SHINING STAR WITH

You'll be putting yourself at the top of the tree this year, with this thick and luxurious star sweater! The fun and tactile shape emblazoned on the front is made from little bobbles, created by working into the same stitch so that a little protruding pocket forms. You'll also be making use of reverse stocking stitch for the majority of the garment, which is the same as stocking stitch, except your right side is your purl side, giving some added depth to your garment

Handwashing is the best way to keep your knitted garments looking great for as long as possible. Always read the yarn label for product-specific directions for caring for your makes, but in general, you should fill a tub or sink with lukewarm water and add about a teaspoon of detergent. Submerge the garment and gently swish it through the sudsy water until it's clean. Avoid scrubbing or twisting the fabric. Then, drain the tub or sink, refill it with cool water and push the garment up and down until all the soap is gone, refilling with fresh water if necessary. Then, gently squeeze the excess water out of the garment and lay it flat on a


towel to dry.







Perfecting POSITIONING

Take care when making up this project as the overall look is very much dependent on this step. First fix everything in place temporarily using pins. Don't be afraid to rearrange several times until you're completely happy. A glue gun is a super easy way to secure them permanently, but if you don't have one, PVA will do the trick. Just be sure to leave the wreath flat until the glue is completely dry before hanging it up to make sure nothing slips down. Finally, you may end up with a few stringy bits of glue visible, especially if you used a gun. These are easy enough to remove (simply snip them with some scissors!) but can make a big difference to the final look.

TAIL

Using 4mm needles and yarn G, cast on six sts Rows 1-8: k to end Cast off

Short-row shaping is great for adding subtle curves and can be almost invisible

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

Faux Fur YARNS

Working with novelty yarns like the one used for the beard in this pattern can be tricky, as it's difficult to see your stitches and the yarn doesn't move as smoothly as regular yarns. Practise feeling for your stitches now that they are almost invisible and use too easy to pierce through the core of a faux fur yarn and split it without realising!



We've taken this joyous leafy plant to our hearts at this time of year, but this beautiful cushion cover will always brighten up your favourite easy chair. To make things easy, we've called the red leaves 'petals' here to form a 'flower'. The parts are made separately and assembled before being attached to the dot-textured cushion cover that slips easily over a cushion pad. Bright piping frames the entire ensemble and is added last to ensure a perfect fit. As an added bonus, there's no watering to worry about!

MAKE BOBBLE (MB)

facing. Sew together along lower diagonal edge. Place face-down and position Small Petals over gaps. Secure along lower diagonal edges using yarn B. Place two Leaves face-down in six o'clock position by aligning central spines. Arrange remaining Leaves in pairs, aligning with corresponding petals. Sew Leaves together. Attach to Petals with a single stitch through centre of Petal in matching yarn. Attach flower centrally to Base. Place Centre over aperture, and secure to Base through flower, gently shape bobbles if necessary. Sew Centre to aperture edge. Set Poinsettia aside. To make up Cushion Cover, fold along edge of garter sections with wrong sides together, overlapping rib sections. Seam sides using mattress stitch.

Before adding piping, insert cushion pad, as stretch may be unpredictable. Pin piping while still on holder, starting at a bottom corner, taking the same stitch in the column each time to prevent a twist. Begin to sew Piping to Cover. When sewing is near completion and Piping fits well, check length. Place i-cord on a double-pointed needle if necessary to add or remove rows, allowing 2cm for making up, then cast off i-cord with sl 2, k1, p2sso, and overlap ends around corner. Secure and trim. Attach Poinsettia to centre of Cover Front and secure top Leaf with a stitch through its centre LK





This is a way of knitting three layers of an equal number of stitches together to make a pleat. To do this, the relevant stitches are distributed over three needles: the main left needle and two double-pointed needles, while the right needle is held as usual. The three needles are held parallel in the left hand in a folded Z shape to create a pleat in to the left, or a backwards Z for one to be made to the right. With the first stitch on each left needle aligned, insert the right needle from front to back through each one and work a k3tog as usual. Repeat until the double-pointed needles are empty, then continue with the pattern.

Spots and Eyes onto dress. Place one set of shoulder sts onto separate needles and with WS facing join shoulders using three-needle cast-off method. Repeat for other shoulder. Sew side seams from cast-on edge to start of garter stitch bodice panel. Block **LK**

Change to 6mm circular needles and work as folls: Rnd 1: * k4, k1tbl, C4B, p1, yon, k3, ssk, k4, p1, rep from * to end



This needle is used to 'park' stitches, so while it can be the same size or a little smaller than the project needle size, but it should not be bigger. If it is, this can stretch the stitches and distort the pattern.



We hope by now you are now raring to get going on these soft and cosy contrast mitts, designed by Penny Hill to coordinate with your gorgeous scarf and hat. They are knitted flat in stocking stitch, beginning and ending with a short rib section, then sewn up into a tube. This project focuses first on shaping by increasing stitches, then creating the thumb opening by casting stitches off and on again. This will grow your skills repertoire nicely in small easy steps, so you'll be all set for the grand finale jumper, coming in the next issue!

LEARNALONG LIST

Tick off these skills with this project!

□ Increase the number of stitches after casting on by making an extra stitch (m1)

Casting off in the middle of a rowCasting on in the middle of a row

PATTERN SAVVY

Increasing the width of your piece is done by making new stitches, which can be done in several ways. One or more increase stitches may be added along a row, often at set points, to produce the necessary shaping. For a gradual effect, increase stitches are worked on several rows. In these mittens the stitch used is called a 'make one'.

m1 stands for make one stitch, so with each m1 on the row your stitch count will go up by one.

Bear in mind that there may also be decreases on the same row that will also affect the stitch count.

Start knitting here

LEFT MITT

Using 6mm needles and yarn B, cast on 26 (30) sts

□ Rib row: * k1, p1, rep from * to end This row forms rib

 \square Rep Rib row five times more

 $\hfill\square$ Beg with a k (RS) row, work four (six) rows in st st

Thumb shaping

□ Row 1: k11 (13), m1, k2, m1, k13 (15). 28 (32) sts

MAKE ONE (M1)



Insert the left needle into the horizontal bar of yarn lying between the stitch just knitted and the next stitch to be knitted. Hook and lift it with the needle tip in a backwards direction (away from you) again before working a knit stitch.



Push the right needle into the back part of the loop that now lies over the left needle and knit this stitch. You will now have an additional stitch on the right needle.

 $\hfill\square$ Next row (RS): k11 (13), cast off next eight sts, k to end. 13 (15) sts after the thumb gap

□ Next row (WS): p13 (15), turn work so RS is facing, using RH needle cast on four sts onto LH needle for top of thumb opening, turn work back so WS is facing, p to end. 28 (32) sts

Casting on and off mid-row

When casting off mid-row remember that you need to knit two stitches before you cast one off, to keep the stitch count at the beginning of your row correct. When casting on mid-row be sure to use the two-needle method as shown in part one.

 $\hfill\square$ Beg with a k (RS) row, work six rows in st st

Change to yarn A, cut yarn B, leaving a long tail to sew side seam

- \Box Next row: k to end
- \Box Rib row: * k1, p1, rep from * to end
- \square Rep Rib row four times more
- \Box Cast off in rib

RIGHT MITT

Using 6mm needles and yarn A, cast on 26 (30) sts

- $\hfill\square$ Rib row: * k1, p1 rep from * to end
- \square Rep rib row five times more

 $\hfill\square$ Beg with a k (RS) row, work four (six) rows in st st

Thumb shaping

□ Row 1: k13 (15), m1, k2, m1, k11 (13). 28 (32) sts

 $\hfill\square$ Rows 2-4: beg with a p row, work three rows in st st

□ Row 5: k13 (15), m1, k4, m1, k11 (13). 30 (34) sts



 $\hfill\square$ Rows 6-8: beg with a p row, work three rows in st st

□ Row 9: k13 (15), m1, k6, m1, k11 (13). 32 (36) sts

 $\hfill\square$ Beg with a p row, work seven rows in st st ending after a p (WS) row

Thumb opening

Next row: k13 (15), cast off eight sts, k to end. 11 (13) sts after the thumb gap
 Next row: p11 (13), turn work so RS is facing, using RH needle cast on four sts onto LH needle for top of thumb opening, turn work back so WS is facing, p to end. 28 (32) sts
 Beg with a k (RS) row, work six rows in st st

Change to yarn B, cutting yarn A and leaving a long tail to sew side seam

- Next row: k to end
- □ Rib row: * k1, p1 rep from * to end
- \Box Rep rib row four times more
- \Box Cast off in rib

TO MAKE UP

Lay mitten flat with WS facing up. Fold long edges in to centre so right sides align. Thread a tapestry needle using the main colour tail end and, matching stitches of row ends, join side seam with mattress stitch. Fasten off and weave in all ends, then trim any straggling threads **LK**



I'd like to add a zip into a buttonless cardi; what should I look out for? Three-needle cast off

This is an easy way of casting off two edges together and can be more secure than sewing. It is a neat way to join the front and back shoulder seams of a jumper, or attach straps, and as the name suggests you'll need a third project needle for this technique.



Place each set of stitches to be cast off onto a needle. Hold these needles parallel with the right sides together in your left hand. If you're casting off using the yarn tail, the yarn should be coming from the back needle.



3 Insert your right-hand needle into the next stitch on the front needle and through into the next stitch on the back needle (as in step 2) and knit these two stitches together. You will now have two stitches on your right-hand needle.

Top Tip



2 Holding a third needle in your right hand, insert this needle into the first stitch on the front needle and through into the first stitch on the back needle, then knit these two stitches together and slip them off the needles at the same time.



4 Insert one of your left-hand needles into the first worked stitch on the right-hand needle, lift this stitch up and pass it over the other stitch and off the needle. One stitch has been cast off. Repeat these last two steps until all stitches have been cast off.

If you hold the stitches to be cast off with the wrong sides together, you will get a ridge on the right side of your work, which can be used as a decorative feature if you like the effect of exposed seams.

Putting a zip in a cardigan can be a little tricky as a hand-knit has a stretch to it and a zip doesn't; you need to make sure you prepare carefully, so that the zip doesn't ruffle or the knitted fabric stretch too much. First of all, make sure your garment is blocked. If you haven't sewn the fronts to the body, it might be easier to sew the zip in before you assemble the whole garment.

Starting at the bottom with the zip closed and keeping your work as flat as possible, pin one front side of the zip to the wrong side of the garment so that the knitted edge just meets the middle of the zip. If the edge overlaps too far, it won't lay neatly against the other side and the knitted fabric might get stuck in the zip. Repeat with the other side making sure you match any patterns if your garment has cables, colourwork or lace effects. Check the zip is lying as you would like it.

Now you will need to baste (tack) each side of the zip to the garment. This doesn't have to be particularly neat; it just needs to hold the zip in place securely. Try the garment on to make sure the zip is still lying correctly before you sew it securely in place. Some people like to sew a zip in by hand using backstitch, but you can also use a sewing machine. If your zip is longer than the opening, bend the excess over at an angle, trim and baste into place.

When repeating Rows next stitch. Knit up the last two stitches of same colour, then it's time to slip the first one of these." LK DESIGNER, Jo Allport



Believe it or not, you only have to join one edge to finish each side of Jo Allport's spiral cushion, as after the first segment, each one is worked along the edge of the previous one, just in the opposite direction. This graceful effect is especially striking in two colours, and being worked in garter stitch means you can focus on this useful shaping skill!





For quick colour changes in only two yarns, weave the yarn not in use loosely up the side again for the next stripe. When changing yarns, always bring the new shade up the needle in the same way, and when making up be sure to catch actual stitches rather than carried yarn, otherwise the seam will have gaps in it.

LEARN WITH US

To show the full effect of this technique, the images below are worked on the last segment of one side of the cushion. The initial 35 stitches have been cast on and, for the first segment only, the set-up row has been completed. We begin with Row 1 of the pattern and the steps are the same for each segment.



SLIP ONE WYIB

With yarn B on Row 1, knit to the last two stitches (in yarn A). Still with the yarn at the back, slip the next stitch purlwise onto the right needle. Bring the yarn forward – this will wrap around the stitch – and turn your work, leaving two stitches unworked.



KNIT ONE STITCH LESS Change to yarn A for Row 2 and knit to the last three stitches, one stitch less than the previous set. Slip the next stitch, bring the yarn to the front and turn as in Step 1, and knit the slipped stitch and the rest of the row.



"Rewind your hanks into balls before starting, as yarn does not knit at all smoothly from this type of winding."

Continue to increase the number of unworked stitches by one stitch every double row, changing shades every double row. All the rows have been completed and you can see that every stitch has the opposite shade next to it. Knit the next row in yarn A.



KNIT TO THE END

The yarn A stitch is now the first stitch on the left needle, and the yarn B strand goes across the front of this stitch and between the needle tips, ready to knit this yarn A stitch. Do not pull the yarn tightly. Knit to the end to complete Row 1.



SPLIT LAST MATCHING PAIR Change to yarn B for Row 3 and work to the last four stitches. The shades alternate on the short rows. At the last two in the same yarn (opposite to working yarn) slip the first one purlwise, bring yarn to the front, turn and knit the row.



KNIT INTO STITCH BELOW To finish the segment using yarn A, knit the first stitch. Next insert the right needle tip knitwise through the next stitch on the left needle and then into the stitch in the row below and knit as one. Repeat this across the row to the last stitch, and knit this last (unwrapped) stitch. Knit one more row.



Create a slipknot on your left-hand needle, pulling it taut (but not too tight). Carefully insert the rightneedle into the knot from front to back, passing under the left-hand needle. Wrap the ball end of yarn anticlockwise around the point of the right needle.



2 Pull the loop that forms back through the original stitch (knot) and insert the tip of the left-hand needle into the new stitch from underneath to transfer it from the right-hand to the left-hand needle. There should now be two stitches on the left needle.



C Repeat Steps 1 and 2, knitting into the top stitch on the left needle and returning the new stitches from the right to the left needle, until you have the required number of stitches.



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PRACTICAL GUIDES

Knit stitch



Once cast on, insert the tip of the right needle upwards and from front to back into the top stitch on the left needle. The righthand needle should sit behind the left-hand one. Wrap the ball end of yarn anticlockwise around the tip of the right-hand needle.




With the ball end of the yarn at the front (toward you) insert the tip of the righthand needle into the front loop of the first stitch from right to left, with the right-hand needle in front of the left-hand needle. Wrap the yarn anticlockwise around the needle.





2 Using the right-hand needle, pull a loop of the wrapped yarn through the Draw the needle backwards and ∠upwards, forming a new stitch on original stitch to create a new one on the the right-hand needle. Now let the loop right-hand needle. Slide the original stitch from the left needle slide off the end. off the left-hand needle. Repeat from Step 1. Repeat Steps 1 and 2.

How to take measurements



You are now knitting!

Our handy diagram shows you where to take some key measurements. If possible, get someone else to help you. Hold the tape measure level and comfortably snug, but avoid pulling tight.

BUST – measure around the fullest part of the bust

HIGH BUST - measure directly under the arms and above the bust. This is useful for particularly fitted designs

WAIST - tie a length of narrow elastic around the waist and let it settle naturally at your waistline, then measure over the elastic

HIP - measure around the fullest part of the hips

BACK OF NECK TO HIP - this is a common garment length, but designs can be longer or shorter depending on your preference

Tension

Most projects, especially garments, include a tension square like this one. 22 sts x 28 rows 10cm x 10cm **Stocking stitch** 4mm needles

Before starting a project you should knit a sample square to check your tension is correct. Using the same yarn and needles as in your pattern, cast on the number of stitches given in the tension square plus five more, and work in the specified stitch for the same number of rows plus five more. In the example on the left, you would cast on 27 stitches and work 33 rows in stocking stitch. Block the square as you would your finished project.

Use pins and a ruler to mark out a 10cm square area in the centre. Carefully count the number of stitches and rows over 10cm (for stocking stitch this is easy as each stitch is a clearly defined v-shape). If your stitch and row counts match the tension square then the size of your finished item should be correct. Too many stitches and rows mean your knitting is too tight, so try a larger needle. If it's too loose, with fewer stitches and rows, try going down a needle size.

Swapping in a different yarn? Here are some points to remember. Choose one with a similar tension to the specified yarn. Match the tension given on the ball band of the yarns, as the pattern may use a different stitch.

Consider the fibre content and how this might affect the finished project. For example, cotton yarn

will knit up very differently to wool. Don't forget to check the care instructions of your new yarn. Not all yarns are machine washable. Look at the meterage of the new yarn, rather than the weight of the ball. Not all 50g balls have the same meterage and you don't want to run short when nearing the end of your project.

TOP FINISHING tips OUR EXPERT GUIDE TO PERFECT FINISHED ITEMS

Weave in ends on the wrong side of the work, along seams if possible. Instead of tying any knots it's preferable to secure the yarn by splitting a stitch and pulling the yarn through it
Steam, press or wet block all individual pieces (see right) and leave them to dry thoroughly before sewing up.

Back stitch

Using the correct technique for sewing together your pieces will result in a much more professional finish.
See below for our step-by-step guide.
Take care to follow the correct washing instructions for your fibre – you should find these on the ball band.

BLOCKING

This is the process of stretching and shaping your finished items to create the correct dimensions and even out your stitches. There are a few different ways to achieve this:

Wet blocking: dampen the pieces, gently squeeze out excess water, pin to correct measurements, leave to dry. Steaming: lay a damp cloth over your work and gently iron over the top. Do not iron directly on to your knitting. Continue until the cloth is dry. Alternatively, gently hover over your work with the iron and apply steam until the knitting relaxes. Pin to the desired measurements and allow to set.


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Pin the pieces to be joined, with the right sides together. Thread the loose end of yarn onto a tapestry needle. Start by stitching the two outer edges together, then bring the needle through the two pieces 1cm from back to front ahead of the previous stitch.


2 Push the needle back through at the position where the yarn emerged from the previous stitch. Return it to the front of the work, approx 1cm ahead of the stitch just made. Repeat this until the whole join is complete, working in a straight line.

Joining cast-off edges




Lay the two pieces to be joined right side up and with the cast off edges touching. Thread a tapestry needle with the loose yarn and push this through the centre of the first stitch, and then in and out through the centres of two stitches on the opposite side.

Beginning a seam



1 With the pieces placed next to each other with right side upwards, thread the yarn tail through the fabric after the first stitch, moving the needle from front to back. Then, take the needle behind the first stitch on the second piece from the back of the work to the front. The yarn will form a figure 8. Tug gently to secure.



2 Take the needle over to the first side and insert where it previously exited, bringing it out through the centre of the next stitch. Repeat this process alternating sides and stitching single stitches until the pieces are joined.

Mattress stitch



1 With the two pieces to be joined lying next to each other, hook the horizontal bar of the first stitch with the tapestry needle. Move to the other piece and hook the first horizontal bar of the stitch on that side. 2 Repeat this moving from one piece to the next and pulling the yarn to tighten the join.

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Kitchener stitch

This is a brilliant technique for grafting toe stitches together on socks. It is worked as follows:

SET UP: Before starting you need to prepare the stitches on the needle. Hold the two needles with the remaining stitches parallel. The loose end of yarn should be coming from the back needle and lying to the right of the work.



1 Thread varn end onto a tapestry needle and insert it purlwise into the first stitch on the needle closest to you. Pull the yarn through but leave the stitch on the needle.



2 Insert the tapestry needle knitwise into the first stitch on the back needle and pull the yarn through, leaving the stitch on the needle.



Having set up as shown in Steps С ○ 1 and 2, repeat Steps 3 and 4 until all stitches have been grafted. Insert the tapestry needle knitwise into the first stitch on the front needle and slide the stitch off. Before you pull the yarn through this stitch insert the tapestry needle into the next stitch on the front needle purlwise and pull the yarn through, this time leaving the stitch on the needle.



Insert the tapestry needle 4 Insert the tapestry needs of purlwise into the first stitch on the back needle and slide it off. Before pulling the yarn through this stitch, insert the tapestry needle into the next stitch on the back needle knitwise and pull the yarn through, leaving the stitch on the needle.

I'm Stephanie, and I am a crochet and knit designer and blogger based in Alberta, Canada! I first learned how to knit and crochet when I was ten years old, and back then I learned from books. I always loved doing crafts as a child and I dabbled in jewellery-making, scrapbooking, macramé and embossing. I was so excited to learn how to knit and crochet and I used to make my own stuffed animals and clothing for my dolls. These crafts are a wonderful creative outlet for me as I love expressing myself through my designs!



Amigurumi is the Japanese art of knitted or crocheted stuffed animals! As a ten-year-old, I crocheted a pig, bunny and cat for my sister and I to play with and rediscovered amigurumi as an adult after I got married. This love of amigurumi inspired me to start my blog 'All About Ami' in January 2011 and after several months of blogging, we released our first original amigurumi design, the 'Chinese New Year Doll'. It is so special bringing stuffed animals to life with yarn, like classic teddy bears and zodiac animals!



My husband Ryan and I have always loved crafting together - we had many DIY elements in our wedding! Now we work together on our designs and blog. Ryan helps do the initial sketches of our amigurumi and does a lot of the seaming (my least favourite part), as well as the beautiful photography so we can showcase our designs to readers around the world! Our daughters enjoy getting involved as well; our eldest has many knit and crochet projects under her belt already! Our younger daughter is also very creative and enjoys jewellery-making and art.



Once I've determined which yarn I want to use for a knit design, I begin swatching with various needle sizes and trying out different stitches. I meticulously write down all my notes as it's so easy to forget details. I am inspired to create garments that I personally want to wear, and I love relaxed and oversized cardigans as they have such a stylish look. I would say my favourite knit designs are my Uptown, Midtown and Downtown Cardigan (above) series. I personally find crocheting easier than knitting since you only hold one tool and it's easier to frog your work and fix mistakes. For knitters looking to try their hand at crochet, I would recommend starting off with a headband or scarf (some easy ones on my blog include the Knotted Headband and Long Double Crochet Cowl). I also have a blog post entitled 'Amigurumi for Beginners' for those who are interested in crocheting stuffed animals. I list some useful techniques such as the magic circle, invisible decrease and how there is technically a right side of amigurumi!
