





Special stitches

Make 1 (M1): Insert hook in the front horizontal loop before next st, yrh, pul Short RP: *Yrh, draw through 2 loops; rep from * to last st

Tunisian Edge Stitch (tes): Insert hook into last st from front to back so there are 2 strands of yarn to the left of hook and one to the right, yrh, pul Tunisian simple stitch 2 together (tss2tog): Insert hook under front vertical bars of the next 2 sts at the same time, yrh, pul

Plumaria CAPFLET

A sublime accessory for all occasions, the Tunisian crochet fabric drapes gently over the back and shoulders for a light but warm capelet

DK 6mm Tunisian

★★ Intermediate

Yarn used

Katia Concept Cotton-Merino Fine 16 balls in light purple 86 Visit www.katia.com/uk to find your local stockist

About the yarn

DK; 75m per 25g ball; 70% cotton, 30% superwash Merino wool

Tension

14 sts x 14 rows = 10cm measured over tss

Hook used

6mm Tunisian hook, at least 30cm long

Other supplies

1 matching button, 2-3cm (optional) 8 stitch markers

Sizing

70cm neckline 250cm along the outer edge

Use stitch markers to mark the end of each short row so the first st is easy to find later. When working Tss in the evelets, insert the hook through the eyelet and draw up a loop.

All loops are considered stitches for the row stitch counts.

Read chart from right to left for FP and left to right for RP, note that the first st, the loop that remains on the hook is not shown on the chart.

Start crocheting...

Chain 74.

Row 1 FP: Starting in first ch from hook, pul in back bump of each ch. 75 loops on hook

Row 1 RP and all RP unless stated otherwise: Standard RP.

Row 3: 2 ch, pul in back bump of each ch, 73 tss, 1 tes. 77 loops on hook

Row 4 FP: 3 tss. [M1, 1 tss] twice, [1 vrh. 1 tss2tog, 2 tss] 16 times, 1 tss, leave rem sts unworked. 73 loops on hook

Row 4 RP: Short RP.

Row 2: 73 tps. 1 tes.

Row 5 FP: 1 tss, M1, 3 tss, [1 yrh, 1 tss2tog, 2 tss] 15 times, 2 tss, leave rem sts unworked. 68 loops on hook Row 5 RP: Short RP.

Row 6 FP: 1 tss, M1, 5 tss, [1 yrh, 1 tss2tog, 2 tss] 12 times, 7 tss, leave rem sts unworked. 63 loops on hook Row 6 RP: Short RP.

Row 7 FP: 2 tss, [M1, 1 tss] twice, 4 tss, [1 yrh, 1 tss2tog, 2 tss] 11 times, 4 tss, leave rem sts unworked. 59 loops on hook

Row 7 RP: Short RP.

Row 8 FP: 2 tss, M1, 9 tss, [1 yrh, 1 tss2tog, 2 tss] 10 times, 1 tss, leave rem sts unworked. 54 loops on hook

Row 8 RP: Short RP.

Row 9 FP: 2 tss. M1. 5 tss. 1 vrh. miss 1 st. 5 tss. [1 vrh. 1 tss2tog, 2 tss] 7 times, 6 tss. leave rem sts unworked. 49 loops on hook

Row 9 RP: Short RP.

Row 10 FP: 6 tss, 1 tss2tog, 1 yrh, 1 tss, 1 yrh, 1 tss2tog, 4 tss, [1 yrh, 1 tss2tog, 2 tss] 5 times, 7 tss, leave rem sts unworked. 43 loops on hook

Row 10 RP: Short RP.

Row 11 FP: 1 tss, M1, 4 tss, 1 tss2tog, 1 yrh, 3 tss, 1 yrh, 1 tss2tog, 4 tss, [1 yrh, 1 tss2tog, 2 tss] 5 times, leave rem sts unworked. 38 loops on hook

Row 11 RP: Short RP.

Row 12: 5 tss, 1 tss2tog, 1 yrh, 5 tss, 1 yrh, 1 tss2tog, working over rem sts in all previous rows, 70 tss, 1 tes. 86 loops on hook

Row 13: 5 tss, [1 vrh, miss 1 st, 3 tss] 3 times, 67 tps, 1 tes, 86 loops on hook

Row 14: 6 tss, 1 yrh, 1 tss2tog, 3 tss, 1 tss2tog, 1 yrh, 71 tss, 1 tes. 86 loops

Row 15 FP: 7 tss, 1 yrh, 1 tss2tog, 1 tss, 1 tss2tog, 1 vrh, 4 tss, [1 tss2tog, 1 yrh, 2 tss] 5 times, 1 tss, leave rem sts unworked. 38 loops on hook

Row 15 RP: Short RP.

Note: For Row 16 through Row 22, sts at end of row will be worked over unworked sts from Row 14.

Row 16 FP: 1 tss, 1 tss2tog, 5 tss, 1 yrh, 1 tss3Tog, 1 yrh, 4 tss, [1 tss2tog, 1 yrh, 2 tssl 5 times, 8 tss, 43 loops on hook

Row 16 RP: Short RP.

Row 17 FP: 8 tss, 1 yrh, miss 1 sts, 4 tss, [1 tss2tog, 1 yrh, 2 tss] 7 times, 7 tss. 49 loops on hook

Row 17 RP: Short RP.

Row 18 FP: 1 tss, 1 tss2tog, 9 tss, [1 tss2tog, 1 vrh, 2 tss1 10 times, 2 tss. 54 loops on hook

Row 18 RP: Short RP.

Row 19 FP: 1 tss, 1 tss2tog, 7 tss, [1 tss2tog, 1 vrh. 2 tssl 11 times, 5 tss. 59 loops on hook

Row 19 RP: Short RP.

Row 20 FP: [1 tss, 1 tss2tog] twice, 2 tss, [1 tss2tog, 1 yrh, 2 tss] 12 times, 8 tss. 63 loops on hook

Row 20 RP: Short RP.

Row 21 FP: 1 tss, 1 tss2tog, 2 tss, [1 tss2tog, 1 yrh, 2 tss] 14 times, 7 tss. 68 loops on hook

Row 21 RP: Short RP.


Row 22 FP: 1 tss, 1 tss2tog, 4 tss, [1 tss2tog, 1 yrh, 2 tss] 16 times, 2 tss. 73 loops on hook

Accessory

Row 22 RP: Short RP. Row 23: [1 tss, 1 tss2tog] twice, 71 tss, 1 tes. 77 loops on hook

Row 24: 2 BO, 73 tps, 1 tes. 75 loops on hook Rep rows 3-24 13 times more.


Last Row: Inserting hook as for tss, sl st in each across to bind off, rotate to work across row ends, 1 ch, sl st in each row end to last row end, [1 sl st, 12 ch, 1 sl st] in last row end for button loop (optional).



Finishing

If button loop was made, sew button in corner on opposite side of neckline. Weave in ends. Block to dimensions given, using pins to open up the lace.

1 x 50g ball in Tulip 222 (CC1)
1 x 25g ball each in Hot Red 115 (CC2),

1 x 10g ball each in Caramel 506 (CC5)
& Jet Black 110 (CC6)

About the yarn

4-ply; 125m per 50g; 100% cotton

Tension

27 sts x 30 rows = 10cm measured over dc Tension is not critical for this project but sts should be tight enough to avoid stuffing showing through

Hook used

2mm

Other supplies

toy stuffing tapestry needle pins stitch markers

Sizing

Balloon is 26cm approximately from top to base of basket (plus hanging loop and anchor) Ermintrude is 11cm tall approximately from top of Hat to her bottom

Pieces made in the round are worked in the amigurumi style, in a spiral without slip stitching or turning chains. Use a stitch marker or waste yarn to keep track of the first stitch of each round.

Special stitches

Invisible increase (2 dc in next st): 1 dc in FLO of next st, 1 dc in both loops of same st.

Invisible decrease (inv-dc2tog): [Insert hook in FLO of next st] twice, yrh, pul, yrh, draw through both loops on hook.



For pieces made using turned rows, the beg 1 ch does not count as a st. Unless otherwise stated, finish each piece by pulling the yarr through the last loop and leaving a long tail for sewing. Make all the pieces first and then sew tog in the order given in the Making Up instructions.

Start crocheting...

Balloon

72 sts

Balloon Canopy

Made from the top down. Stuff as you go. **Rnd 1:** With MC and working into a magic ring, 6 dc. 6 sts

Rnd 2: 2 dc in each st around. 12 sts

Rnd 3: [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 18 sts

Rnd 4: [2 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. *24 sts* **Rnd 5:** [3 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. *30 sts*

Rnd 6: [4 dc. 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 36 sts

Rnd 7: [5 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 42 sts

Rnd 8: [6 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 48 sts

Rnd 9: [7 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 54 sts

Rnd 10: [8 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 60 sts

Rnd 11: [9 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 66 sts

Rnd 12: [10 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times.

Rnd 13: [11 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. *78 sts*

Rnd 14: [12 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times.

Rnd 15: [13 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 90 sts

Rnd 16: [14 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 96 sts

Rnds 17-32: Dc around.

56: Dc around.

Rnd 33: [14 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 90 sts Rnd 34 and all even rnds through Rnd

Rnd 35: [13 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. *84 sts* **Rnd 37**: [12 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. *78 sts*

Rnd 39: [11 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 72 sts

Rnd 41: [10 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 66 sts

Rnd 43: [9 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 60 sts **Rnd 45:** [8 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 54 sts

Rnd 47: [7 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. *34 sts*

Rnd 49: [6 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 42 sts

Rnd 51: [5 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. *36 sts*

Rnd 53: [4 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. *30 sts*

Rnd 55: [3 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 30 sts

Rnd 57: [2 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 18 sts Rnd 58: [1 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 12 sts

Rnd 59: 6 inv-dc2tog. 6 sts

Fasten off. Weave tail through FLO of rem 6 sts and pull to close hole. Weave in end.

Rasket

Base is made in two parts which are then crocheted together, then the side of the Basket is worked.

Base (make 2)

Rnds 1-10: With MC, work as for Balloon Canopy. 60 sts

Fasten off for first Base. Do not fasten off

Place bases with WS tog then, crocheting



through the edge sts of both pieces to join, cont with Rnd 11 to create Basket side.

Rnd 11: [9 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 66 sts

Rnd 12: Dc in FLO around.

Rnds 13-16: Dc around.

Rnds 17-18: Dc in BLO around. Rnds 19-21: Dc around.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing. Fold top down to outside of Basket. Use tail to sew top edge of last rnd to unused loops of Rnd 11.

Decorative Band

Front & Back of Band made separately. Follow instructions in Making Up section at end of pattern for assembly - decorative elements need to be stitched in place on Front of Band before Back of Band is attached

Front of Band

Worked from top edge down. With CC4, chain 71.

Row 1 (RS): Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 70 dc. Turn. 70 sts Change to CC3.

Rows 2-9: 1 ch, dc across. Turn. Change to CC4.

Row 10: 1 ch, dc across. Turn. Row 11: 1 ch, sl st across.

Fasten off.

Back of Band

With CC3, chain 71.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 70 dc. Turn. 70 sts

Rows 2-7: 1 ch, dc across.

Fasten off.

Decorative Elements Red Panels (make 5)

Rnd 1: With CC2 and working into a magic ring, 1 sl st, 2 ch (counts as first htr), 2 htr, [2 ch, 3 htr] 3 times, 2 ch, join with sl st in top of beg 2 ch. 12 sts

Fasten off.

Pink Crescents (make 10)

Curved shape is created once stitched in place.

With CC1, chain 8.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 7 sl st. 7 sts

Fasten off.

Sandbags (make 4)

Stuff as you go. Do not stuff beyond Rnd 6. Rnd 1: With CC2 and working into a magic ring, 6 dc. 6 sts

Rnd 2: 2 dc in each st around. 12 sts

Rnd 3: [3 dc, 2 dc in next st] 3 times. 15 sts Rnd 4: Dc around.

Rnd 5: [3 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 3 times. 12 sts

Rnd 6: [2 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 3 times. 9 sts

Rnd 7: [1 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 3 times. 6 sts Rnd 8: As Rnd 2. 12 sts

Fasten off.

Bows (make 8)

At end of Rnd 1 gently tighten magic ring, leaving it loose enough to still work into in the 2nd rnd.

Rnd 1: With CC1 and working into a magic ring, [1 sl st, 10 ch] twice (bow loops made), [1 sl st in magic ring, 5 ch, starting in 2nd ch from hook, 4 sl st down ch] twice, 1 sl st in magic ring. Tighten magic ring gently.

Rnd 2: 1 sl st in each ch around first bow loop, 1 sl st in magic ring, 1 sl st in each ch around 2nd bow loop, 1 sl st in magic ring. Tighten magic ring fully.

Fasten off.

Joining Strings (make 4)

With CC4, chain 45.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 44 dc. 44 sts

Fasten off.

Anchor

Made in 3 parts.

Vertical Bar

With CC4, chain 13.

Small Spots (make 6)

Rnd 1: With CC2 and working into a magic ring, 2 dc, pull magic ring to tighten. 2 sts Fasten off.

Tail

Worked from tip of Tail back. Do not stuff.

Rnd 1: With CC6 and working into a magic ring, 4 dc. 4 sts

Rnd 2: [2 dc in next st, 1 dc] twice. 6 sts **Rnd 3**: [2 dc in next st, 2 dc] twice. 8 sts

Rnd 4: [1 inv-dc2tog, 2 dc] twice. 6 sts **Rnd 5:** [1 inv-dc2tog, 1 dc] twice. 4 sts

Change to CC2. Rnds 6-18: Dc around.

Fasten off.

Flower Petals

Rnd 1: With CC3 and working into a magic ring, [1 dc, 2 ch] 5 times, join with sl st to beg dc. 5 petals

Fasten off.

Flower Centre

Rnd 1: With CC4 and working into a magic ring, 4 dc, join with sl st to beg dc. 4 sts Fasten off.

Making Up

Use a tapestry needle and yarn tails to sew pieces tog, pinning in place first.

For Balloon: Lay Front of Band horizontally in front of you with RS up (last row of sI sts is the bottom edge). Lay out Red Panels along Front of Band, alternating with two Pink Crescents. Curve Crescents as you attach them, leaving enough space between each pair to embroider a star. Sew Red Panels to Band with CC3, just stitching at the corners as shown in photograph. With CC4, embroider an 8-point star in centre of each pair of Crescents. Sew Back of Band along back of Front of Band, concealing back of embroidery. Join short edges of joined Bands to form a ring. With CC4, sew top edge of completed Band to Balloon Canopy.

Designate one of the Crescent/Star combinations as centre front of Balloon. Pin a Joining String either side of the outer edge of the two Red Panels on either side of this center front Crescent/Star. Centre-back of the Balloon/Band runs through centre of a Red Panel, with a pair of Crescents/Star either side of it. Pin the other two Joining Strings either side of the outer edge of these two Crescent/Stars. Looking from the side of Balloon/Band, front and back Joining Strings should be separated by one Red Panel and one Crescent/Star. Once you are happy with the positioning, sew Joining Strings to Front of Band, Sew bottom of each Joining String to side of Basket.

Sew a Bow at the top and bottom of each Joining String with the bottom ones sitting in line with the top edge of Basket. Sew a Sandbag onto basket, just below each of the lower Bows.

To make the Anchor, sew short edge of Vertical Bar to inside centre of Bottom Curve and sew Horizontal Bar in place approximately one third of the way down Vertical Bar. Sew bottom of Anchor Rope to top of Vertical Bar and top of Anchor Rope to side of Basket just to right or left front Joining String.

Sew both ends of Hanging Loop to centre top of Balloon Canopy.

For Ermintrude: Stuff Hat and, using photograph as a guide, stitching through the unused back loops of Rnd 11 of Hat, sew to top of Head. Sew Fringe in place along underside of Hat brim. Sew Horns in place on Hat.

Split a length of CC6 to halve the thickness and use to embroider Eyes approximately 3 rows down from Fringe with 1 st between, and smile from Rnd 5, down and across centre of magic ring and up to other side of Rnd 5. Sew Outer Petals of Flower over top of smile offset to right (as viewed). Sew Flower Centre to Outer Petals.

Looking at the Body, the more rounded side is the belly. Sew Body to Head. The front edge of neck should sit roughly in line with Rnd 6 of Head.

Sew Tail onto back of Body, sitting roughly in line with Rnd 5 of Body, leaving room for Ermintrude to sit on her bottom. Sew stuffed Haunches in place either side of Tail.

Sew one Leg to top of each Foot. Join top of lower Legs to Body in line with Rnd 5, sitting approximately 4 sts apart. Sew upper Legs in place either side of Body, attaching them approximately 5 rnds down from where Body and Head join.

Sew Scarf round neck. Sew Large and Small Spots to Body.

Most people have probably never heard of a crochet or knitting Tech Editor before. They're like these secret superheroes in the pattern world. Sometimes they are known as 'pattern checkers,' or I like to think of them as 'pattern perfectionists'. They're part of a hidden team that works behind the scenes to make sure your crochet and knitting patterns are the absolute best they can be, giving you accurate instructions for brilliant results.

Knitting and crochet patterns are created by talented designers who pour countless hours into their unique and intricate designs. The truth is, even the most experienced designers can make mistakes every now and then - that is where the Tech Editor comes in. Before a pattern is released or published, it usually undergoes a thorough review by a Tech Editor. They are like the last line of defence before the pattern is tested and sent out into the world. Their job is to locate errors, ensure clarity and make sure the pattern is perfect!

So, the next time you're working on a pattern, remember that there's a whole team of secret heroes, including the Tech Editor, who have played a role in making it the best it can be.

What is a Tech(nical) Editor, anyway?

Tech Editors play a crucial role in the world of knitting and crochet. They provide a vital service to independent designers and book or magazine publishers, meticulously checking over patterns to make sure they are ready for crafters to create.

Tech editing involves reviewing a pattern to ensure that it is accurate, clear and easy to follow. They have a keen eye for detail

and check for any errors in stitch counts, gauge, terminology and formatting. If they spot any mistakes, they make the necessary corrections to ensure the pattern is consistent and mathematically sound.

A Tech Editor checks that the pattern meets industry standards and any specific requirements set by the designer or publisher. This can include language or terminology, formatting, house style and other guidelines to ensure consistency across a collection of patterns or a publication. One important thing to note is that Tech Editors work closely with designers with the aim that their unique vision and voice shine through in the pattern. It's not a one-size-fits-all approach. They collaborate to accurately translate the designer's intent into the pattern, making sure it reflects their style and creativity.




Why is all of this so important?

Well, a poorly written pattern can cause frustration, wasted time and disappointment. It can also damage the reputation of the designer or publication. That is why Tech Editors are here to check that the patterns are of the highest quality they can be, giving crafters the best experience possible and upholding the integrity of the designer's work.

So, what does the typical tech editing process look like?

Every Tech Editor has their own unique way of doing things, however they all follow a similar process or checklist to make sure those knitting and crochet patterns are absolutely perfect. So, let me give you a glimpse into the typical tech editing process I go through when a pattern lands on my desk:

Firstly, I start by reading through it carefully, making sure I understand the designer's vision and the overall structure of the pattern. Then, it's time to get into

the nitty-gritty details. I go line by line, stitch by stitch, checking for any errors or inconsistencies. I'm like a detective searching for the tiniest clues. I make sure the stitch counts are on point, the gauge is accurate and the terminology is clear and consistent throughout.

However, it doesn't stop there. I'm also on the lookout for any formatting issues, irregular stitch counts or repeats. If something seems inaccurate, I put on my problem-solving hat and figure out the best way to make it right. Throughout the process, I'm in constant communication with the designer. I want to make sure I understand their vision and capture their style. We work together to fine-tune the pattern, ensuring it's a true reflection of their creativity and expertise.

Finally, after all the checks and edits are GTHE LEARN-TO-KNIT BOOK THE KNITGRRL GUIDE TO PROFESSIONAL KNITWEAR DES

done and the designer has had a chance to review. I give the pattern one last thorough check. I want to be absolutely certain that it's error-free, clear and ready for crafters to work their magic.

So, that's a sneak peek into the typical tech editing process I follow. It's a mix of attention to detail, problem-solving and collaboration with the designer. All in the pursuit of delivering brilliant knitting and crochet patterns to crafters like you. As you can see, this is a very involved process and requires a number of skills and attention to detail. As a crafter, you will probably have noticed when a pattern hasn't been through the laser focussed gaze of a Tech Editor!

What does it take to be a successful Tech Editor?

Firstly, it is important to understand that technical editing is a specialised skill set. It requires a deep knowledge of techniques and terminology, as well as a sharp eye for detail and a strong understanding of grammar, syntax and formatting. This means that not just anyone can provide technical editing services for knitting and crochet patterns - it takes a skilled and experienced professional to do the job right.

A professional Tech Editor should have a deep, solid understanding of knitting and/ or crochet. That means they should know all about different stitches, techniques, constructions and pattern styles. It's crucial for them to be able to spot any mistakes in patterns and know exactly how to fix them. Usually, a Tech Editor will have this amazing collection of reference books that they've been building up over

the years. I am quite proud of my geeky reference bookshelf! It's pretty impressive, even if I do say so myself!

A Tech Editor should really have a good understanding of pattern writing and design. That means they have a deep knowledge of pattern structure, grammar and punctuation. They should be able to identify inconsistencies in pattern instructions and suggest ways to make them better. Understanding the basics of design is key because it allows a Tech Editor to anticipate any potential problems in how the pattern comes together. Tech Editors need to be able to do some serious mental gymnastics, imagining themselves knitting or crocheting the item in their mind while double-checking all the calculations. It's no easy task, I can tell you!

It's a mix of attention to detail, problem-solving and collaboration with the designer

A successful Tech Editor has this amazing ability for spotting even the tiniest errors in patterns. They're like super detectives of detail, always catching misaligned tables in documents or those sneaky typos in written texts. They want to make sure that anyone who reads the pattern can easily understand it and follow along without any confusion. It's all about clarity and making things foolproof!

Analytical thinking skills are essential for a Tech Editor. They have got to be able to dive deep into patterns and analyse them with a sharp eye. They are like pattern detectives, spotting errors, inconsistencies and even potential problems that could pop up. They possess this innate ability to think critically about how the pattern is put together. The first error encountered is quite often not the root cause of the actual error, so some pattern detective work needs to take place.

Tech Editors need to be able to express themselves clearly when they find any errors or issues in a pattern and communicate them effectively to the designer or publisher. Working with a designer or publisher is all about collaboration to make the best possible pattern they can. Editors need to be

able to make suggestions for improvement in a constructive and kind way. They also need to make things crystal clear so that crafters of all levels can understand the pattern.

Being a Tech Editor usually means juggling multiple patterns at the same time. They have got to be able to prioritise their workload and make sure they meet all of the publishing deadlines. They are usually organised, have systems in place to stay on track and get things done on time. It's all about being efficient and getting the job done right on schedule!

As you can see, even within the niche hobbies of crochet and knitting, this is a pretty specialist skill set, and not for those who are afraid of maths! There are no formal qualifications required to become a Tech Editor, However, there are courses and certifications available to help develop the necessary skills quicker than scouring the internet for free resources. Many Tech Editors start out as designers or pattern testers before transitioning into editing for other designers.

If Tech Editors are so important, why have I never heard of them before?

You know what's really interesting? When a crochet or knitting pattern has gone through tech editing, the crafter usually doesn't even realise it. The end result is usually invisible to the crafter, like a behind-the-scenes magic trick! That is why the role of a Tech Editor is often not so obvious and their credits are hidden away in the small print. Go ahead, grab any craft book or pattern magazine

from your bookshelf and I expect you'll find an acknowledgement in there somewhere for the Tech Editors. They're like secret heroes, making sure everything is accurate, clear and consistent. Thankfully, more and more independent designers are recognising the value of their Tech Editors' input. So, you might start seeing their names and contact details right there on the pattern shining a spotlight on a Tech Editors' awesome work!

With more people picking up their hooks or needles and diving into crochet and knit projects, the number of designers out there is skyrocketing! This means there is a growing demand for stunning designs. However, with more designers comes a greater need for technical editing services. We want crafters like you to have the most successful crafting experience possible and end up with brilliant results. So, as the crochet and knit community keeps flourishing, the demand for quality technical

Row 2(WS): 2 ch, 1 tr, *1 tr3tog, 6 tr, 5 tr in next st, 6 tr, 1 tr3tog**, 4 tr; rep from * 7 times more, ending last rep at **, 1

Row 3: 2 ch, 1 tr, *1 tr3tog, [miss 1 st, 1 tr, 1 PS in missed st] 3 times, 5 tr in next st, [miss 1 st, 1 tr, 1 PS in missed st] 3 times, 1 tr3tog**, [miss 1 st. 1 tr. 1 PS in missed st] twice; rep from *7 times more, ending last rep at **, 1 tr. Turn.

Row 4: As Row 2. Fasten off.

Row 5: Working in BLO, with A, 2 ch, 1 tr, *1 tr3tog, 6 tr, 5 tr in next st, 6 tr, 1 tr3tog**, 4 tr; rep from * 7 times more, ending last rep at **, 1 tr. Turn.

Rows 6-7: Rep rows 2-3.

Row 8: As Row 2.

Fasten off.

Rows 5-8 set the patt.

Rows 9-80: Following the colour sequence C, A, [B, A, C, A] 4 times, rep rows 5-8 another 18 times. 20 colour stripes completed.

Border

Rnd 1: With RS facing, join A in marked st of Row 1, rm, 1 ch, *dc evenly across the long side, working [2 dc in next tr row end, 3 dc in next tr row end] to end, 1 dc in each st along top, [2 dc in next tr row end, 3 dc in next tr row end) to end. change to B, 2 dc in first st of short side (corner point), dc in each st across to last st, 2 dc in last st, join with sl st to beg dc. 766 sts

Fasten off.

Finishing

Weave in ends and block to given dimensions.

Sport: 130m per 50g ball: 78% cotton. 22% acrylic

Tension

17 sts x 18 rows = 10cm measured over alternating rows of htr and dc

Hooks used

6 buttons, 14mm Grosgrain ribbon, 25cm x 1cm sewing needle white sewing thread 6 snaps darning needle tov stuffing stitch markers

Sizing

Age: 0-6m (6-12m, 12-18m, 18-24m, 2-3y) To fit chest: 41 (46, 51, 53, 56) cm

The jumper is worked bottom up in two pieces, then front and back are seamed. It is a drop-shoulder construction with faux button plackets at neck (using snaps to close for easy dressing). Grosgrain ribbon is added for stability. Cuffs and hems are added at the end. Sewing on small pieces is best achieved using sewing thread and needle, white all-purpose sewing thread is great for this project.



Front Neckband

Row 1: With RS facing and 4mm hook, ioin MC with sl st at top edge of neck opening, 1 ch, evenly place 11 (11, 13, 13, 13) dc down side of neck, 12 (12, 14, 14, 14) dc along missed sts on front neck edge, 11 (11, 13, 13, 13) up side of neck. Turn, 34 (34, 40, 40, 40) sts

Row 2: 1 ch, dc to end. Turn. Rep last row 1 (1, 1, 2, 2) times more. Fasten off

Left Front Shoulder Placket With RS facing and 4mm hook, join MC

with sI st at top of Left Front shoulder. Row 1 (RS): 1 ch, 11 (13, 15, 16, 17) dc across top of shoulder, 3 (3, 3, 4, 4) dc along row ends of neckband. Turn.

14 (16, 18, 20, 21) sts Row 2: 1 ch, dc across. Rep last row 1 (1, 1, 2, 2) times more. Fasten off.

Right Front Shoulder Placket

With RS facing and 4mm hook, join MC with sl st in last row end of Neckband on Right Front.

Row 1 (RS): 1 ch, work 3 (3, 3, 4, 4) dc along edge of neckband, 11 (13, 15, 16, 17) dc across top of shoulder. Turn. 14 (16, 18, 20, 21) sts

Row 2: 1 ch, dc across.

Rep last row 1 (1, 1, 2, 2) times more. Fasten off.

BACK

Work as Front, without Neck Shaping until piece measures 24.5 (27, 30, 32.5, 35) cm from beg, ending after a WS row.

Back Button Placket

Row 1 (RS): 1 ch, dc to end. Turn. Rep last Row 2 (2, 2, 3, 3) times more. Fasten off.

SLEEVES

Stripe sequence

Work 2 rows in each of CC1, CC2, CC3, CC4 & CC5.

With MC and 4mm hook, chain 26 (26, 30,

Row 1 (RS): Starting in 2nd ch from hook, dc to end. Turn. 25 (25, 29, 29, 29) sts

Row 2: 1 ch, htr to end. Turn. Starting with Row 3, work stripe sequence once, then cont in MC only to end.

Row 3: 1 ch, dc to end. Turn. Row 4: 1 ch, htr to end. Turn. Rows 3 & 4 form patt.

SIZES 0-6, 6-12, 12-18 ONLY:

Row 5: 1 ch. 2 dc in first st. dc to end. Turn. Row 6: 1 ch. 2 htr in first st. htr to end. Turn. Rep rows 5-6 another 6 (6, 6, -, -) times. 39 (39, 43, -, -) sts

SIZES 18-24 & 2-3 ONLY:

Row 5: 1 ch. 2 dc in first st, dc to end. Turn. Row 6: 1 ch, htr to end. Turn. Rep rows 5-6 another - (-, -, 17, 17) times. -(-, -, 47, 47) sts

ALL SIZES:

Rep rows 3 & 4, until sleeve measures 12 (15.5, 22.5, 27.5, 29.5) cm from start. Fasten off.

Cuff

With RS facing and 3mm hook, join MC

with sI st at bottom of Sleeve (underside of foundation ch). Work at right angles to Sleeve and into the foundation ch as follows:

Row 1 (RS): 6 ch, starting in 2nd ch from hook, 5 dc, sl st in next 2 foundation chs. Turn. 5 dc, 2 sl sts

Row 2: Miss 2 sl sts, 5 dc in BLO. Turn. 5 sts Row 3: 1 ch, 5 dc in BLO, sl st in next 2 foundation chs. Turn. 5 dc, 2 sl st Rep rows 2 and 3 around bottom edge of Sleeve. Fasten off.

Hem

With RS facing and 3mm hook, join MC with sl st at the bottom edge of Front or Back Panel (in underside of foundation ch). Work ribbing as for Sleeve Cuff, Rep for other panel. Fasten off.

UNICORN APPLIQUE Muzzle

Worked in a spiral without joining or turning chains, pm in first st and move up as you go.

With CC7 and 3.5mm hook, chain 14.

Rnd 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 12 dc, 3 dc in last ch, rotating as you go, work in the other side of the chain, 11 dc, 2 dc in same ch as first dc. 28 sts

Rnd 2: 2 dc in next st, 11 dc, [2 dc in next st] 3 times, 11 dc, [2 dc in next st] twice.

Rnd 3: 1 dc, 2 dc in next st, 11 dc, [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] 3 times, 11 dc, [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] twice. 40 sts

Rnd 4: 2 dc, 2 dc in next st, 11 dc, [2 dc, 2 dc in next st] 3 times, 11 dc, [2 dc, 2 dc in next st1 twice. 46 sts

Rnd 5: 3 dc. 2 dc in next st. 2 dc. 7 htr. 2 dc. [3 dc, 2 dc in next st] 3 times, 2 dc, 7 htr, 2 dc, [3 dc, 2 dc in next st] twice. 52 sts Fasten off.

Find the centre top and bottom of Muzzle by folding it in half, bringing the curved edges tog, pm in the centre top and centre bottom sts

Head

With RS facing and 3.5mm hook, join CC6 with sl st in 7th st before top marker.

Row 1: 1 ch (counts as first dc), 14 dc. Turn. 15 sts

Rows 2-7: 1 ch, dc to end. Turn. Row 8: Miss first st, 1 dc, 11 htr, 1 dc, miss last st.

Fasten off.

With CC6, sl st around Head.

Neck

With RS facing and 3.5mm hook, join CC6 in 5th st before bottom marker.

Row 1: 1 ch (counts as first dc), 10 dc. Turn. 11 sts

Row 2: 1 ch, 2 dc in next st, dc across to last 2 sts, 2 dc in next st, 1 dc. 13 sts

Rows 3-4: Rep Row 2. 17 sts

Fasten off.

Eves (make 2)

Rnd 1: With CC8, 3mm hook, and working into a magic ring, 8 dc, join with sl st to beg dc. 8 sts

Rnd 2: 1 ch, 2 dc, 1 sl st, 1 dc, 2 dc in next st, 1 dc, 1 sl st, 1 dc, join with sl st to beg dc.

Fasten off.

Using photograph as a guide, with CC6, embroider a small triangle highlight.

Ears (make 2)

With CC6 and 3mm hook, chain 7. Rnd 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 1 dc. 1 htr, 3 tr, [1 htr, 2 dc, 1 htr] in last ch, rotating as you go, work in the other side of the chain, 3 tr, 1 htr, 1 dc, join with sl st to beg dc. 14 sts

Bring RS tog at one end of Ear to and secure with a stitch.

Horn

With CC1 and 3.5mm hook, chain 10. Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 9 dc. Turn. 9 sts

Row 2: 1 ch (counts as dc here and throughout Horn), 8 dc. Turn.

Row 3: 1 ch, miss next st, 7 dc. Turn. 8 sts Change to CC2.

Row 4: 1 ch. 7 dc. Turn.

Row 5: 1 ch, miss next st, 6 dc. Turn. 7 sts

Row 6: 1 ch, 6 dc. Turn. Change to CC3.

Row 7: 1 ch, miss next st, 5 dc. Turn. 6 sts

Row 8: 1 ch. 5 dc. Turn.

Row 9: 1 ch, miss next st, 4 dc. Turn. 5 sts Change to CC4.

Row 10: 1 ch, 4 dc. Turn. 5 sts

Row 11: 1 ch, miss next st, 3 dc. Turn. 4 sts

Row 12: 1 ch, 3 dc. Turn. Change to CC5.

Row 13: 1 ch, miss next st, 2 dc. Turn. 3 sts

Row 14: 1 ch, 2 dc. Turn.

Row 15: 1 ch, miss next st, 1 dc. 2 sts Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Rainbow Mane

Long strands (make 1 each in CC1, CC2, CC3, CC4 & CC5)

With 4mm hook, chain 20. Fasten off. Short Strands (make 1 each in CC2, CC3, CC4 & CC5)

With 4mm hook, chain 8. Fasten off.

Making Up

Block Jumper pieces to make the assembly easier.

Using photograph as a guide, sew Eyes onto Head 1 row above Muzzle and with 3 sts between, With CC8, embroider nostrils onto Muzzle. Pin Unicorn into position just above bottom ribbing and sew in place. Pin Horn into position, slightly overlapping centre front of Head and at a slight angle. Use a small amount of toy stuffing behind Horn to give it a curved shape. Sew in position. Sew Ears at top and side of Head, Attach CC1 Mane Long Strand behind left Ear and along the side of Head so it flicks out from side of Muzzle. Attach rem Mane Long Strands to the other side of left Ear and draping across Head, sew into position. Attach Mane Short Strands below the Long CC1 strand at bottom of Muzzle.

Lay Front of jumper with Front shoulder plackets overlapping back plackets. Oversew the row ends tog at the armhole edge only to secure. Fold Sleeves in half lengthwise and line up centre of sleeve with shoulder seam, pin into position then sew sleeves onto Body.

Sew a length of Grosgrain ribbon on the RS of Back button plackets and another length on the WS of Front shoulder plackets for stability (or sew buttons on first, see below). With sewing needle and thread, sew 3 snaps on each of left and right plackets.

Join side and Sleeve seams. With sewing needle and thread, sew 3 buttons, evenly spaced, on top of each Front shoulder placket (you might find it easier to sew buttons and then cover the sewing with the ribbon).

Row 8: 3 ch, 1 bbl, 1 tr, [1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 tr] twice, [1 bbl, 1 tr] 3 times, [1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 tr] twice, 1 bbl, 1 tr, [1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 tr] 13 times, 1 bbl, 1 tr, [1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 tr] twice, [1 bbl, 1 tr] 3 times, [1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 tr] twice, 1 bbl, 1 tr. Turn.




Spinning in Harmony With Nature

Sustainability Checklist

There's no such thing as a perfectly eco-friendly yarn - it's all about balance. Here are some of the factors to consider:

Microplastics

Try to reduce reliance on man-made fibres, which can release microplastics into water when washed.

Shipping distance Locally-sourced yarn may have a smaller carbon footprint.

✓ Water

Different fibres require different amounts of water to grow - for example, cotton needs more water than hemp.

Energy

How energy-intensive is the manufacturing process, and does the manufacturer use renewable energy?

Recycled fibres

Consider yarns which are made from recycled rather than new raw material.

Quality

Investing in good quality long lasting yarns reduces the need to replace worn-out garments.

Two triangular pieces are made first, for the front and back piece; use one skein for each so the ombre effect flows seamlessly down the top. These are then joined together at the shoulders and underarm to fit, before filling in the sides. Before you begin, wind off 5g from each of the two skeins; this will be used for joining the shoulders and edging the neck. We recommend using a stitch marker to mark the middle point of the triangle, moving it up as you add each row. Beg 1 ch does not count as a st.

Schematic 83cm 58cm

Beg 2 ch counts as first htr. Beg 3 ch counts as first tr unless otherwise specified.

Beg 4 ch counts as 1 tr and 1 ch. Beg 5 ch counts as 1 tr and 2 ch.

Start crocheting...

Chain 5, join with sl st in first ch to form

Rnd 3 (WS): 4 ch. miss next st. [2 tr next st] 5 times, 2 ch, miss 2ch-sp, [2 tr next st] 5 times, 1 ch, miss next st, 1 tr in top of beg 3 ch. Turn. 22 sts

Rnd 4: 4 ch, miss 1ch-sp, 1 dtr2tog, [5 ch, 1 dtr4tog] twice, 5 ch, 1 cl into 2ch-sp, [5 ch, 1 dtr4tog) twice, 5 ch, 1 dtr2tog, 1 ch, miss 1ch-sp, 1 tr in 3rd of beg 4 ch. Turn. 2 1ch-sps, 6 5ch-sps

Rnd 5: 1 ch, 1 dc into 1ch-sp, *[4 dc, 2 ch, 4 dc] into next 5ch-sp; rep from * 5 times more, 1 dc into last 1ch-sp. Turn. 50 sts Rnd 6: 4 ch, *[1 PS, 2 ch, 1 PS] into next 2ch-sp, 4 ch; rep from * 4 times more, [1 PS, 2 ch, 1 PS] in last 2ch-sp, 1 ch, 1 tr in last st. Turn. PM in centre 4ch-sp, move marker up as you go. 12 PS, 2 tr, 5 4chsps, 2 1ch-sps

Turn, 23 PS

[1 tr. 2 ch. 1 tr] in next st, *miss 3 sts, [1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] in next st; rep from * 9 times more, [1 tr, 2 ch, 1 trl into centre 2ch-sp, miss 2 sts, [1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] in next st, *miss 3 sts, [1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] in next st; rep from * 9 times more, 2 ch, 1 tr in 2nd of beg 3 ch. Turn. 23 V sts, 2 tr

Rnd 12: 6 ch (counts as 1 dtr, 2 ch), miss first 2ch-sp, [1 cl into next 2ch-sp, 4 ch] 11 times, [1 small cl, 3 ch, 1 small cl] into centre 2ch-sp, [4 ch, 1 cl into next 2ch-sp] 11 times, 2 ch, 1 dtr in 3rd of beg 5 ch. Turn. 22 cl, 2 small cl, 2 dtr

Rnd 13: 1 ch, 3 dc into first 2ch-sp, [5 dc into next 4ch-sp] 11 times, 5 dc into centre 3ch-sp, move marker to 3rd of 5 dc just made, [5 dc into next 4ch-sp] 11 times, 3 dc into last 2ch-sp. Turn. 121 dc

Rnd 14: 2 ch, htr across. Turn.

Rnd 15: [5 ch, 1 tr] in first st, {miss 3 sts, [1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] in next st} 14 times, miss 3 sts, 1 Fan in marked st, {miss 3 sts, 1 Fan in marked st, {miss 3 sts, 1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] in next st} 15 times. 30 V sts, 1 Fan

Rnd 16: 3 ch, *[1 PS, 2 ch, 1 PS] into next 2ch-sp, 3 ch, 1 dc in next 2ch-sp, 3 ch; rep from * 15 times more, [1 PS, 2 ch, 1 PS] into last 2ch-sp, 1 tr in 3rd of beg 5 ch. Turn. 3*A* PS, 16 dc, 2 tr

Rnd 17: 3 ch, *[1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] into next 2ch-sp, miss 3ch-sp, [1 dtr, 2 ch, 1 dtr] in next dc, miss 3ch-sp; rep from * to marked 2ch-sp, 1 Fan in centre 2ch-sp, **miss 3ch-sp, [1 dtr, 2 ch, 1 dtr] in next

Rnd 19: [5 ch, 1 tr] in first st, miss 3 sts, *[1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] in next tr, miss 3 sts; rep from * to centre 2ch-sp, 1 Fan in centre 2ch-sp, **miss 3 sts, [1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] in next tr; rep from ** to last 4 sts, miss 3 sts [1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] in top of beg 2 ch. Turn. 34 V-sts. 1 Fan

Rnd 20: 3 ch, *[1 PS, 2 ch, 1 PS] into next 2ch-sp, 3 ch, 1 dc into next ch-sp, 3 ch; rep from * to last 2ch-sp, [1 PS, 2 ch, 1 PS, 1 tr] into last 2 ch-sp. Turn. 38 PS, 18 dc, 2 tr

Rnd 21: 3 ch, *[1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] into next 2ch-sp, miss 3ch-sp, [1 dtr, 2 ch, 1 dtr] in next dc, miss 3ch-sp, [1 dtr, 2 ch, 1 dtr] in next dc, miss 3ch-sp, rep from * to centre 2ch-sp, **miss 3ch-sp, [1 dtr, 2 ch, 1 dtr] in next dc, miss 3ch-sp, [1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] into next 2ch-sp; rep from ** to last PS, miss PS, 1 tr in top of beg 3 ch. 18 tr V-sts, 18 dtr V-sts, 1 Fan. 2 tr

From Rnd 1 to the centre point is the length of the Top, and the left point to right point, across the row ends, is the width. Rep rnds 18-21 until you are happy with the size (each rep adds approximately 5cm), then work Rnd 18 once more.

Using the yarn set aside at the beg, place Front and Back pieces RS tog and sew shoulder seams, leaving a wide enough gap for your neck and head.

Neck edging

Rnd 1: Join reserved yarn with sl st in centre of Back panel, 1 ch, dc evenly around neckline, working 3 dc into each row end.

Rnd 2: SI st in FLO around.

Use stitch markers to join the two pieces at the underarm. Try it on for best fit, making sure both sides are equal. You will now be filling in the sides, working each side separately. You will start from the bottom point of Front piece, work up to the underarm and cont down Back piece to bottom point, then turn and work back and forth over these sts, filling in the triangular gap at the sides.

Row 1: With RS facing, join yarn with sI st in marked 2ch-sp on Front piece, 3 ch, *miss 3 sts, [1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] in next st; rep from * to 3 sts before underarm marker, miss 3 sts, 1 tr2tog over first marked tr of Front piece and 2nd marked tr of Back piece, working down back piece to point, *miss 3 sts, [1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] in next st; rep from * to 3 sts before marked 2ch-sp, 1 tr into 2ch-sp. Turn.

Row 2: 3 ch, miss next V-st, *[1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] in sp between next pair of V-sts; rep from * up Back until 1 V-st rem, 1 tr2tog over first tr of final V-st of Back and 2nd tr of first V-st of Front (missing 2 tr), *[1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] in sp between next pair of V-sts; rep from * until 1 V-st rem, miss last V-st, 1 tr in top of beg 3 ch. Turn.

Row 3: 3 ch, miss next V-st, *[1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] in sp between next pair of V-sts; rep from * up Front until 1 V-st rem, 1 tr2tog over first tr of final V-st of Front and 2nd tr of first V-st of Back (missing 2 tr), **[1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] in sp between next pair of V-sts; rep from * until 1 V-st rem, miss last V-st, 1 tr in top of beg 3 ch. Turn.

Rep rows 2-3 until 1 V-st rem on each side.

Last Row: 3 ch, 1 tr2tog over final 2 V-sts (missing 2 centre tr), 1 tr in top of beg 3 ch. Fasten off.

Rep for other side.

Bottom edging

Rnd 1: With RS facing, join yarn with standing dc in any row end on bottom edge, 2 ch, *[1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] into next row end, 2 ch, 1 dc in next row end, 2 ch; rep from * around, join with sl st to beg dc.

Rnd 2: 1 ch, *2 dc into next 2ch-sp, [1 PS, 2 ch, 1 PS] into 2ch-sp of next V-st, 2 dc into next 2ch-sp; rep from * around, join with sl st to beg dc.

Fasten off.



Making Up

With WS tog, place Front Panel and Lower Back Piece and bottom edges aligned, place Upper Back Piece on top with upper edge aligned with upper edge of Front Panel, with MC, sew Front and Back Panels tog around outside edge, Back Pieces will form an envelope-style opening where they overlap. Insert cushion and sew buttons opposite buttonholes on Lower Back Piece.

Arrange Lily Flowers and Leaves on bottom RH corner of Front Panel and sew in place. Weave in ends.



Special stitches

Loop stitch (Ipst): Insert hook in st, wrap yarn around little (or index) finger and keep finger at distance required to create desired loop length. Squares are made in the tapestry crochet technique. Carry the non-working yarn across the back of the square and work over it, encasing it inside the sts until it is needed again. Each colour change is made in the last yrh of the tr before the next colour, as follows: Work tr before change to last 2 loops on hook, drop the first colour, yrh and draw through both loops with new colour. When working the tapestry crochet sts, gently pull the strand of encased yarn taut before starting to use it again – this will

help to hide the strand in the stitches.

At the end of each rnd, carry the yarn that's not in use up to the new rnd by catching it under the joining sI st.

Worked in joined rnds, without turning. Beg 3 ch counts as first tr. Join with sI st in top of beg 3 ch.

Row 28: 3 ch, 1 tr in first st, *2 ch, miss [3ch-sp and 1 2-trcl], 1 dc into next ch-sp, 2 ch, miss [1 2-trcl and 3ch-sp]**, 3 tr in next st; rep from * to last st, ending last rep at **, 2 tr in last st. Turn.

Row 29: 5 ch, 1 2-trcl in first st, *3 ch, miss [1 tr and 2ch-sp], 1 dc, 3 ch, miss [2ch-sp and 1 tr]**, [1 2-trcl, 3 ch, 2-trcl] in next st; rep from * to last st, ending last rep at **, [1 2-trcl, 1 ch, 1 dtr] in top of beg 3 ch. Turn.

Rows 30-33: As rows 26-29.

Row 34: As Row 26.

Row 35: 3 ch, 1 tr in first st, *2 tr into next ch-sp, 3 tr, 2 tr into next ch-sp, 1 tr; rep from * to end. Turn. 90 (98, 106, 122, 130, 138, 154, 162, 170) sts

Row 36: 4 ch, miss first 3 (2, 3, 2, 3, 3, 3, 3, 2) sts, *14-trcl in next st**, 2 ch, miss 2 sts; rep from * to last 2 (2, 3, 2, 3, 2, 3, 2, 2) sts, ending last rep at **, 1 ch, miss 1 (1, 2, 1, 2, 1, 2, 1, 1) sts, 1 tr in top of beg 3 ch. Turn. 89 (98, 104, 122, 128, 137, 152, 161, 170) sts

Row 37: 3 ch, 1 tr into first ch-sp, 1 tr, *2 tr into next ch-sp, 1 tr; rep from * to last ch-sp, 1 tr into last ch-sp, 1 tr in 3rd of beg 4 ch. Turn.

Row 38: 3 ch, tr to end. Turn.

Rows 39-40: As Row 38.

Row 41: 1 ch, dc to end. Turn.

Row 42: 6 ch (counts as 1 ttr and 1 ch), miss first 2 dc, 1 ttrcl, *2 ch, miss 2 sts, 1 ttrcl; rep from * to last 2 sts, 1 ch, miss 1

st, 1 ttr in last st. Turn.

Row 43: 1 ch, 1 dc, 1 dc into first ch-sp, 1 dc, *2 dc into next ch-sp, 1 dc, rep from * to last 2 sts, 1 dc into last ch-sp, 1 dc in 5th of beg 6 ch. Turn.

Row 44: 3 ch, tr to end. Turn.

Rows 45-46: As Row 38.

Row 47: 4 ch, miss first 2 tr, 1 4-trcl, *2 ch, miss 2 sts, 1 4-trcl; rep from * to last 2 sts, 1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 tr in top of beg 3 ch. Turn. Row 48: As Row 37.

SIZES XS, 2X & 4X ONLY:

Row 49: 3 ch, miss first 2 tr, 1 tr, *1 ch, miss 2 sts, 4 tr in next st, 1 ch, miss 2 sts, 1 tr, rep from * to last 2 sts, miss 1 st, 1 tr in top of beg 3 ch. Turn. 14 (-, -, -, -, 22, -, 26, 28) patt reps of 7 sts plus 3 sts

SIZES S, M, L, XL, 3X & 5X ONLY:

Row 49: 3 ch, *1 tr, 1 ch, miss 2 sts, 4 tr in next st, 1 ch, miss 2 sts, rep from * to last st, 2 tr in top of beg 3 ch. Turn. - (16, 17, 20, 21, -, 25, -, 28) patt reps of 7 sts plus 3 sts

ALL SIZES:

Row 50: 3 ch, 1 tr, *2 ch, miss 1ch-sp, 1 tr4tog, 2 ch, miss 1ch-sp, 1 tr; rep from * to last st, 1 tr in top of beg 3 ch. Turn.

Row 51: 3 ch, 2 tr in next st, *1 ch, miss 2chsp, 1 tr, 1 ch, miss 2ch-sp**, 4 tr in next st, rep from * last 2 sts, ending last rep at **, 2 tr in next st, 1 tr in top of beg 3 ch. Turn.



Row 52: 3 ch, 1 tr2tog, *2 ch, miss 1ch-sp, 1 tr. 2 ch, miss 1ch-sp**, 1 tr4tog; rep from * to last 3 sts, ending last rep at **. 1 tr2tog, 1 tr in top of beg 3 ch. Turn.

Row 53: 3 ch, 1 tr, *1 ch, miss 2ch-sp, 4 tr in next st, 1 ch, miss 2ch-sp**, 1 tr; rep from * to last 2 sts, ending last rep at **, 1 tr, 1 tr in top of beg 3 ch. Turn.

Rows 50 to 53 form patt for remainder of back.

Cont in patt as now set until back meas approx 49 (51, 53, 55, 57, 59, 59, 61, 63) cm, ending after a rep of patt row 51 (53, 51, 53, 51, 53, 53, 51, 53) has been worked.

Shape back neck

Row 1: Work in patt until 4th (5th, 5th, 7th, 7th, 8th, 9th, 9th, 10th) tr4tog has been made. Turn and leave rem sts unworked. Cont on these sts for first side of neck.

Row 2: 3 ch, miss next 2ch-sp, 2 tr in next st, 1 ch, miss 2ch-sp, 1 tr, work in patt to end. 3 (3, 4, 5, 6, 6, 7, 8, 8) patt reps of 7 sts plus 6 (9, 6, 9, 6, 9, 9, 6, 9) sts Fasten off.

Return to last complete row worked, miss next 5 (6, 6, 6, 6, 6, 7, 7, 8) 4-groups after last one worked into for first side of back neck, miss next [1 ch, 1 tr, 1 ch], join with sI st to first tr of next 4-tr group and cont as folls:

Row 1: 2 ch (does not count as st), miss st with join, 1 tr3tog, 2 ch, miss 1ch-sp, 1 tr, work in patt to end. Turn.

Row 2: Work in patt until tr has been worked into first tr4tog of previous row, 1 ch, miss 2ch-sp, 2 tr in next st, 1 tr in last st. 3 (3, 4, 5, 6, 6, 7, 8, 8) patt reps of 7 sts plus 6 (9, 6, 9, 6, 9, 9, 6, 9) sts Fasten off.

FRONT

Work as given for Back until 10 fewer rows have been worked than on Back to end of shoulder, ending after a rep of patt row 51 (53, 51, 53, 51, 53, 53, 51, 53) has been worked.

Shape front neck

Row 1: Work in patt until 5th (6th, 6th, 8th, 8th, 9th, 10th, 10th, 11th) tr4tog has been made. Turn and leave rem sts unworked. Cont on these sts for first side of neck.

Row 2: 3 ch (does not count as st), miss [1 tr4tog and 2ch-sp], 4 tr in next st, work in patt to end. Turn.

Row 3: Work in patt until tr4tog has been made over last 4-tr group. Turn. Rows 4-5: As rows 2-3.

Row 6: 3 ch, miss 2ch-sp, 4 tr in next st,

work in patt to end. Turn.

Row 7: Work in patt until tr4tog has been made over last 4-tr group, 1 tr in top of beg 3 ch. Turn.

Row 8: 3 ch, 1 tr in next tr4tog, work in patt to end. Turn. 3 (4, 4, 6, 6, 7, 8, 8, 9) patt reps of 7 sts plus 6 (3, 6, 3, 6, 3, 3, 6, 3) sts

Keeping patt correct as now set, work a further 2 rows. 3 (3, 4, 5, 6, 6, 7, 8, 8) patt reps of 7 sts plus 6 (9, 6, 9, 6, 9, 9, 6, 9) sts Fasten off.

Return to last complete row worked, miss next 3 (4, 4, 4, 4, 4, 5, 5, 6) 4-tr groups after last one worked into for first side of neck, miss next [1 ch, 1 tr, 1 ch], join with sl st to first tr of next 4-tr group and cont as folls:

Row 1: 2 ch (does not count as st), 1 tr3tog, 2 ch. miss 1ch-sp, 1 tr, 2 work in patt to end. Turn.

Row 2: Work in patt until 1 tr has been made in last tr4tog, 1 ch, miss 2ch-sp, 3 tr in next st, 1 tr2tog over [same tr as previous 3 tr, missing 2 ch, and top of tr3tog]. Turn.

Row 3: 3 ch (does not count as st), 1 tr3tog, 2 ch, miss 1ch-sp, 1 tr, work in patt to end. Turn.

Rows 4-5: As rows 2-3.

Row 6: Work in patt until 1 tr has been made into last tr4tog, 1 ch, miss 2ch-sp, 4 tr in next st, miss 2ch-sp, 1 tr in top of tr3tog. Turn.

Row 7: 3 ch, 1 tr4tog, work in patt to end.

Row 8: Work in patt until 1 tr has been made in last tr4tog, 1 tr in top of beg 3 ch. Turn. 3 (4, 4, 6, 6, 7, 8, 8, 9) patt reps of 7 sts plus 6 (3, 6, 3, 6, 3, 3, 6, 3) sts Keeping patt correct as now set, work a further 2 rows. 3 (3, 4, 5, 6, 6, 7, 8, 8) patt reps of 7 sts plus 6 (9, 6, 9, 6, 9, 9, 6, 9) sts Fasten off.

SLEEVES

Chain 66 (75, 81, 81, 90, 99, 99, 105, 105). Row 1 (WS): Starting in 2nd ch from hook, dc to end. Turn. 65 (74, 80, 80, 89, 98, 98, 104, 104) sts

Rows 2-7: Work rows 2-7 as given for Back.

SIZES XS, M, L, XL, 4X AND 5X ONLY

Row 8: 3 ch, 1 tr in first st, tr across to last st, 1 (-, 2, 2, 1, -, -, 2, 2) tr in last st. Turn. 66 (-, 82, 82, 90, -, -, 106, 106) sts

SIZES S, 2X & 3X ONLY:

Row 8: 3 ch, tr to end. Turn. - (74, -, -, -, 98, 98, -, -) sts

ALL SIZES:

Rows 9-12: Work rows 9-12 as given for Back.

SIZES XS, M, L, XL, 4X & 5X ONLY: Row 13: 1 ch, 1 dc, 1 dc2tog, dc across to last 1 (-, 3, 3, 1, -, -, 3, 3) sts, 0 (-, 1, 1, 0, -, -, 1, 1) dc2tog, 1 dc in top of beg 3 ch. Turn. 65 (-, 80, 80, 89, -, -, 104,

SIZES S, 2X & 3X ONLY:

Row 13: 1 ch, dc to end. Turn. - (74, -, -, -, 98, 98, -, -) sts

ALL SIZES:

104) sts

Rows 14-15: Work rows 2-3 as given for Back

SIZES L, XL, 2X, 3X, 4X & 5X ONLY: Rows 16-17: Work rows 2-3 as given for Back

ALL SIZES:

Sleeve should measure approx 11 (11, 11, 12, 12, 12, 12, 12, 12) cm. Fasten off.

Making Up

Join both shoulder seams using back stitch, or mattress stitch if preferred.

Neck edging

Rnd 1: With RS facing, join with sl st at neck edge of left shoulder seam, 1 ch, dc evenly around entire neck edge, ensuring number of dc worked is divisible by 6, join with sl st to beg dc. Do not turn.

Rnd 2 (RS): Miss st with join and next 2 sts, *6 tr in next st, miss 2 sts**, 1 sl st in next st, miss 2 sts; rep from * to end, ending last rep at **, join with sl st in same st as sl st at end of Rnd 1.

Fasten off.


Pm along side seam edges 17 (19, 21, 21, 23, 25, 25, 27, 27) cm down on from shoulder seams on each side edge to denote base of armhole openings. Sew last Rnd of Sleeves to side opening. Sew Front and Back tog along each side



Work as given for Neck Edging, joining yarn at base of sleeve seam.

Hem edging

King Cole Comfort DK 4 balls in Basil 1732 (MC) King Cole Big Value Baby 4-ply 1 ball each in pink 006 (CC1), lilac 017 (CC2), Blue Ice 3130 (CC3) & Primrose 003 (CC4) Turn to pages 66 & 67 to find your local stockist

About the yarn

Comfort DK DK; 310m per 100g ball; 60% acrylic, 40% nylon Baby 4-ply 4-ply; 400m per 100g ball; 100% acrylic

Tension

36 sts x 21 rows = 15cm measured over st patt with larger hook Tension is not critical for this project: however, finished measurements may differ to that described

Hooks used

3mm 4mm

Other supplies

stitch markers (optional)

Sizing

68.5x74cm

Use a st marker or waste varn to keep track of the first st/starting chain of each row and of first dc of border rnds. When working the mini puff stitches, keep your tension reasonably relaxed to achieve an even look and avoid pinching the stitches below. Use st markers to work out the placement of the butterflies.

If wanting to make a smaller or larger blanket, starting ch is a multiple of 8 + 2.

Beg 1 ch does not count as a st. Beg 3 ch counts as first tr.

Start crocheting...

Blanket

With MC and larger hook, chain 138.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, dc in back bump to end. Turn. 137 sts

Row 2: 3 ch, 3 tr in first st, miss 3 chs, 1 dc. *miss 3 chs. 7 tr in next st. miss 3 chs, 1 dc; rep from * to last 4 chs, miss 3 chs, 4 tr in last ch. Turn.

Row 3: 1 ch, dc to end. Turn.

Row 4: 3 ch. 2 tr. working around previous 2 tr, 1 PS in st at base of beg 3 ch, miss 1 st, *3 tr, working around previous 2 tr, 1 PS in st at base of 3rd tr back**, miss 1 st; rep from * to last st ending last rep at **, 1 tr. Turn.

Row 5: 3 ch. 2 tr, working around previous 2 tr, 1 PS in st at base of beg 3 ch, miss 1 st, *3 tr, working around previous 2 tr. 1 PS in st at base of 3rd tr back (in PS which tr was worked into)**, miss 1 st; rep from * to last st, ending last rep at **, 1 tr. Turn.

Row 6: As Row 3.

Blanket

Row 7: 1 ch, 1 dc, *3 ch, 1 tr7tog, 3 ch, 1 dc; rep from * to end, Turn, 137 sts Row 8: 1 ch, 1 dc, *miss 3ch-sp, 7 tr in next st, miss 3ch-sp, 1 dc; rep from * to end. Turn. 137 sts

Rows 9-12: Rep rows 3-6. Turn.

Row 13: 3 ch, 1 tr3tog, 3 ch, 1 dc, *3 ch, 1 tr7tog, 3 ch, 1 dc; rep from * to last 4 sts, 3 ch, 1 tr3tog, 1 tr. Turn. 137 sts

Row 14: 3 ch, 3 tr in next st, miss 3ch-sp, 1 dc, [miss 3ch-sp, 7 tr in next st, miss 3ch-sp, 1 dc] 16 times, miss last 3ch-sp, 3 tr in next st, 1 tr in top of beg 3 ch. Turn, 137 sts

Rows 15-85: Rep rows 3-14 five times then rep rows 3-13 once more.

Row 86: 1 ch, 1 dc, [3 dc into 3ch-sp, 1 dc] 34 times. Turn. 137 sts

Border

Note: Exact st count on each of the 2 row-end edges is not critical, work so fabric stays flat and there are the same number of odd number sts on each side; sts missed before and after rep on Rnd 9 may need to be adjusted if working a different number of sts in Rnd 1.

Rnd 1 (RS): 1 ch, *[1 dc, 2 ch, 1 dc] in first st (corner made), dc across to last st, [1 dc, 2 ch, 1 dc] in last st, rotate to work along row ends, evenly place 147 dc across edge, rotate to work along next edge; rep from * once more, join with sl st to beg dc. Do not turn (here and throughout). 572 sts

Rnd 2: SI st into corner 2ch-sp, 1 ch, {[1 dc, 2 ch, 1 dc] into corner 2ch-sp, *1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 dc; rep from * to next corner 2ch-sp} 4 times, join with sl st to beg dc. 292 sts

Rnd 3: SI st into corner 2ch-sp, 1 ch, {[1 dc. 2 ch. 1dcl into corner 2ch-sp. *1 ch. miss 1 st, 1 dc into next 1ch-sp; rep from * to next corner 2ch-sp} 4 times, join with sl st to beg dc. 296 sts

Rnds 4-7: Rep Rnd 3. 312 sts

Rnd 8: SI st into corner 2ch-sp, 1 ch, {[1 dc, 2 ch, 1 dc] into corner 2ch-sp, *1 dc, 1 dc into next 1ch-sp; rep from * to next corner 2ch-sp) 4 times, join with sl st to beg dc. 628 sts

Rnd 9: SI st into corner 2ch-sp, 3 ch, {[1 puff V-st, picot, 1 puff V-st] into corner 2ch-sp, miss 3 sts, 1 puff V-st, *miss 4 sts, 1 puff V-st; rep from to last 2 sts of side, miss 2 sts, [1 puff V-st, picot, 1 puff V-st] into corner 2ch-sp, **miss 4 sts, 1 puff V-st; rep from ** to last 3 sts of side, miss 3 sts} twice, join with sl st in



top of beg 3 ch. 132 puff V-sts

Finishing: Weave in ends and block before adding butterflies.

Butterflies

Make 15 in CC1, 16 in CC2 and 14 each in CC3 and CC4.

Add butterflies as desired.

Select 2 adjacent tr sts (1 pair from pattern rows 7 & 8 or 1 pair from pattern rows13 & 14). Two wings will be worked around each tr.

First 2-wing set: With smaller hook and leaving a long beg tail, join CC with sl st around post of either tr, [5 ch, 1 ttr, 1 dtr, 1 tr, 3 ch, 1 sl st (first wing of set made), 4 ch, 1 dtr, 1 tr, 3 ch, 1 sl st (2nd wing of set made)] around post of same st as join.

Second 2-wing set: Rotate to work around post of adjacent tr on next/ previous row, [1 sl st, 3 ch, 1 tr, 1 dtr, 4 ch, 1 sl st (first wing of set made), 3 ch, 1 tr, 1 dtr, 1 ttr, 5 ch, 1 sl st (2nd wing of set made)] around post of adjacent tr, join with sl st to tr first 2-wing set was worked around. Fasten off, leaving a long tail.

Optional: Weave long tails through the back of wings and with a single st in the tip of each wing, attach wings to Blanket to hold wings flat.

Finishing: Weave in ends. Block.

Alternative Butterfly

Follow these instructions if you prefer to crochet the butterflies separately and then attach them as an applique.

Rnd 1: Working into a magic ring, 5 ch, 1 ttr, 1 dtr, 1 tr, 3 ch, 1 sl st (first wing made), 4 ch, 1 dtr, 1 tr, 3 ch, 1 sl st (2nd wing made), 3 ch, 1 tr, 1 dtr, 4 ch, 1 sl st (3rd wing made), 3 ch, 1 tr, 1 dtr, 1 ttr, 5 ch, 1 sl st (4th wing made). Fasten off, leaving a long tail. Pull beg tail tight to close ring, leaving tail.

Use tails to sew Butterfly onto Blanket.

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We catch up with Sarah-Jayne's recent busy month and she takes us through the lovely textured forked cluster stitch www.bellacococrochet.com

t's been quite a busy period here at Bella Coco Studios and I've had a few huge projects I've been working on. It's really nice to finally be able to start sharing them!

Not the High Street

First of all, part two of my 'Not the High Street' series. You may have seen my extremely popular 'Not the High Street tote bag', which I made based on a crocheted bag that I had in a shop on the high street which was being sold for super cheap. I think it's so important to spread awareness of why cheap crochet makes are a big no-no! We all know how much time and effort goes into making a crochet item, so it gets you thinking about the people behind this mass-produced market and how little they must be being paid to be able to afford to sell this so cheaply. I'm sure you are aware that machines cannot crochet.

As I result of the popularity of the tote bag, we got to work on another project - this time a poncho! This granny square poncho is such a satisfying make and the meaning behind it is ever more prevalent with the

rise of crochet fashion in the stores. Every day we are seeing more and more crochet fashion items in the shops. If you want to find out more about this, you can head to the blog by scanning my QR code.

I've also been working on my second book, which is very exciting but no small task! I won't reveal the concept of the book just vet, but I will say that it's got some of my favourite stitches included in it: the forked cluster being one of them which I'm sharing with you in this month's magazine.





CROCHET MASTERCLASS

Forked cluster stitch (fc) Work stitches in a multiple of 1 + 4



Row 1: Yarn over and insert hook into 4th ch from the hook (missed chs do not count as a stitch) Pull up a loop. 3 loops on hook



Yarn over and insert hook into the next chain.



Pull up a loop. 5 loops on hook



Yarn over pull through 3 loops. 3 loops on hook



Yarn over pull through remaining 3 loops. First FC made



Yarn over and insert into the same chain as last stitch made. 3 loops on hook



Yarn over and insert hook into the next chain, pull up a loop. 5 loops on hook



Yarn over pull through 3 loops. 3 loops on hook



Yarn over pull through remaining 3 loops. Second FC made





Continue making FC until you reach your last stitch ends in the last chain. Tc in the same chain. Turn.

Row 2: Ch 1 (does not count as stitch) dc in each st across. Turn.

Row 3: Ch 3 (does not count as a st) FC. Turn.

Repeat rows 2 & 3 until you reach your desired size.

small amount of dark brown DK yarn small amount of 4-ply coral pink yarn 1 pair each 5mm and 4mm mushroom-shaped amigurumi eye beads, thread to sew beads tapestry needle toy stuffing

Sizing

12cm

Leave a long end for parts which require assembly. Join each round with a sl st to beg dc.

Beg 1 ch does not count as a st. The first ch of each round is added to see where the round starts and is for marking purposes. If you are used to amigurumi projects and want to have a smoother finish, feel free to omit the chain and use a stitch marker instead

Rnd 9: 1 ch, dc around, join.

Rnd 10: 1 ch, [8 dc, 2 dc in next st] twice, 8 dc, join. 28 sts

Rnd 11: 1 ch, 9 dc, 2 dc in next st, 8 dc, 2 dc in next st, 9 dc, join. 30 sts

Rnd 12: 1 ch, [4 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times, ioin. 36 sts

Rnd 13: 1 ch. dc around, join,

Rnd 20: 1 ch, [2 dc, 1 dc2tog] 6 times, join. Stuff.

Rnd 21: 1 ch, [1 dc, 1 dc2tog] 6 times, join.

Rnd 22: 1 ch, 6 dc2tog, join. Fasten off.

Work as for Head through Rnd 4. 24 sts

Rnd 5: 1 ch, [3 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times, ioin. 30 sts

Rnd 6: 1 ch, [4 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times, ioin, 36 sts

Rnds 7-9: 1 ch, dc around, join.

Rnd 10: 1 ch, [4 dc, 1 dc2tog] 6 times, join.

Rnd 11: 1 ch, dc around, join.

Rnds 13-15: 1 ch, dc around, join.

Rnd 16: 1 ch. [4 dc, 1 dc2otg] 4 times, join. 20 sts

Fasten off.

Arms (make 2)

Rnd 1: With MC and working into a magic ring, 6 dc, join. 6 sts

Rnd 2: 1 ch, dc around, join.

Rnd 3: 1 ch, [2 dc, 2 dc in next st] twice, join. 8 sts

Rnd 4: 1 ch, dc around, join.

Rnd 5: 1 ch, [3 dc, 2 dc in next st] twice, join. 10 sts

Rnds 6-11: 1 ch, dc around, join. Fasten off.

Legs (make 2)

Rnd 1: With MC and working into a magic ring, 6 dc, join. 6 sts

Rnd 2: 1 ch. [2 dc in next st] 6 times, join. 12 sts

Rnd 3: 1 ch, dc around, join.

Rnd 4: 1 ch, [4 dc, 1 dc2tog] twice, join.

Rnd 5: 1 ch, dc around, join.

Fasten off.

Ears (make 2)

Row 1: With MC and working into a magic ring, 5 dc, do not join. Turn.

Row 2: 1 ch, [2 dc in next st] 5 times. Turn. 10 sts

Row 3: 1 ch, 3 dc, 2 dc in next st, 2 dc, 2 dc

Toys

in next st, 3 dc. Turn. 12 sts

Row 4: 1 ch. 3 dc. 2 dc in next st. 4 dc. 2 dc in next st, 3 dc. Turn. 14 sts

Row 5: 1 ch, 6 dc, [2 dc in next st] twice, 6 dc. Turn. 16 sts

Row 6: 1 ch, 5 dc, 2 dc in next st, 4 dc, 2 dc in next st, 5 dc. Turn. 18 sts Fasten off.

Nose

Rnd 1: With CC and working into a magic ring, 6 dc, join. 6 sts

Rnd 2: 1 ch, dc around, join.

Rnd 3: 1 ch, 4 dc, 1 dc2tog, join. 5 sts Fasten off.

Tail

Work as for Leg through Rnd 3. 12 sts Striff

Rnd 4: 1 ch. 6 dc2tog, join, Fasten off.

Making Up

Use photo as a guide. Sew Ears along straight edge to side and top of Head, sew Nose vertically in centre of Head, centred between Ears, Sew 6mm eve beads on either side of Nose. With pink 4-ply varn, embroider cheeks. Stuff Body and sew Head to Body. Sew Legs and Arms to Body. With brown DK yarn, embroider lines on hands and feet for claws. Sew Tail to back of Body.

BABY Head

Rnd 1: With MC and working into a magic ring, 5 dc, join. 5 sts

Rnd 2: 1 ch, [2 dc in next st] 5 times, join.

Rnd 3: 1 ch, [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] 5 times, join. 15 sts

Rnd 4: 1 ch, dc around, join.

Rnd 5: 1 ch, [2 dc, 2 dc in next st] 5 times. ioin. 20 sts

Rnds 6-7: 1 ch, dc around, join.

Rnd 8: 1 ch, [2 dc, 1 dc2tog] 5 times, join. 15 sts

Stuff

Rnd 9: 1 ch, [1 dc, 1 dc2tog] 5 times, join.

Rnd 10: 1 ch, 5 dc2tog, join. 5 sts Fasten off.

Body

Work as for Head through Rnd 3. 15 sts Rnds 4-5: 1 ch, dc around, join.

Rnd 6: 1 ch, [1 dc, 1 dc2tog] 5 times, join. 10 sts

Rnd 7: 1 ch, dc around, join. Fasten off.

Being True to Yourself Through Yarn

I am one of the lucky ones who get to engage in craft full-time, but there is a small downside to it - the accumulation of craft materials. Last year, I decided that it was time to clear out and unbox all my samples and yarn stash. Not only the sample amounts but discovering how my style has changed over the years was a revelation. And here comes the pledge. I am going to be truer to myself.

Being somewhat ecology conscious, I do not support fast fashion, but when it comes to craft fibres. I could not always make sustainable choices due to commission requests. I had so much





non-biodegradable, non-compostable, non-recyclable stuff! It was utterly overwhelming and I was losing the motivation to create new designs.

Kindly, the Crochet Now team offered me this Tencel varn to try out. Tencel is one of the most eco-friendly fibres around, made from sustainably harvested eucalyptus trees. My husband suggested making koalas to go with the eucalyptus. I have no idea why, but he knows quite a lot about koalas and went on about koala facts for some time!

I thought plant fibres could be heavy and stiff, but Elements has 40% wool and is surprisingly soft. It has an attractive sheen to it, which makes this yarn unique. It quickly became my favourite and I'm feeling excited to create more projects!

Arms & Legs (make 4)

With MC, chain 4.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 3 dc. Turn, 3 sts

Rows 2-3: 1 ch, dc across. Turn. Fasten off.

Ears (make 2)

Row 1: With MC and working into a magic ring, 4 dc, do not join. Turn. 4 sts

Row 2: 1 ch. [2 dc in next st] 4 times. Turn. 2 sts

Row 3: 1 ch. 2 dc. [2 dc in next st. 2 dc] twice. Turn. 10 sts Fasten off

Tail

Rnd 1: With MC and working into a magic ring, 6 dc, join. Fasten off.

Making Up

Use photo as a guide. Fold Arms and Legs in half lengthwise and sew edges tog before sewing to Body. Make up as for

Mama using 5mm eye beads. Sew Head to Mama's Head and then sew Body to Mama's Head.





Lankava Frotee loopy craft yarn 4 balls each in Burnt Orange 58 (A) & Baby Pink 81 (B)

About the yarn

Super chunky; 200m per 1.2kg ball; 80% recycled cotton, 20% polyester

Tension

7 sts x 7 rows = 10cm measured over dc

Hook used

9mm

Other supplies

1 gold-coloured brass ring, 18cm diameter hot-glue gun

Sizing

130cm wide x 220cm long

Colours draw our attention first when we walk into a space, so if you have something bold and colourful in your home, people tend to gather around it without even realising. In the Kaunokki rug, I have combined two bright colours, pink and orange. The rug is worked back and forth in double crochet, carrying the other yarn inside the stitches throughout the work. Make sure not to pull the carry-on yarn too tight, keep it loose. Leave the carry-on yarn one stitch from the end of each row to make sure the yarn loops will not show on the right side of the work. Change the colour of the varn in the last yarn round hook of the stitch before the colour change.


Read RS rows of chart from right to left and WS rows from left to right. One pattern repeat is 30 sts wide and 34 rows high.

Start crocheting...

With A and leaving an 8m beg tail (for sl st edging), chain 95.

Row 1 (RS): Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 1 dc, beg working over B, cont with 15 dc in A, [change to B, 2 dc in B, change to A,

Chart



28 dc in A] twice, change to B, 2 dc in B, change to A, 16 dc in A, leaving B one st from the end on WS. Turn. 94 sts

Rows 2-4: With A, 1 ch (counts as first st here and to end), beg working over B, 15 dc in A, [change to B, 2 dc in B, change to A, 28 dc in A) twice, change to B, 2 dc in B, change to A, 16 dc in A, leaving B one st from the end on WS. Turn.

Row 5: With A, 1 ch, beg working over B, 4 dc, [change to B, 5 dc, change to A, 6 dc, change to B, 2 dc, change to A, 6 dc, change to B, 5 dc, change to A, 6 dc]

3 times omitting last dc on last rep and leaving B one st from the end on WS. Turn. Row 6: As Row 5.

Rows 7-142: Following chart for colour changes, 1 ch, beg working over B, dc across to last st, leave B on WS of work, 1

Row 143: 1 ch (counts as first sl st), sl st across. Fasten off.

Edging

Row 1: With long beg tail, as for Row 143. : Weave in ends. @

The larger hook creates a softly draping fabric that may feel a little too open. Bear with it. The final round of the border is worked with the smaller hook to pull things together neatly. This pattern is worked widthways on long rows.

Row 3 (RS): Pick up MC. 4 ch (counts as first RdtrF), 1 RtrF, 1 RhtrF, 2 RdcF, 1 RhtrF, 1 RtrF, 1 RdtrF, *1 RdtrF, 1 RtrF, 1 RhtrF, 2 RdcF, 1 RhtrF, 1 RtrF, 1 RdtrF; rep from * across. Turn.

Row 4: 4 ch (counts as first dtr), 1 tr, 1 htr, 2 dc, 1 htr, 1 tr, 1 dtr, *1 dtr, 1 tr, 1 htr, 2 dc, 1 htr, 1 tr, 1 dtr; rep from * across, changing to CC in last st. Turn.

Row 5: As Row 2.

Row 6: Pick up MC, 1 ch, *1 RdcF, 1 RhtrF, 1 RtrF, 2 RdtrF, 1 RtrF, 1 RhtrF, 1 RdcF; rep from * across. Turn.

Rows 7-9: Rep rows 1-3.

Waffle Section 2

Row 1: 3 ch, tr across. Turn.

Rows 2-10: Rep Row 2 of Waffle Section 1. Do not fasten off.

Rep Wave Section and Waffle Section 2 once more.

Do not fasten off.

Border

Rnd 1: With MC, 1 ch, dc across to last st, 3 dc in last st, pm in centre dc of 3 dc just made for corner, work 56 dc evenly along

short edge, 3 dc in first st of long side, pm in centre dc of 3 dc just made for corner, dc to last st, 3 dc in last st, pm in centre dc of 3 dc just made for corner, work 56 dc evenly along short edge, 2 dc same st as first st, pm in last st made for corner, join with sl st to beg dc, changing to CC. 568 sts Move corner markers up as you go.

Rnd 2: With CC, 1 ch, [224 dc, 3 dc in marked corner st, 58 dc, 3 dc in marked corner st] twice, join with sl st to beg dc, changing to MC in last sl st. 576 sts

Rnd 3: With MC, sl st in next st, 3 ch, working in BLO, 1 beg-cl, *work cl across long side ending in marked st, starting in same marked st, work cl across short side ending in next marked st, starting in same marked st; rep from * once more, 1 cl, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch, move markers to sp between corner cls. 114 cl on each long side, 31 cl on each short side

Rnd 4: With CC, 2 ch (counts as 1 dc, 1 ch), [1 dc in sp between next 2 cls, 1 ch, miss 1 cl] to marked corner sp, [1 dc, 1 ch, 1 dc] in marked sp, *1 ch, miss 1 cl, [1 dc in sp between next 2 cls, 1 ch, miss 1 cl] to marked corner sp, [1 dc, 1 ch, 1 dc] in corner sp; rep from * twice more, 1 ch, miss last cl, join with sl st in first of beg 2 ch. 294 dc

Fasten off CC.

Rnd 5: With MC and missing each dc, sl st into first 1ch-sp, 5 ch (counts as 1 dtr, 1 ch), working behind beg 5 ch, 1 dtr into prev 1ch-sp, *work 1 x-dtr across to next corner 1ch-sp, starting and ending in corner 1ch-sp [1 x-tr, 3 ch, 1 x-tr] over corner; rep from * around, join with sl st in 4th of beg 5 ch. 115 x-dtr on each long side, 32 x-dtr on each short side.

Rnd 6: With smaller hook, 1 ch, 1 dc in each dtr and ch around, join with sl st to beg dc.

Raised double crochet front (RdcF): Work the double crochet around the post of the stitch inserting hook from front to back to front again

Beginning horizontal cluster (beg-cl): Yrh, insert hook in next st, yrh, pul, yrh, draw through 2 loops on hook (2 loops on hook, partial tr made), *yrh, insert hook right to left under [beg 3 ch and partial tr], yrh, pul; rep from * once more, yrh, draw through all 6 loops on hook

Except for the strap, the entirety of this bag is done using tapestry crochet skills. The sts are the same as regular crochet, except you carry another strand of yarn under the sts being made. This will make your fabric firmer, ensuring your bag can stand up to whatever you need to carry!

Place a st marker on the first st of each round. moving the marker up each round. Starting with the 1st chevron round, remove the stitch marker before you do the last dc2tog. Once it is complete, work the first dc of the next round and replace the marker. When switching colours, make the final yarn over of your last dc2tog of the round using the new colour. This will make the colour changes seamless. When switching your carrying yarn at the colour change, leave a 5cm tail. Once you have carried it for about 5-6 sts, pull until the tail is hidden under the sts. Now you won't have an end to weave in!

Start crocheting...

Rnd 1: Working into a magic ring with A, 1 dc, pm, 7 dc. 8 sts

Carry the tail and B from this point on.

Rnd 2: 2 dc in each stitch around. 16 sts Rnd 3: [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] around. 24 sts

Rnd 4: [2 dc, 2 dc in next st] around. 32 sts

Rnd 5: [3 dc, 2 dc in next st] around. 40 sts

Rnd 6: [4 dc, 2 dc in next st] around. 48 sts

Rnd 7: [5 dc, 2 dc in next st] around. 56 sts Rnd 8: [6 dc, 2 dc in next st] around. 64 sts

Rnd 9: [7 dc, 2 dc in next st] around. 72 sts

Rnd 10: [8 dc, 2 dc in next st] around. 80 sts Rnd 11: [9 dc, 2 dc in next st] around. 88 sts

Rnd 12: [10 dc, 2 dc in next st] around. 96 sts

Rnd 13: [11 dc. 2 dc in next st] around. 104 sts

Rnd 14: [12 dc, 2 dc in next st] around. 112 sts

Rnd 15: [13 dc, 2 dc in next st] around. 120 sts

Rnd 16: [14 dc. 2 dc in next st] around. 128 sts

Rnd 17: [15 dc, 2 dc in next st] around. 136 sts

Rnd 18: [16 dc, 2 dc in next st] around. 144 sts

Rnd 19: [17 dc, 2 dc in next st] around. 152 sts

Rnd 20: [18 dc, 2 dc in next st] around. 160 sts

Rnd 21: [19 dc, 2 dc in next st] around. 168 sts

Rnd 22: [20 dc, 2 dc in next st] around. 176 sts

Rnd 23: [21 dc, 2 dc in next st] around. 184 sts

Rnd 24: Dc around to last st. 2 dc in last st. 185 sts

Rnd 25: As Rnd 24. 186 sts Rnds 26-29: Dc around. Fasten off and break A.

Chevron

Rnd 30: With B and carrying C. 5 dc*. 3 dc in next st, 6 dc, [dc2tog] twice**, 6 dc. Repeat from * across ending last rep at **.

Rnd 31: {6 dc, 3 dc in next st, 6 dc, [dc2tog] twice) around.

Rnds 32-38: As Rnd 31

Fasten off and break B. Rnds 39-47: With C and carrying D, as Rnd 31

Fasten off and break

Rnds 48-56: With D and carrying E, as Rnd 31.

Fasten off and break D.

Rnds 57-65: With E and carrying F, as Rnd 31.

Fasten off and break E.

Rnds 66-74: With F and carrying B, as Rnd 31.

Strap

Drop the carrying yarn and continue with

Row 1: 6 dc, 3 dc in next st, 6 dc. Turn. Row 2: 1 ch, 1 dc, dc2tog, 4 dc, 3 dc in next st, 4 dc, dc2tog, 1 dc. Turn.

Rows 3-8: As Row 2.

Rows 9-16: Changing to E, as Row 2. Rows 17-24: Changing to D, as Row 2.

Rows 25-32: Changing to C, as Row 2.

Rows 33-40: Changing to B, as Row 2.

Rows 41-56: Changing to A, as Row 2.

Rows 57-64: Changing to B. as Row 2. Rows 65-72: Changing to C, as Row 2.

Rows 73-80: Changing to D, as Row 2.

Rows 81-88: Changing to E, as Row 2. Rows 89-96: Changing to F, as Row 2.

Edging

Fasten off and break varn, leaving a 45cm tail. Line up the point of the strap on the opposite side of the bag at a decrease in the chevron. There should be five chevron points between each end of the strap. Using the tail, sew the end of the strap to the bag.

Rnd 1: With right side facing cont with tail up the long edge of the strap, 8 dc along the F-coloured section of the strap, join F from the ball (instead of the tail), 8 dc per colour section to A section, 16 dc in the A section, 8 dc per colour section, dc across the top of the bag to beg.

Fasten off and break yarn. Work the other side of the bag as Rnd 1 using F from the ball (not the tail).

Fasten off and break yarn. Weave in ends.

Row 3: 2 ch, *3 tr, 2 tr in next st, 2 tr; rep from * to last st, 1 tr. 58 sts

Row 4: 2 ch, *3 tr, 2 tr in next st, 3 tr; rep from * to last st, 1 tr. 66 sts

Row 5: 2 ch. *4 tr. 2 tr in next st: rep from * 11 times more, tr to end, 78 sts

Row 6: 2 ch, 1 tr, *5 tr, 2 tr in next st; rep from * 11 times more, tr to end. 90 sts Row 7: 2 ch. *6 tr. 2 tr in next st; rep from

* 11 times more, tr to end, 102 sts Row 8: 2 ch, *7 tr, 2 tr in next st; rep from

* 11 times more, tr to end. 114 sts


Next Row: 2 ch, 15 dc, miss 24 sts (for sleeve), 34 dc, miss 24 st (for sleeve), 16 dc. Turn. 66 sts



SOUARE NECK CARDIGAN **Bodice**

Worked in one piece, starting at back. With A and 3.5 (4) mm hook, chain 37.

Row 1 (WS): Starting in 2nd ch from hook, dc across. 36 dc

Row 2: 1 ch, dc across.

Rows 3-11: Rep Row 2.

Row 12: 1 ch (counts as first dc here and to end), 9 dc, leave rem 26 sts unworked. Turn. 10 sts

Rows 13-21: Rep Row 12.

Row 22: 1 ch. 9 dc. 9 ch (for Right Front Neck), Turn.

Row 23: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 8 dc (across ch), dc to end. 18 sts

Rows 24-32: 1 ch, dc across.

Fasten off.

With RS of work facing, miss centre 16 dc (for back neck), join varn in next st.

Rows 12-20: 1 ch (counts as first dc). dc to end. Turn. 10 sts Row 21: 1 ch, 9 dc, 9 ch (for Left Front

Neck). Turn. Row 22: Starting in 2nd ch from hook,

8 dc (across ch), dc to end. 18 sts Rows 23-32: 1 ch, dc across. Fasten off.

Body

Worked across Left Front, Back, then Right Front.

With RS of work facing, with 3.5 (4) mm hook, join B in lower edge of Left Front of Bodice.

Row 1: 2 ch, 1 tr, *miss 2 sts, [2 tr, 1 ch, 2 tr] in next st; rep from * to last 4 sts, miss 2 sts, 2 tr. Turn.

Row 2: 2 ch, 1 tr, *[2 tr, 1 ch, 2 tr] into next 1ch-sp; rep from * to last 2 sts, 2 tr. Turn.


Rep Row 2 until work measures 22cm from top of shoulder. Fasten off.

Sleeves (both alike)

Worked in rows onto Bodice, then seamed at the end. With 3.5 (4) mm hook, join B at armhole edge.

Row 1: 2 ch, 1 tr in next dc row end, miss 2 dc row ends, [2 tr, 1 ch, 2 tr] in next row end, *miss 3 dc row ends, [2 tr, 1 ch, 2 tr] in next row end; rep from * to last 4 row ends, miss 2 dc row ends, [1 tr in next row end) twice. Turn.

Row 2: 2 ch, 1 tr in next st, *[2 tr, 1 ch, 2 tr] into 1ch-sp; rep from * to last 2 sts,



2 tr. Turn.

Rep Row 2 until sleeve measures 10 (11) cm from start.

Change to 3 (3.5) mm hook.

Next 2 Rows: 1 ch, dc across. Turn. Fasten off

MAKING UP (both designs)

With 3 (3.5) mm hook and RS facing, join matching colour to neck edge on Left Front.

Row 1: 1 ch, dc evenly down front. Turn. Row 2: 1 ch, dc across. Fasten off. Mark positions for buttons, the first one

at lower edge of Bodice and top one 1cm from neck and rem 2 (for Round Neck Cardigan) or 1 (for Square Neck Cardigan) equally spaced between.

With 3 (3.5) mm hook and RS facing, join same colour as Left Front Edging to bottom of hem on Right Front.

Row 1: 1 ch, dc evenly up front. Turn. Row 2: 1 ch, dc across, working [1 ch, miss 1 st] for buttonholes to correspond with positions marked on Left Front.

Sew sleeve seams tog.

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author, such an amazingly proud feeling and massive achievement – especially when I look back at the time I wrote It whilst homeschooling two children as we muddled our way through a global pandemic!


