

YOU WILL NEED

☐King Cole Merino Blend DK (100% pure new wool, 50g/104m)

For yarn quantities and measurements see size table

- □ A pair of 3.75mm needles
- □ A pair of 4mm needles
- □ A set of 3.75mm circular needles, 40cm long
- □ Stitch holders
- □ Stitch marker

TENSION

22 sts and 28 rows to measure 10x10cm (4x4in) over st st using 4mm needles

18 sts and 28 rows to measure 10x10cm (4x4in) over Sleeve pattern using 4mm needles after blocking



LACE-SLEEVE SWEATER

Note When shaping Sleeves, only work yarnovers in pattern when they will sit at least 2 sts in from the edge and can be paired with a k2tog or ssk in pattern. Work in st st when you can't work an inc/ dec pair.

BACK

Cast on 100 (104: 112: 118: 124: 128: 134: 140: 146: 152) sts using 3.75mm needles.

Row 1 (RS) K1, ktbl 4 (3: 4: 4: 4: 3: 3: 3: 3: 3) times, (kltbl, P1, yo, ssk, P1, k1tbl) to last 5 (4: 5: 5: 5: 4: 4: 4: 4: 4) sts, ktbl 4 (3: 4: 4: 4: 3: 3: 3: 3: 3) times, K1.

Row 2 (WS) P1, ptbl 4 (3: 4: 4: 4: 3: 3: 3: 3) times, (p1tbl, K1, P2, K1, pltbl) to last 5 (4: 5: 5: 5: 4: 4: 4: 4: 4) sts, ptbl 4 (3: 4: 4: 4: 3: 3: 3: 3:

Row 3 K1, ktbl 4 (3: 4: 4: 4: 3: 3: 3: 3: 3) times, (kltbl, P1, k2tog, yo, P1, k1tbl) to last 3 (2: 2: 2: 2: 4: 4: 4: 4) sts, ktbl 4 (3: 4: 4: 4: 3: 3: 3: 3: 3) times, K1.

Row 4 As Row 2.

Rep Rows 1 to 4 another 5 (5: 5: 5: 5: 6: 6: 6: 6: 6) times.


Change to 4mm needles.

Cont in st st, starting with a K row, work straight for 6 rows.

Next row K1, ssk, K to last 3 sts, k2tog, K1. [2 sts dec'd] Cont to dec at each end as set on the 2 foll 10th rows.

[94 (98: 106: 112: 118: 122: 128: 134: 140: 146) sts] Work straight for 11 (11: 11: 9: 9: 9: 9: 7: 7: 7) rows. Next row (RS) K1, M1, knit to last st, M1, K1. [2 sts inc'd] Cont to inc at each end as set on the 2 foll 10th rows. [100 (104: 112: 118: 124: 128: 134: 140: 146: 152) sts]

Work straight until 70 (70: 68: 68: 68: 68: 70: 68: 68: 66) st st rows are complete.

SHAPE RAGLAN

Keeping patt correct, **cast off** 3 (3: 4: 4: 5: 5: 6: 7: 8) sts at beg of next two rows. [94 (98: 104: 110: 116: 118: 124: 128: 132: 136) sts]

Next row (RS) K1, kltbl, ssk, knit to last 4 sts, k2tog, kltbl, K1.
[2 sts dec'd]

Next row P1, pltbl, P to last 2 sts, pltbl, P1.***
Cont to dec at each end as every foll RS row another 22 (24: 25: 25: 24: 26: 26: 28: 29: 31) times, ending after a RS row.
[48 (48: 52: 58: 66: 64: 70: 70: 72: 72) sts]

Next row (WS) P1, p1tbl, p2tog, P to last 4 sts, p2tog tbl, p1tbl, P1. Cont to dec on every foll row to 38 (42: 42: 44: 44: 46: 46: 48: 48: 50) sts.

Cast off rem sts.

FRONT

Work as for Back to ***.

[92 (96: 102: 108: 114: 116: 122: 126: 130: 134) sts]
Cont to dec at each end of every foll RS row another 17 (18: 20: 20: 21: 22: 22: 24: 25: 26) times, ending after a WS row.
[58 (60: 62: 68: 72: 72: 78: 78: 80: 82) sts]

SHAPE NECK

Note When shaping neck as given below, work raglan decs a total of another 5 (6: 5: 5: 3: 4: 4: 4: 4: 5) times on RS rows and then work raglan decs on every foll row another 3 (1: 3: 5: 9: 7: 10: 9: 10: 9) times.

Next row (RS) K1, k1tbl, ssk, K15 (14: 15: 18: 19: 19: 22: 21: 22: 23) sts and leave on holder, cast off next 20 (24: 24: 24: 26: 26: 26: 28: 28) sts, K to last 4 sts, k2tog, k1tbl, K1.

Turn and cont on last 18 (17: 18: 21: 22: 22: 25: 24: 25: 26) sts for right neck only.

SHAPE RIGHT NECK

Next row P to last 3 sts, p2tog tbl, P1. [1 st dec'd at neck edge] Next row K1, ssk, K to last 4 sts, k2tog, k1tbl, K1. [2 sts dec'd; 1 st at neck edge and 1 st at raglan edge]

STEP-BY-STEP SSK SLIP, SLIP, KNIT



Working with the yarn at the back of your knitting, insert the point of the right-hand needle into the next stitch as if to knit, but instead slip the first stitch onto the right-hand needle.



Now slip the next stitch from the left-hand needle onto the right-hand needle in the same way as for Step 1.



 Push the point of the left-hand needle through the front of both the slipped stitches.



Bring the yarn around just as you would for a knit stitch and knit these two stitches together. You will now have a single stitch on the right-hand needle, and your two slipped ones will create a left-leaning decrease.

* LACE-SLEEVE SWEATER



Working another 3 (4: 3: 3: 1: 2: 2: 2: 2: 3) raglan decs on RS rows and another 3 (1: 3: 5: 9: 7: 10: 9: 10: 9) raglan decs on every foll row, AND AT THE SAME TIME dec at neck edge every foll row another 5 (5: 5: 6: 5: 6: 6: 6: 6: 7) times. Note that you will still have ragian decs to make after neck decs are complete.

When all ragian decs are complete, you should have 4 sts rem. Work as foll:

Next row K2tog, k1tbl, K1. [3 sts] Next row P1, p2tog. [2 sts] Cast off rem 2 sts.

SHAPE LEFT NECK

With WS facing rejoin yarn to sts from holder, P1, p2tog, patt to end. [1 st dec'd at neck edge]

Next row (RS) K1, ssk, K to last 3 sts, k2tog, K1. [2 sts dec'd; 1 st at neck edge and 1 st at ragian edge]

Working another 3 (4: 3: 3: 1: 2: 2: 2: 2: 3) raglan decs on RS rows and another 3 (1: 3: 5: 9: 7: 10: 9: 10: 9) raglan decs on every foll row, AND AT THE SAME TIME dec at neck edge every foll row another 5 (5: 5: 6: 5: 6: 6: 6: 6: 7) times. Note that you will still have raglan decs to make after neck decs are complete.

When all ragian decs are complete, you should have 4 sts rem. Work as foll:

Next row K1, k1tbl, ssk. [3 sts] Next row P2tog, P1. [2 sts] Cast off rem 2 sts.

SLEEVES

Cast on 38 (38: 38: 40: 40: 40: 44: 44: 46) sts using 3.75mm

Row 1 (RS) K1, ktbl 3 (3: 3: 4: 4: 4: 3: 3: 3: 4) times, (kltbl, P1, yo, ssk, P1, k1tbl) to last 4 (4: 4: 5: 5: 5: 4: 4: 4: 5) sts, ktbl 3 (3: 3: 4: 4: 4: 4: 3: 3: 3: 4) times, K1.

Row 2 (WS) P1, ptbl 3 (3: 3: 4: 4: 4: 3: 3: 3: 4) times, (pltbl, K1, P2, K1, pltbl) to last 4 (4: 4: 5: 5: 5: 4: 4: 4: 5) sts, ptbl 3 (3: 3: 4: 4: 4: 3: 3: 3: 4) times, P1.

Row 3 K1, ktbl 3 (3: 3: 4: 4: 4: 3: 3: 3: 4) times, (kltbl, P1, k2tog, yo, P1, k1tbl) to last 4 (4: 4: 5: 5: 5: 4: 4: 4: 5) sts, ktbl 3 (3: 3: 4: 4: 4: 3: 3: 3: 4) times, K1.

Row 4 As Row 2.

These 4 rows set Sleeve pattern repeat.

Cont straight in patt as set for another 16 (16: 16: 16: 18: 18: 18: 20: 20: 20) rows.

Change to 4mm needles.

Cont in patt for another 8 rows.

Next row (RS) K1, M1, patt to last st, M1, K1.

[40 (40: 40: 42: 42: 42: 46: 46: 46: 48) sts]

Cont to inc at each end as set on every foll 10th (8th: 8th: 8th: 8th: 6th: 6th: 6th: 4th: 4th) Row 5 (2: 6: 2: 10: 5: 5: 4: 2: 2) times, taking increased stitches into pattern (see note).

[50 (44: 52: 46: 62: 52: 56: 54: 50: 52) sts]

Then inc at each end of every foll 12th (10th: 10th: 10th: 10th: 8th: 8th: 8th: 6th: 6th) Row 2 (6: 3: 6: 0: 6: 6: 7: 12: 12) times to 54 (56: 58: 58: 62: 64: 68: 68: 74: 76) sts.

Work straight for another 19 (17: 19: 21: 17: 19: 21: 21: 21: 23) rows, ending after a WS row.

SHAPE RAGLAN

Keeping patt correct cast off 3 (3: 4: 4: 4: 5: 5: 6: 7: 8) sts at beg of next two rows. [48 (50: 50: 50: 54: 54: 58: 56: 60: 60) sts] Next row (RS) K1, k1tbl, ssk, patt to last 4 sts, k2tog, k1tbl, K1.

[46 (48: 48: 48: 52: 52: 56: 54: 58: 58) sts]

Next row P1, pltbl, P to last 2 sts, pltbl, P1.

Cont to dec at each end as set on every foll 4th row 8 (8: 10: 11: 10: 11: 13: 16: 15: 17) times and then on every foll RS row to 14 (14: 14: 14: 14: 14: 20: 20: 20: 20) sts, ending after a WS row.

Next row Ssk, patt to last 2 sts, k2tog.

Place rem 12 (12: 12: 12: 12: 18: 18: 18) sts on holder.

NECKBAND

Block pieces gently to measurements, and to open out lace Sleeve pattern, following any care instructions on the ballband. Join all raglan seams.

With RS facing, and using 3.75mm circular, work across left Sleeve as folls: (kltbl, P1, K2, P1, kltbl) 2 (2: 2: 2: 2: 2: 3: 3: 3: 3) times, then pick up and knit 42 (44: 44: 42: 48: 46: 46: 50: 56: 54) sts evenly around front neck, work across right Sleeve as folls: (kltbl, P1, yo, ssk, P1, kltbl) 2 (2: 2: 2: 2: 2: 3: 3: 3: 3) times, then pick up and knit 36 (40: 40: 42: 42: 44: 44: 46: 46: 48) sts across back neck. [102 (108: 108: 108: 114: 114: 126: 132: 138: 138) sts]

Pm and cont working in the round.

Round 1 (Kltbl, Pl, k2tog, yo, Pl, kltbl) to end.

Round 2 (K1tbl, P1, K2, P1, k1tbl) to end.

Round 3 (Kltbl, Pl, yo, ssk, Pl, kltbl) to end.

Round 4 As Round 2.

These 4 rounds set pattern rep.

Cont in patt until 9 (9: 9: 9: 13: 13: 13: 17) rounds are complete. Cast off in patt.

MAKING UP

Weave in ends. Join Sleeve seams and side seams using mattress stitch.

SHEEP SOCKS

Notes Make sure to maintain tension in the charted colourwork, changing needle size if necessary to match the st st tension.

SOCKS (MAKE 2)

Cast on 60 (64: 68) sts using 2.5mm needles and Yarn C, using a long-tail or loose cast on. Join in the round, being careful not to twist the stitches. Place marker for beg of round.

Knit 1 round

Work in (K2, P2) rib for 4cm.

Next round Knit, dec 4 (8: 4) sts evenly around. [56 (56: 64) sts]

Join in and break off yarns as needed.

Rounds 1 to 77 Repeating sts 7 (7:8) times across round, work

Break off all yarns except Yarn A.

SIZES S AND L ONLY

Next round Knit, dec 2 sts. [54 (-: 62) sts]

SIZE M ONLY

Next round Knit, inc 2 sts. [- (58: -) sts]

ALL SIZES HEEL FLAP

Next row K26 (28: 30), turn and leave rem 28 (30: 32) sts on a



TOP TIP

Combining knitting in the round and stranded colourwork in projects that have a small circumference can be a red flag for tension. Before you start these sheep socks cast on a multiple of 8 and knit a small tension square using the colourwork chart to give yourself a rough guide for gauge. It's better that you find out before you've knitted an entire sock that your tension was all wrong, and your sock is too tight. If your knitting doesn't match the pattern's tension, increase needle size.

CHART



holder or spare needle for instep. [26 (28: 30) heel sts] Starting with a WS purl row, work in st st on these 26 (28: 30) sts until Heel Flap meas 5 (5.5: 6)cm, ending after a WS row. Place a marker at each end of last row.

HEELTURN

Row 1 (RS) K to last 7 (8:8) heel sts, skpo, turn.

[25 (27: 29) heel sts]

Row 2 (WS) P to last 7 (8:8) heel sts, SI1 knitwise, P1, psso, turn. [24 (26: 28) heel sts]

Row 3 K to 1 st before gap, skpo, turn. [1 heel st dec'd]

Row 4 P to 1 st before gap, SI 1 knitwise, P1, psso, turn.

[1 heel st dec'd]

Repeat Rows 3 and 4 until there are 14 (14: 16) heel sts.

GUSSET

Next row (RS) K to end of heel sts, pick up and knit 13 (14: 16) sts down side of heel flap, place marker, K28 (30: 32) instep sts, place



marker, pick up and knit 13 (14: 16) sts up side of heel flap, K7 (7: 8), place marker for new beg of round. [68 (72: 80) sts] Resume working in the round on all sts.

Decrease round Knit to 2 sts before marker, k2tog tbl, slm, knit to marker, slm, k2tog, knit to end. [2 sts dec'd] Next round Knit.

Rep these 2 rounds a further 7 (7: 9) times. [52 (56: 60) sts] Remove all markers except beg of round mrk.

Knit all rounds until foot meas 18 (19: 21)cm from heel markers, or 4 (5: 6)cm shorter than desired foot length.

Set-up round Remove marker, K13 (14: 15), place marker, K26 (28: place marker (new beg of round).

Decrease round (K2tog tbl, knit to 2 sts before marker, k2tog, slm) twice. [4 sts dec'd]

Next round Knit.

Rep these 2 rounds a further 3 (6: 8) times, then work dec round only 6 (3: 2) more times. [12 (16: 16) sts]

Next round (K2tog) 6 (8: 8) times. [6 (8: 8) sts]

Break yarn and thread through rem sts, pull tight and fasten.

FINISHING

Weave in ends and block gently to measurements, following any yarn care instructions on the ball band.







Next row (RS) Cast off 1 st, skpo, K2. [4 sts]

Work 1 row.

Cast off rem 4 sts.

Next row (RS) Cast off 3 sts, work to last 4 sts, skpo, K2.

[8 sts]

Work 1 row

Next row (RS) Cast off 2 sts, work to end. [6 sts]

Next row (RS) Cast off 1 st, skpo, K2. [4 sts]

Work 1 row.

Cast off rem 4 sts.

SHAPE LEFT NECK AND RAGLAN EDGE

With WS facing, rejoin yarn to sts for Left Neck and patt to end. Work as for Right Neck, casting off Neck edge sts on WS rows, and working Raglan decs on RS rows as set.

Next row (RS) K2, k2tog, work to end. [12 sts]

Next row (WS) Cast off 4 sts, work to end. [8 sts]

Next row (RS) K2, k2tog, work to end. [7 sts]

Next row (WS) Cast off 3 sts, work to end. [4 sts]

Cast off rem 4 sts.

RIGHT SLEEVE

Work as for Left Sleeve until 13 sts rem, ending on a WS row.

Next row (RS) Cast off 4 sts, work to last 4 sts, skpo, K2. [8 sts] Work 1 row straight.

Next row (RS) Cast off 3 sts, work to last 4 sts, skpo, K2. [4 sts] Work 1 row straight.

Cast off rem 4 sts.

NECKBAND

Cast on 69 (73: 75: 77: 81) sts using 4mm needles and Yarn A. Work 8 rows in 1x1 rib as for Back and leave on a holder.

FINISHING

Join raglans.

Using back stitch graft the neckband around neck edge, then join the short edges. Sew the sleeve and side seams. Secure and weave in all ends. •

We spoke to Sharon Lawlor, founder of The Sheep Sanctuary, about their good work...



Charity The Sheep Sanctuary Established 2008

What do you do? We rescue sheep, cows.

pigs, goats and more (mainly sheep as we are home to approximately 300), from orphan lambs to disabled and poorly sheep to pet sheep that they can no longer care for. We are self funded. Its no easy task to raise the funds every year to keep the sanctuary running as it costs well in excess of £70,000 per year, but we are trying hard to become more self-sustained.

What can knitters do to help? There are so many ways! Donate, no matter how small. Purchase items from our Etsy Store. Book a sheep hugging session or on-site hut rental. Share our facebook page and sign up to our newsletter. Help produce our woolly merchandise: knitting and crochet hats, gloves, scarves and soft toys; peg looming using our fleece; hand-knitting on large needles; spinning, weaving and hand-dying our wool and fleece; needle felting to create our tumble drier balls or help us to fill our store with lots of handmade needle felted items. Our latest appeal is to purchase a 'mudmat.' to help prevent the boggy fields causing problems and extra work with the sheep hooves.

14 sts and 19 rows to measure 10x10cm (4x4in) over rev st st using 6mm needles

ABBREVIATIONS

C6B Slip next 3 sts onto cn and hold at back of work, K3, K3 from cn C6F slip next 3 sts onto cn and hold at front of work, K3, K3 from cn

Rev st st This is produced in the same way as stockinette, except that the purl stitches are done on the right side and the knit stitches on the wrong side. In the round, reverse stockinette stitch is produced by purling every stitch

BACK (PART1)

Cast on 51 sts using 6mm needles. Row 1 *K3, P3; rep from * to last 3 sts,

Row 2 *P3, K3; rep from * to last 3 sts, P3. Rep these 2 rows until rib measures 5cm.

Starting with a purl row, work in reverse stocking stitch (rev st st) until Back (pt1) measures 23cm, ending on a knit row.

FRONT

Continue in rev st st, working cable pattern as follows:

Row 1 (RS) P27, K18, P to end.

Row 2 K6, P18, K to end.

Row 3 P27, (C6B) 3 times, P to end.

Row 4 K6, P18, K to end.

Row 5 P27, K18, P to end.

Row 6 K6, P18, K to end.

Row 7 P27, K3, (C6F) twice, K3, P to end. When sewing the Back closed, leave long ends in case you need to undo the seam for washing.

Row 8 K6, P18, K to end.

Repeat these 8 rows until Front measures 34cm, ending with a Row 8.

BACK (PART 2)

Starting with a purl row, work in reverse stocking stitch until Back (pt2) measures 18cm.

Row 1 *K3, P3; rep from * to last 3 sts, K3

Row 2 *P3, K3; rep from * to last 3 sts, P3. Rep these 2 rows until rib measures 5cm


Cast off in rib.

FINISHING

Folding one row above the cable panel, fold the top Back section down and stitch the sides of the Front and Back together using mattress stitch. Folding one row below the cable panel, fold the bottom Back section up so it overlaps the top section and stitch it in place using mattress stitch.

Row 1 (RS) K6 (6: 8: 11: 13), (P3, K1) 3 (4: 5: 5: 6) times, P5 (5: 5: 6: work Row 1 of Panel, **P4 (5: 5: 6: 6), K1, P4 (5: 5: 6: 6)**, TW2, P1, K5, P1, TW2, work from ** to **, work Row 1 of Panel, P5 (5: 5: 6: (K1, P3) 3 (4: 5: 5: 6) times, K6 (6: 8: 11: 13).

Row 2 P6 (6: 8: 11: 13), (K3, P1) 3 (4: 5: 5: 6) times, K5 (5: 5: 6: 6), work Row 2 of Panel, **K4 (5: 5: 6: 6), P1, K4 (5: 5: 6: 6)**, P11, work from ** to **, work Row 2 of Panel, K5 (5: 5: 6: 6), (P1, K3) 3 (4: 5: 5: 6) times, P6 (6: 8: 11: 13).

Row 3 K6 (6: 8: 11: 13), (P3, K1) 3 (4: 5: 5: 6) times, P5 (5: 5: 6: 6), work Row 3 of Panel, **P4 (5: 5: 6: 6), K1, P4 (5: 5: 6: 6)**, TW2, P1, K1, TW3, K1, P1, TW2, work from ** to **, work Row 3 of Panel, P5 (5: 5: 6: 6), (K1, P3) 3 (4: 5: 5: 6) times, K6 (6: 8: 11: 13).

Row 4 As Row 2 but working Row 4 of Panel.

These 4 rows set patt.



Cont in patt until work measures 44cm from cast-on edge, measured through centre of work and ending after a WS row.

SHAPE ARMHOLES

Cast off 9 (11: 13: 15: 17) sts at beg of next 2 rows.

Change to 4mm needles.

Row 1 (RS) K3, P4 (5: 5: 6: 6), K1, P4 (5: 5: 6: 6), work Row 1 of Panel, P5 (5: 5: 6: 6), (K1, P3) 3 (4: 5: 5: 6) times, K6 (6: 8: 11: 13). Row 2 P6 (6: 8: 11: 13), (K3, P1) 3 (4: 5: 5: 6) times, K5 (5: 5: 6: 6), work Row 2 of Panel, K4 (5: 5: 6: 6), P1, K4 (5: 5: 6: 6), P3.

Rows 3 and 4 As Rows 1 and 2 but working Rows 3 and 4 of Panel. These 4 rows set patt.

Cont in patt until pattern section measures 13cm, ending after a

PLACE POCKET LINING

Next row (RS) Patt 11 (13: 13: 15: 15), *slip next 31 sts on an odd length of yarn and leave, and P1, Panel 29 sts, P1 across 31 sts of pocket lining, patt to end.

Cont straight in patt until Front measures same as Back to start of armhole shaping, ending after a RS row.

SHAPE ARMHOLE

Cast off 11 (12: 15: 16: 19) sts at beg of next row.

[53 (58: 61: 66: 69) sts]

Next row (RS) Patt to last 3 sts, k2tog, K1. [1 st dec'd]

Next row P1, p2tog, patt to end. [1 st dec'd]

Rep these 2 rows another 3 (4: 4: 5: 5) times.

[45 (48: 51: 54: 57) sts]

SHAPE FRONT SLOPE

Row 1 (RS) K1, k2tog tbl, patt to end. [1 st dec'd]

Row 2 Patt to last 2 sts, P2.

Rep these 2 rows until 38 (41: 40: 44: 46) sts rem, ending after a WS row

Next row (RS) K2, patt to end.

Next row Patt to last 2 sts, P2.

Next row K1, k2tog tbl, patt to end. [1 st dec'd]

Next row Patt to last 2 sts, P2.

Rep the last 4 rows until 31 (33: 34: 36: 37) sts rem.

***Keeping the 2 sts at neck edge in st st as set, work straight until Front measures same as Back to start of shoulder shaping, ending at armhole edge.

SHAPE SHOULDER

Cast off 8 (8: 9: 9: 9) sts at beg of next row and the 2 foll alt rows.

Work 1 row straight.

Cast off rem 7 (9: 7: 9: 10) sts.

LEFT FRONT

Work as Right Front to **.

Change to 4mm needles.

Row 1 (RS) K6 (6: 8: 11: 13), (P3, K1) 3 (4: 5: 5: 6) times, P5 (5: 5: 6: work Row 1 of Panel, P4 (5: 5: 6: 6), K1, P4 (5: 5: 6: 6), K3.

Row 2 P3, K4 (5: 5: 6: 6), P1, K4 (5: 5: 6: 6), work Row 2 of Panel, K5 (5: 5: 6: 6), (P1, K3) 3 (4: 5: 5: 6) times, P6 (6: 8: 11: 13).

Rows 3 and 4 As Rows 1 and 2 but working Rows 3 and 4 of Panel. These 4 rows set patt.

Cont in patt until patterned section measures 13cm, ending after a WS row

PLACE POCKET LINING

Next row (RS) Patt 22 (26: 32: 36: 42), *slip next 31 sts on an odd

length of yarn and leave, and in place of these P1, Panel 29 sts, P1 across 31 sts of pocket lining, patt to end.

Cont straight in patt until Front measures same as Back to start of armhole shaping, ending after a WS row.

SHAPE ARMHOLE

Cast off 11 (12: 15: 16: 19) sts at beg of next row.

[53 (58: 61: 66: 69) sts]

Next row (WS) Patt to last 2 sts, P2.

Next row K1, k2tog tbl, patt to end. [1 st dec'd] Next row Patt to last 3 sts, p2tog tbl, P1. [1 st dec'd] Rep the last 2 rows another 3 (4: 4: 5: 5) times.

[45 (48: 51: 54: 57) sts]

SHAPE FRONT SLOPE

Row 1 (RS) Patt to last 3 sts, k2tog, K1. [1 st dec'd]

Row 2 P2, patt to end.

Rep these 2 rows until 38 (41: 40: 44: 46) sts rem, ending after a WS row

Next row (RS) Patt to last 2 sts, K2.

Next row P2, patt to end.

Next row Pat to last 3 sts, k2tog tbl, K1. [1 st dec'd]

Next row P2, patt to end.

Rep the last 4 rows until 31 (33: 34: 36: 37) sts rem. Complete to match Right Front working from *** to end.

POCKET TOPS (BOTH ALIKE)

With RS facing, slip a group of Pocket sts onto a 3.25mm needle with point facing correctly for first row to be a RS row. Rejoin yarn.

Row 1 (RS) Knit.

Row 2 K1, (P1, K1) to end.

Row 3 K2, (P1, K1) to last st, K1.

Rows 4 and 5 As Rows 2 and 3.

Cast off loosely in rib.

BUTTON BORDER

Join shoulders.

Cast on 11 sts using 3.25mm needles.

Rep Rows 2 and 3 of Pocket Tops until rib fits up Right Front and round to centre back of neck.

Cast off in rib.

Tack Border in place. Mark position for 7 buttons, first one to be in 5th row from lower edge and 7th one level with start of front slope shaping, or up to 6 rows below.

BUTTONHOLE BORDER



Cont without shaping until armholes meas 11 (13: 14: 16: 16: 17)cm, ending with RS facing for next row.

Row 1 P1, K1, P2, K1, (work Row 1 of Cable patt) 4 times, K2, P2, K1, P1. Row 2 K1, P1, K2, P2, (work Row 2 of Cable patt) 4 times, P1, K2, P1, K1.

SIZES XLAND 2XLONLY

Row 1 (P2, K1) twice, (work Row 1 of Cable patt) 4 times, K2, P2, K1.

Row 2 K2, P1, K2, P2, (work Row 2 of Cable patt) 4 times, (P1, K2)

SIZE 3XL ONLY

Row 1 P3, K1, P2, K1, (work Row 1 of Cable patt) 4 times, K2, P2, K1, P3. Row 2 K3, P1, K2, P2, (work Row 2 of Cable patt) 4 times, P1, K2, P1, K3.

ALL SIZES

These 2 rows set position of cable patt and start shaping for size M. Incorporate all inc sts into patt where possible throughout shaping. Work 0 (6: 0: 0: 0: 0) further rows.

Inc 1 st at each end of next row, then on every foll 10th (8th: 6th: 4th: 4th: 4th) row to 71 (77: 85: 93: 97: 101) sts.

Cont without shaping until Sleeve meas 29 (29: 30: 31: 31: 32)cm, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE SLEEVE TOP

Dec 1 st as set at each end of next 5 (5: 5: 7: 7: 7) rows, then on 4 foll RS rows. [53 (59: 67: 71: 75: 79) sts]

Work 1 row, ending with RS facing for next row.

Cast off 5 (5: 6: 6: 7: 7) sts at beg of next 8 rows.

[13 (19: 19: 23: 19: 23) sts]

Cast off rem sts.

NECKBAND

Join right shoulder seam.

With RS facing, using 4mm needles, pick up and knit 17 (17: 18: 18: 21: 21) sts down left side of neck, K23 (25: 23: 25: 23: 25) sts from front neck holder, 17 (17: 18: 18: 21: 21) sts up right side of neck and 37 (39: 39: 41: 41: 43) sts from back neck holder.

[94 (98: 98: 102: 106: 110) sts]

Beg with a Row 2, work 7cm in rib as set on Back, ending with RS facing for next row.

Cast off in rib.

MAKING UP

Join left shoulder and neckband seam. Join side and Sleeve seams. Sew in Sleeves, matching decreases and easing fabric to fit.

Notes Unless otherwise specified, use the cable cast on for all pieces and use mattress stitch to sew seams.

Wind off a small bobbin of Yarn A before you begin, or locate both ends of the ball.

Cast on 30 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn A. Start at base.

Rows 1 and 2 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st.

Row 3 K1, (kfb, PM, kfb, K10, kfb, PM, kfb) twice, K1. [38 sts]

Row 4 (Purl to marker, slm) 4 times, purl to end.

Row 5 (Knit to 1 st before marker, kfb, sm, kfb) 4 times, knit to end. [8 sts inc'd]

Row 6 Rep Row 4.

Row 7 Rep Row 5, removing markers. [54 sts]

Rows 8 to 17 Starting on a WS purl row, work in st st, and on Row 17 place locking markers in the 4th and 31st sts.

Work the windows using intarsia method.

Row 25 K17A, K3B, k2togB, K8B, sskB, K3B, K17A. [50 sts]

Cont in Yarn A only.

Row 26 and foll WS rows Purl. Row 27 K1, (K2, ssk, k2tog, K12, ssk, k2tog, K2) twice, K1. [42 sts]

Row 29 (K2, ssk, k2tog, K10, ssk, k2tog) twice, K2. [34 sts]

Row 31 K1, (ssk, k2tog, K8, ssk, k2tog) twice, K1. [26 sts]

Cast off purlwise.

AMBULANCE WHEEL ARCHES (MAKE 4)

Cast on 11 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn A. Rows 1 and 2 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st. Cast off

AMBULANCE WHEELS (MAKE 4)

Cast on 14 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn E.

Start at outer edge.

Rows 1 to 3 Knit.

Break Yarn E and join Yarn F.

Row 4 (WS) (P2tog) 7 times. [7 sts]

Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten.

AMBULANCE TOP LIGHT

Cast on 8 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn C.

Rows 1 to 3 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st

Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten.

FIRE ENGINE BODY

Wind a small bobbin of Yarn G or locate both ends of the ball to start. Cast on 46 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn G.



STEP-BY-STEP SWISS DARNING



Swiss darning or duplicate stitch is a great way to add small details to your knitting, covering the stitch with an embroidery stitch the same shape as the stitch beneath it.

Work from bottom to top, bringing the needle out at the base of the stitch at 1. Take the needle behind the top of the 'V', in at 2 and out at Take the needle down at O and bring it up at O, at the base of the stitch above. Continue in this way up the line of knitted stitches.

FIRE ENGINE TOP LIGHT

Work as given for Ambulance Top Light using Yarn D.

FIRE ENGINE WHEELS (MAKE 4)

Cast on 18 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn E. Start at outer edge.

Rows 1 to 4 Knit.

Break Yarn E and join Yarn F.

Row 5 (WS) (P2tog) 9 times. [9 sts]

Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten.

FIRE ENGINE WHEEL ARCHES (MAKE 4)

Cast on 14 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn G. Rows 1 and 2 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st. Cast off.

FIRE ENGINE SIDE PANEL

Cast on 10 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn E. Rows 1 to 9 Knit.

Cast off

TRACTOR BODY

Cast on 30 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn H. Start at base. Rows 1 to 7 Work as given for Ambulance Body Rows 1 to 7. [54 sts]

Rows 8 to 16 Starting on a WS purl row, work in st st.

Row 17 K1, (K2, ssk, k2tog, K14, ssk, k2tog, K2) twice, K1. [46 sts] Row 18 and foll WS rows Purl.

Row 19 (K2, ssk, k2tog, K12, ssk, k2tog) twice, K2. [38 sts]

Row 21 K1, (ssk, k2tog, K10, ssk, K2og) twice, K1. [30 sts] Cast off purlwise.

TRACTOR CAB

Cast on 34 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn B.

Start at bottom edge of windows.

Place locking markers in the 5th, 14th, 21st, and 30th sts.



Work as given for Fire Engine Wheels.

TRACTOR REAR WHEELS (MAKE 2)

Cast on 23 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn E.

Rows 1 to 4 Knit.

Break Yarn E and join Yarn F.

Row 5 (WS) P2, (p2tog, P1) 7 times. [16 sts]

Row 6 (RS) Knit.

Row 7 (P2tog) 8 times. [8 sts]

Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten.

TRACTOR REAR WHEEL ARCHES (MAKE 2)

Cast on 16 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn H. Rows 1 and 2 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st. Cast off.

TRACTOR TRAILER

Cast on 48 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn G.

Start at top edge.

Rows 1 to 17 Knit.

Row 18 (RS) (K3, ssk, k2tog, K11, ssk, k2tog, K1) twice, K2. [40 sts]

Row 19 Knit.

Row 20 (K2, ssk, k2tog, K9, ssk, k2tog) twice, K2. [32 sts]

Row 21 Knit.

Row 22 K1, (ssk, k2tog, K7, ssk, k2tog) twice, K1. [24 sts]

Cast off.

TRACTOR TRAILER WHEELS (MAKE 2)

Work as given for Ambulance Wheels.



TRACTOR TRAILER HAY BALES (MAKE 2)

Cast on 17 sts using 2.75mm needles in Yarn D. Place locking markers in the 6th and 12th sts.

Rows 1 to 14 Knit.

Row 15 Cast off 5 sts, knit to end. [5 sts dec'd]

Row 16 Rep Row 15. [7 sts]

Rows 17to 48 Knit.

Cast off.

BULLDOZER BODY, CAB, TOP LIGHT AND FUNNEL

Work as given for Tractor Body, Cab and Funnel, using Yarn D for Body, Yarn B and Yarn D for Cab, and Yarn E for Funnel. Work as given for Ambulance Top Light using Yarn G.

BULLDOZER SHOVEL

Cast on 38 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn D. Start at top edge.

Rows 1 to 4 Knit.

Row 5 (RS) K1, (k2tog, K4, k2tog, K10) twice, K1. [34 sts]

Rows 6 to 8 Knit.

Row 9 K1, (k2tog, K2, k2tog, K10) twice, K1. [30 sts]

Rows 10 to 12 Knit.

Row 13 K1, *(k2tog) twice, K10; rep from * once more, K1. [26 sts]

Row 14 Knit.

Cast off.

BULLDOZER SHOVEL FRAME (MAKE 2)

Cast on 18 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn D.

Row 1 Knit.

Row 2 K7, (k2tog) twice, K7. [16 sts]

Row 3 K1, (K1, lift 2nd st on RH needle over first) 5 times, (k2tog, lift 2nd st on RH needle over first) twice, cast off rem sts and fasten off.

BULLDOZER TRACKS (MAKE 2)

Cast on 38 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn E.

Rows 1 to 3 (K1, P1) 19 times.

Row 4 (WS) Purl.

Row 5 (K2, ssk, k2tog, K8, ssk, k2tog) twice, K2. [30 sts]

Row 6 Purl.





BULLDOZER TRACK WHEELS (MAKE 4)

Cast on 14 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn F.

Rows 1 and 2 Knit.

Row 3 (K2tog) 7 times. [7 sts]

Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten.

LORRY CAB

Cast on 10 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn C.

Start at base

Rows 1 and 2 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st.

Row 3 K1, (kfb) 8 times, K1. [18 sts]

Row 4 Purl.

Row 5 *K2, (kfb) twice; rep from * 3 more times, K2. [26 sts]

Row 6 Purl.

Row 7 *K3, (kfb) twice, K4, (kfb) twice, K1; rep from * once more,

Rows 8 to 18 Starting on a WS purl row, work in st st, and on Row 18 place locking markers in 5th, 14th, 21st and 30th sts.

Break Yarn C and join Yarn B.

Row 19 K11, k2tog, K8, ssk, K11. [32 sts]

Rows 20 to 24 Starting on a WS purl row, work in st st.

Row 25 K10, k2tog, K8, ssk, K10. [30 sts]

Break Yarn B and join Yarn A.

Row 26 and foll WS rows Purl.

Row 27 K1, (K2, ssk, k2tog, K2, ssk, k2tog, K2) twice, K1. [22 sts]

Row 29 (K2, ssk, k2tog, ssk, k2tog) twice, K2. [14 sts]

Row 31 (K2tog) 7 times. [7 sts]

Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten.

LORRY TOP LIGHT, TRAILER, WHEELS AND

Work as given for Ambulance Top Light using Yarn G, Tractor Trailer using Yarn D, Fire Engine Wheels, and make 2 Fire Engine Wheel Arches using Yarn C.

LORRY BARREL

Cast on 10 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn H.



Rows 1 and 2 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st.

Row 3 K1, (kfb) 8 times, K1. [18 sts]

Row 4 Purl

Row 5 *K2, (kfb) twice; rep from * 3 more times, K2. [26 sts]

Row 6 Knit.

Rows 7 to 22 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st.

Rows 23 and 24 Purl.

Row 25 (K2, ssk, k2tog) 4 times, K2. [18 sts]

Row 26 Purl.

Row 27 K1, (ssk, k2tog) 4 times, K1. [10 sts]

Row 28 Purl.

Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten.

TANKER CAB

Work as given for Lorry Truck Cab using Yarn H for bottom of cab/roof.

TANKER WHEELS AND WHEEL ARCHES

Make 2 Fire Engine Wheels (for Front Wheels), make 4 Ambulance Wheels, and make 2 Fire Engine Wheel Arches using Yarn H.

TANKER TRAILER BASE

Cast on 18 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn H.

Rows 1 and 2 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st.

Row 3 (K3, kfb, K1, kfb, K3) twice. [22 sts]

Row 4 Knit

Rows 5 to 30 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st.

Rows 31 and 32 Purl.

Row 33 K3, ssk, K1, k2tog, K6, ssk, K1, k2tog, K3. [18 sts]

Cast off purlwise.

TANKER TANK

Cast on 10 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn A.

Rows 1 and 2 Knit.

Row 3 (RS) K1, (kfb) 8 times, K1. [18 sts]

Row 4 Knit.

Row 5 K1, (kfb, K1) 8 times, K1. [26 sts]

Row 6 Knit

Row 7 K1, (kfb, K2) 8 times, K1. [34 sts]

Row 8 Knit

Rows 9 to 35 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st.



Row 36 Knit.

Row 37 K1, (k2tog, K2) 8 times, K1. [26 sts]

Row 38 Knit.

Row 39 K1, (k2tog, K1) 8 times, K1. [18 sts]

Row 40 Knit.

Row 41 K1, (k2tog) 8 times, K1. [10 sts]

Row 42 Knit.

Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten.

ROAD ROLLER BODY

Cast on 22 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn D. Start at base

Rows 1 and 2 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st.

Row 3 K1, (kfb, PM, kfb, K6, kfb, PM, kfb) twice, K1. [30 sts]

Row 4 (Purl to marker, slm) 4 times, purl to end.

Row 5 (Knit to 1 st before marker, kfb, sm, kfb) 4 times, knit to end. [8 sts inc'd]

Row 6 Rep Row 4.

Row 7 Rep Row 5, removing markers. [46 sts]

Rows 8-16 Starting on a WS purl row, work in st st.

Row 17 K1, (K2, ssk, k2tog, K10, ssk, k2tog, K2) twice, K1. [38 sts] Row 18 and foll WS rows Purl.

Row 19 (K2, ssk, k2tog, K8, ssk, k2tog) twice, K2. [30 sts]

Row 21 K1, (ssk, k2tog, K6, ssk, k2tog) twice, K1. [22 sts] Cast off purlwise.

ROAD ROLLER CAB, TOP LIGHT, WHEELS, WHEEL ARCHES AND FUNNEL

Work as given for Tractor Cab and Tractor Funnel, using Yarn B and Yarn D for Cab, and Yarn E for Funnel. Work as given for Ambulance Top Light using Yarn H. Make 2 Fire Engine Wheels and 2 Fire Engine Wheel Arches using Yarn D.

ROAD ROLLER FRONT ROLLER

Cast on 10 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn F.

Rows 1 and 2 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st.

Row 3 K1, (kfb) 8 times, K1. [18 sts]

Row 4 Purl.

Row 5 K1, (kfb, K1) 8 times, K1. [26 sts]

Row 6 Knit.

Rows 7 to 21 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st.

Rows 22 and 23 Knit.

Row 24 P1, (P1, p2tog) 8 times, P1. [18 sts]

Row 25 Knit.

Row 26 (P2tog) 9 times. [9 sts]

Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten.

ROAD ROLLER FRONT ROLLER FRAME

Cast on 36 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn D.

Rows 1 to 4 Knit.

Cast off.

ROAD ROLLER FRONT ROLLER FRAME CIRCLES (MAKE 2)

Cast on 8 sts using the long-tail cast-on, 2.75mm needles and Yarn E. Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten.

FORKLIFT BODY, CAB, WHEELS, WHEEL ARCHES & TOP LIGHT

Work as for Road Roller Body using Yarn C, and Tractor Cab using Yarn B and Yarn E. Make 4 Ambulance Wheels and 4 Ambulance Wheel Arches in Yarn C. Work as for Ambulance Top Light in Yarn D.

FORKLIFT CARRIAGE PLATE

Cast on 12 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn F. Rows 1 to 18 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st. Cast off.

FORKLIFT FORK ARMS (MAKE 2)

Cast on 6 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn F. Rows 1 to 10 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st. Cast off.

FORKLIFT CARGO

Work as given for Tractor Trailer Hay Bale using Yarn G.

FORKLIFT CARGO STRAP

Cast on 14 sts using 2.75mm needles and Yarn G. Cast off.

MAKING UP

AMBULANCE

Body Fold cast-off edge in half and sew tog (seam runs along top). Then sew side edges tog (seam runs down centre back). Stuff, then sew cast-on edge tog along bottom.

Windows Use Swiss Darning to embroider 2 window struts in Yarn A. (1 on each front corner above marked sts on Row 17); each is a vertical line 8 sts tall. Remove markers.

Decoration On each side, embroider a medical cross using Yarn G and short horizontal stitches.

FIRE ENGINE

Body Make up as for Ambulance.

Windows Use duplicate stitch to embroider window struts in Yarn G; there are 4 struts (2 on each side above marked sts on Row 18); each is a vertical line 7 sts tall. Remove markers.

Decoration Attach Side Panel on right hand side of Body. On the other side, use Yarn F and chain stitch to embroider a spiral for the hose. On Roof use Yarn A and chain stitch to embroider a ladder.

TRACTOR

Body Make up as for Ambulance.

Cab Sew side edges tog, stuff and sew cast-on edge onto top of Body with seamed side at back.

Windows Use duplicate stitch to embroider window struts in Yarn

* TRANSPORT PLAYSET

A: there are 4 struts (1 on each corner above marked sts on cast-on edge); each is a vertical line 7 sts tall. Remove markers.

Trailer Fold cast-off edge in half and sew tog (seam runs along bottom). Then sew side edges tog (seam runs down centre back). Sew back of Trailer onto back of Body.

Hay Bales Sew cast-off edge to cast-on edge between markers and remove them. Fold up sides and sew tog around all open edges to make a brick shape. Adding stuffing before finishing seam. Place Hay Bales in Trailer.

BULLDOZER

Body Make up as for Ambulance.

Cab and Windows Make up as for Tractor and embroider windows

Shovel Fold cast-off edge in half and sew tog, then sew side edges tog. The Shovel Frame is an L-shape, sew one arm of this L down side of Shovel, and sew end of other arm onto Body just behind Cab.

Tracks Fold cast-off edge in half and sew tog, then sew side edges tog with rib facing outwards. Add stuffing and sew cast-on edge onto side of Body. Sew side edges of each Track Wheel tog to make a circle shape, and sew 2 Wheels on top of each Track.

LORRY

Cab Sew side edges tog (seam runs down back), stuff, and sew cast-on edge tog along bottom.

Windows Embroider struts as for Fire Engine Windows instructions

Trailer Make up as for Tractor Trailer and sew onto back of Cab. Barrel Sew side edges tog, stuffing as you sew, and gather cast-on sts tog. Place inside Trailer.

TANKER

Cab and Windows Make up as for Lorry Cab and embroider window struts in Yarn H

Base Sew side edges tog (seam runs along top). Stuff, and sew cast-on edge tog along back, and cast-off edge tog along front. Sew front onto back of Cab.

Tank Sew side edges tog, stuffing as you sew. Gather cast-on sts tog. Sew seamed side edge onto top of Base. With photo as a guide. embroider horizontal stripes using duplicate stitch using Yarn C and Yarn G along each side.

ROAD ROLLER

Body, Cab and Windows Make up as for Bulldozer.

Front Roller Sew side edges tog, stuffing as you sew, and gather cast-on sts tog.

Front Roller Frame Sew each end onto sides of Body, and place Roller inside Frame and sew on. For each Frame Circle, sew side edges tog to make a circle shape, and attach on top of Frame.

FORKLIFT

Body, Cab and Windows Make up as for Bulldozer and embroider window struts using Yarn E.

Carriage Plate Sew side edges tog (seam runs down centre back), add a little stuffing, and sew cast-off edge tog across top and cast-on edge tog across bottom. Attach back of Plate onto Body. Fork Arms Sew side edges tog to make a tube, then sew cast-on edge onto front of Carriage Plate.

Cargo Make up as for Hay Bale. For Strap, sew each end onto bottom of Cargo to make a loop which Fork Arms can feed through.

TOP LIGHTS AND FUNNELS

For each, sew side edges tog and sew cast-on edge onto roof of vehicle with seam facing back (this piece is not stuffed). Make up each Funnel in the same way and attach to top of vehicle Body.

WHEELS AND WHEEL ARCHES

For each wheeled vehicle, sew Wheel's side edges tog to make a circular shape. Add a little stuffing or yarn scraps under each Wheel to pad it out, and sew cast-on edge of Wheel onto side of vehicle, catching a stitch on Wheel to a stitch on side of vehicle all the way around. For each Wheel Arch, weave in cast-off tail, and use cast-on tail to sew cast-on edge of Arch onto Body of vehicle above Wheel, catching a leg of a stitch on cast-on edge to a leg of a stitch on vehicle



NECKBAND

Sew left shoulder seam.

With RS facing, 3.25mm needles, and starting at the back, knit the 48 (50: 52: 54: 56) sts from the Back stitch holder, and pick up and knit 23 (23: 24: 25: 25) sts across the left curve, knit the 32 (34: 36: 36: 38) sts from the Front holder, and pick up and knit 23 (23: 24: 25: 25) sts across the right curve. [126 (130: 136: 140: 144) sts]

Starting with Row 2, work in moss stitch across all sts for 2cm, ending with a WS row.

Cast off in moss stitch pattern.

Sew right shoulder seam and neckband.

SLEEVE EDGINGS

With RS facing and 3mm needles, pick up and knit 90 (100: 110: 114: 120) sts across the armhole.

Starting with Row 2, work in moss stitch across all sts for 2cm, ending with a WS row.

Cast off in moss stitch pattern.

Repeat for the other Sleeve edging.

FINISHING

Sew side seams to the markers leaving the bottom hemline unseamed. Weave in ends.

STEP-BY-STEP PICK UP AND KNIT



Holding the piece of knitting you are going to pick the sts up from in your left hand, and starting at the top-right corner, insert the right-hand needle between the first two stitches of the row.



Wind your yarn around the needle and 'knit' the first stitch ...



...And pull the new stitch through between the two stitches.



Continue to work like this along the row or until you have picked up the necessary amount of stitches. Try to space your stitches evenly.







Cont in rib for a further 4 rows, ending with RS facing for next row. Cast off in rib.

FRONT

Work as given for Back to **.

Using the intarsia technique and keeping patt correct, join in Yarns C and D and cont as folls:

Next row (RS) Using Yarn D K36 (36: 38: 40: 40: 42: 44), using Yarn

C K35 (37: 37: 39: 41: 41: 43).

Next row Using Yarn C K35 (37: 37: 39: 41: 41: 43), using Yarn D K36 (36: 38: 40: 40: 42: 44).

These 2 rows set the colour placements for rest of Front.

Keeping patt correct, cont as folls:

Cont straight until 22 (22: 24: 24: 26: 26) rows less have been worked than on Back to shoulder, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE FRONT NECK

Next row (RS) Patt 30 (30: 31: 33: 34: 36: 36) sts and turn, leaving rem sts on a holder.

Now work in patt as given for back and cont as folls: Inc 1 st at each end of 3rd and every foll 4th (4th: 4th: 4th: 4th: 6th: 6th) row to 41 (49: 55: 65: 69: 55: 61) sts, then on every foll alt (alt: alt: alt: 4th: 4th) row until there are 59 (63: 65: 67: 71: 73: 75) sts, taking inc sts into patt.

Work 3 rows, ending with RS facing for next row. (Sleeve should meas approx 12.5 (14.5: 16.5: 18.5: 20.5: 23: 25.5)cm.) Cast off

MAKING UP

Block pieces gently, following any instructions on the ball band. Join right shoulder seam using mattress stitch, or backstitch if preferred. Matching cast-off edge of front to shoulder line of Back. lay left front buttonhole border over back button border and neatly sew together at armhole edge. Leaving 5-6cm open at neck edge, neatly sew cast-off edge of Back button border in place on inside.

NECKBAND

With RS facing, using 3mm needles and Yarn A, beg and ending at cast-off edges of left shoulder borders, pick up and knit 16 (16: 16: 18: 18: 20: 20) sts down left side of front neck, K across 11 (13: 13: 13: 13: 11: 15) sts on front holder inc 0 (0: 0: 1: 1: 0: 0) st at centre. pick up and knit 16 (16: 16: 18: 18: 20: 20) sts up right side of front neck, and 5 sts down right side of back neck, K across 17 (19: 19: 21: 21: 21: 25) sts on back holder inc 0 (0: 0: 1: 1: 0: 0) st at centre, pick up and knit 5 sts up left side of back neck to shoulder line marker, and 6 sts up row-end edge of back shoulder border to cast-off edge. [76 (80: 80: 88: 88: 88: 96) sts]

Beg with a WS row, now work in rib as given for Back shoulder border as folls:

Work 3 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

Row 4 (RS) K3, yrn, p2tog (to make 3rd buttonhole), rib to end. Work in rib for a further 2 rows, ending with WS facing for next row. Cast off in rib (on WS).

Mark points along side seam edges 11.5 (12: 12.5: 13: 13.5: 14: 14.5) cm either side of shoulder seams (to denote base of armhole openings). Place centre of cast-off edge of Sleeve to shoulder seam. Sew top of Sleeve to body, using markers as a guide. Join side and Sleeve seams. Sew buttons to match placement of buttonholes.



STEP-BY-STEP P2TOG PURL TWO TOGETHER



Push the point of your right-hand needle through the first two stitches on your left-hand needle, going from right to left as you would for a purl stitch.



Bring yarn anti-clockwise around the needle, between the two



Pull the yarn through both stitches, as you would when working a purl stitch, and drop both stitches from the left-hand needle.



Purling two stitches together decreases your stitch count by one, and the decrease stitch leans to the right. This is how a series looks on the right side of stocking stitch.

QUESTION OF THE MONTH

PROVISIONAL CAST ON

I've seen a project that requires a provisional cast on. I don't own a crochet hook, and my brain wants to ignore it. Can suggest an alternative? Melody T

l absolutely can! Hazel Tindall - a renowned Shetland knitter - has a method that involves knitting a few rows using waste yarn, then knitting a row in a strong, smooth cotton yarn, like you would for an afterthought heel or pocket. This thread is pulled out later to reveal the 'live' stitches. Note, you'll be picking up one less stitch than originally cast on, because you'll be picking up the bumps in the space between the stitches, so remember to factor this in when casting on with waste yarn.

- 1 Using waste yarn, cast on one more stitch than the total number you require for your project, then knit a few rows.
- 2 Knit 1 row in a smooth cotton yarn.
- 3 Change to your project yarn, and work following your pattern instructions.
- 4 Your finished work will contain a row worked in the cotton yarn.
- 5 The back of the work will have a row of bumps in your project yarn, sandwiched between the cotton stitches - you will be picking these up next.
- 6 & 7 Hold your work with the waste yarn section at the top, and the project yarn section at the bottom. Using your knitting needle, pick up the first line of bumps in

your project yarn, going from top to bottom through each bump. It can be helpful to use a thin knitting needle for this stage, and change to your project needles when you come to work on the live stitches.

8 Once all the stitches are on your needles, pull firmly on the cotton thread to remove it. The waste yarn section will fall away, and your live stitches will be on your needles ready to be knitted.

THRUMMED MITTENS

Someone told me about thrummed mittens the other day and now I can't stop thinking about them. Can you give me some pointers?

Sara Andrews

Thrumming is great! It creates a gloriously warm, padded fabric, perfect for cold, wet winter days. The best material to use is unspun woollen fibre - roving or combed top - that hasn't been through a superwash treatment. Over time, you want the fibres to felt together, and superwash wool won't do that. It's also best to use a fairly chunky yarn to knit with, so that the thrummed stitches blend nicely with the yarn as you knit. If the yarn is too narrow, the thrums will seem excessively bulky. SIMPLE CROCHET **EDGINGS FOR** KNITTED PROJECTS


FAYE PERRIAM-REED

We know you're all here for the joy knitting brings to your day, but occasionally designers use a little crochet to complete their knits. This could be as a strap, button loop, or as an edging. Here are two very pretty edgings knitters can use to add a little exciting detail to their projects.

Shell edging

Worked over a multiple of 8 sts + 1. Row 1 Work 1 dc, *skip 3 sts, work 7 tr all into next st, skip 3 sts, 1 dc; rep from * to end. Fasten off.

Adjust the number of sts skipped in between and the number of dcs at the beginning and end to suit your project.



Worked over any number of sts.

Row 1 *Work 1, 2 or 3 dc, ch2, 3 or 4, join with a ss into first ch (through both 'legs'); rep from * to end.

Experiment with working more or fewer dcs and ch sts to create different-sized bumps along the picot edge.



TIGHT FIT

My cast-on stitches are always really tight, which makes knitting the first row of my project frustrating and difficult. I wish I knew what to do about it! What do you suggest?



I find this especially tricky with the longtail cast on and the knitted cast on, so I tend to avoid those where I can! I use the German stretchy cast-on in place of the longtail

As a tight knitter myself, I can sympathise. cast on, which really helps, but my go-to is




the cable cast-on. This works because as you cast on, you have to relax the stitches in order for the needle to go in between them. Even if you pull them tight out of habit when you finish the stitch, you need to loosen them up to cast on the next one. The cable cast-on is super easy! Another alternative is to cast on your stitches to two needles held together, and then to take one of the needles away. This will create larger stitches, but definitely helps with the tension of your cast on!

BABY BOOTEES DUCK OR FROG BOOTEES (MAKE 2)

Cast on 60 sts using 4mm needles and Yarn A for the Duck Feet or Yarn C for the Frog Feet.

WEBBED TOES

Row 1 (RS) *Skpo, K11, k2tog; rep from * to end. [52 sts] Row 2 (WS) P2tog, P9, *(p2tog) twice, P9; rep from * to last 2 sts, p2tog. [44 sts]

Row 3 Knit.

Row 4 Purl.

Row 5 *Skpo, K7, k2tog; rep from * to end. [36 sts]

Row 6 Purl

Row 7 Knit.

Row 8 P2tog, P5, *(p2tog) twice, P5; rep from * to last 2 sts, p2tog. [28 sts]

Row 9 Knit

Row 10 Purl.

Row 11 *Skpo, K3, k2tog; rep from * to end. [20 sts]

Row 12 Purl.



Row 13 Knit.

Row 14 Pfb, P8, (pfb) twice, P8, pfb. [24 sts]

Row 15 K12 and slide these stitches onto a stitch holder, K12. Put a stitch marker in the last stitch. [12 sts]

Set-up row Purl.

Row 1 Knit

Row 2 Purl

Rep last 2 rows another time.

Row 3 Skpo, knit to last 2 sts, k2tog. [2 sts dec'd]

Row 4 Purl.

Rep last 2 rows another 2 times. [6 sts]

Row 5 Knit across the 6 sts on the needle but don't turn the work, pick up and knit 8 sts down to the marker. [14 sts]

Row 6 Purl across the 14 sts on the needle but don't turn the work, pick up and purl 8 sts down to the stitch holder. [22 sts]

Row 8 Purl across the 22 sts on the needle but don't turn the work. Slide the stitches on the stitch holder on to the left-hand needle, then Purl across the 12 sts on the stitch holder. [34 sts]

LFG

Row 1 Knit

Row 2 Purl

Rep last 2 rows another time.

Row 3 *K1, P1; rep from * to end. Rep last row another 9 times.

(For duck feet only, break Yarn A and join Yarn B.)

Row 1 Knit.

Rep last row another 7 times.

Cast off loosely.

MAKING UP

With wrong sides together and using mattress stitch, sew the row-end edges together, taking care to line up the garter stitch cuff at the top. Weave in ends and block gently to measurements, following any yarn care instructions on the ball band.

DOUGHNUT CUSHION

Cast on 60 sts using Yarn A.

Row 1 (WS) (K1, P1) to end.

Row 2 (RS) (P1, K1) to end.

Rep these two rows until 5 rows have been worked. Starting with a RS knit row, work in st st to 30cm, ending on a RS row.

Next row (WS) K to mark turn.

STEP-BY-STEP K2TOG KNIT TWO STITCHES TOGETHER



Insert the point of the right-hand needle through the loops of the next two stitches as if to knit.



Wind the yarn round the tip of the right-hand needle and pull the yarn through the two stitches, knitting them both together.




Drop the two stitches from the left-hand needle and keep the new stitch on the right-hand needle.



Knitting two stitches together decreases your stitch count by one, and the decrease stitch leans to the right. This is how a series of k2tog decreases will look.

CHART



HOW TO USE OUR CHARTS

Start at the bottom right-hand corner. Read right side rows from right to left and wrong side rows from left to right. A row of squares represents a row of knitting

KEY

- ☐ Yarn A
- Yarn B
- Yarn C
- K on RS; P on WS



FRONT

Using Yarn A, work in st st starting with a RS knit row for 13 rows, ending on a RS row.

Start motif (colorwork is worked using the intarsia technique).

Row 1 (WS) P9 Yarn A, P42 sts Row 1 Chart, P9 Yarn A.

Row 2 (RS) K9 Yarn A, K42 sts Row 2 Chart, K9 Yarn A.

These two rows set the position for the Chart.

Continue until 59 Chart rows have been worked.

With Yarn A only, work 12 rows in st st, starting with a RS knit row. **Next row** (RS) Purl to mark turn.

BACK

Starting with a WS purl row, work in st st for 10cm. Fold cover at turn, mark and check that sts on the needle sit just above the cast-on edge. Adjust number of st st rows if needed.

OVERLAP BUTTONHOLE BAND

Row 1 (K1,P1) to end.

Row 2 (P1, K1) to end.

Rows 1 and 2 make up moss st pattern.

Row 3 (Buttonholes) Starting with K1, moss st 5, (k2tog, yon, moss st 10) 4 times, k2tog, yon, moss st 5.

Row 4 As Row 2.

Row 5 As Row 1.

Cast off.

FINISHING

Sew in the ends. Block and press the edges.

Sew beads onto the icing part of the motif using needle and thread. Sew the side seams, making sure buttonhole band overlaps cast-on edge. Sew on the buttons.

How to knit

If you're new to knitting, or just need a little refresher, our knitting guide is here to make sure you get it right first time, every time

SCAN HERE...

CABLE CAST-ON METHOD Use it for a firm edge, and when adding stitches to your work



Make a slip knot. Insert right-hand needle into the stitch as if to knit. Wrap the yarn around the point and pull through, slipping the stitch on to the left-hand needle.



Push the point of the right-hand needle between the first and second stitches. Wrap the varn anti-clockwise around the point of the right-hand needle.



Pull the loop out with the right-hand needle, then slip it over the tip of the left-hand needle. Repeat Steps 2 and 3 until you have the number of stitches you require.

THUMB CAST-ON METHOD A great all rounder, use it to cast on stitches quickly and easily



Make a slip knot and place it on a needle, leaving a long tail. The tail length depends on the number of stitches you wish to cast on. Try a length about 3 times the width of the project.



Hold the tail in your left hand with your thumb sticking up. Make a circle anti-clockwise with your thumb. You should end up with a cross on the front of your thumb.



Push the needle tip along the outside of your thumb so it passes through the loop. Wrap the working yarn as if to knit.



Draw the yarn through the thumb loop and then between the arms of the cross. Slip your thumb out and pull to tighten the stitch. Repeat from Step 2.

KNIT Follow our simple steps to make the most important stitch you'll learn



Hold the needle with the stitches on it in your left hand. Keeping the yarn in your right hand and at the back of your work, insert the point of the right-hand needle up into the front loop of the first stitch, as shown.



Now wind the yarn anticlockwise around the point of the right-hand needle using your index finger. It's important to keep the yarn in your right hand relatively taut to maintain an even tension as you go.



Bring the right-hand needle down through the loop, making sure that you catch the yarn you wound around the needle. This creates the stitch. Don't pull the free yarn too tightly, let out some slack.



Push the point of the right needle further through the stitch you created, then gently pull the right needle up and to your left, taking the original loop with it. You've created one knit stitch. Repeat Steps 1 to 4 across the row.

PURL To make purl stitches, just reverse the action of plain knit stitches



Holding the needle with all the stitches on in your left hand, and ensuring that the yarn is at the front of your work, insert the right-hand needle up through the front loop of your first stitch as shown.



Wind the yarn around the tip of the right-hand needle from right to left, in an anti-clockwise motion, constantly keeping a slight tension on the yarn.



Now slip the right-hand needle back through the stitch, ensuring that you catch the yarn that you've already wound around the needle. This creates a stitch on your right-hand needle.



Pushing the point of the righthand needle a little further through the stitch, pull the original loop up and off the lefthand needle. That's your first purl stitch! Repeat Steps 1 to 4 across the row.

CAST OFF Finish off your knitting with this straightforward cast-off technique



Start by knitting the first two stitches of the row as normal, but don't go any further along as you usually would.



Insert the left-hand needle through the first stitch, as shown. Lift this stitch over the other stitch on the right-hand needle and over the needle point.



Knit another stitch so you have two on the right needle. Lift the first stitch over the second, then repeat Steps 1 to 3.

right twist



When you get to the last stitch, cut the yarn about 15cm (6in) away, feed it through the loop and pull through firmly to fasten off.

* COATHANGER COVER







YOU WILL NEED

□ World of Wool Woolaby (80% superwash Merino, 20% bamboo, 50g/90m), 1 ball of Yarn A Piglet (WBY12) □ A pair of 4mm needles

TENSION

20 sts and 30 rows to measure 10x10cm (4x4in) over stocking stitch using 4mm needles

MEASUREMENTS

To fit a wire coat hanger that measures 37cm (141/2 in) wide and 21cm (8¼ in) for each shoulder Actual width of cover 36cm (14 in)

Depth of cover 14cm (51/2in)

ABBREVIATIONS

K3tog Knit the next 3 stitches together [2 sts dec'd]

COAT HANGER COVER

Notes The coat hanger cover is worked flat from the top down in two pieces that are then seamed at the sides. The top and bottom are left open so the cover can slip over a hanger. There is ribbing at the top and bottom, and a lace heart in the centre of each piece.

COAT HANGER COVER (MAKE 2)

Cast on 13 sts using 4mm needles. Row 1 (RS) *K1, P1; rep from * to last st, K1. Row 2 (WS) *P1, K1; rep from * to last st, P1. Row 3 K1, M1R, knit to last st, M1L, K1. [2 sts inc'd] Row 4 P1, M1R, purl to last st, M1L, P1. [2 sts inc'd] Rep last 2 rows another 4 times. [33 sts]

LACE HEART

Row 1 K1, M1R, K11, yo, k3tog, yo, K3, yo, k3tog, yo, K11, M1L, K1. [35 sts]

Row 2 and all WS rows P1, M1R, purl to last st, M1L, P1, [2 sts inc'd] Row 3 K1, M1R, K12, yo, ssk, K1, k2tog, yo, K1, yo, ssk, K1, k2tog, yo, K12, M1L, K1, [39 sts]

Row 5 K1, M1R, K13, yo, ssk, k4, yo, ssk, k3, k2tog, yo, K13, M1L, K1.

Row 7 K1, M1R, K14, k2tog, yo, K11, yo, ssk, K14, M1L, K1. [47 sts] Row 9 K1, M1R, K17, k2tog, yo, k9, yo, ssk, K17, M1L, K1. [51 sts] Row 11 K1, M1R, K20, k2tog, yo, k7, yo, ssk, K20, M1L, K1. [55 sts] Row 13 K1, M1R, K23, k2tog, yo, k5, yo, ssk, K23, M1L, K1. [59 sts] Row 15 K1, M1R, K26, k2tog, yo, k3, yo, ssk, K26, M1L, K1. [63 sts]



Row 17 K1, M1R, K29, k2tog, yo, K1, yo, ssk, K29, M1L, K1. [67 sts] Row 19 K1, M1R, K33, vo. ssk, K32, M1L, K1, [71 sts] Row 20 P1, M1R, P69, M1L, P1. [73 sts]

BOTTOM OF COAT HANGER

Row 1 (RS) Knit.

Row 2 (WS) Purl.

Rep last 2 rows another 3 times.

Row 3 *K1, P1; rep from * to last st, K1.

Row 4 *P1, K1; rep from * to last st, P1.

Cast off in 1x1 rib pattern.

Fasten off leaving a long yarn tail for seaming.

MAKING UP

Stack the two pieces with RS facing together. Using the long yarn tails and a tapestry needle, seam one 'shoulder' together and then the other with mattress stitch. Weave in ends and turn RS out. Block gently to measurements either flat on on a hanger, following any yarn care instructions on the ball band.

STEP-BY-STEP K3TOG KNIT THREE STITCHES TOGETHER



Push the point of your right-hand needle through the first three stitches on your left-hand needle, going from left to right just as you would for a knit stitch.



Wind the yarn around the tip of the right-hand needle as if to knit.



Pull the yarn through all three stitches, again just as you would if working a knit stitch, and drop the three stitches off the needle.



Knitting three stitches together decreases your stitch count by two, and the decrease stitch leans to the right. This is how a series of k3tog decreases will look.



Notes Leave long ends at the beginning and end for sewing. Sew the seams with the RS facing using mattress stitch unless instructed otherwise.

CHERRY CUPCAKE

CAKE

Cast on 12 sts using 3mm needles and Yarn A.

Row 1 (WS) Purl.

Row 2 (K1, kfb) 3 times, (kfb, K1) 3 times. [18 sts]

Row 3 Purl.

Row 4 (K2, kfb) 3 times, (kfb, K2) 3 times.

[24 sts]

Row 5 Purl.

Row 6 (K3, kfb) 3 times, (kfb, K3) 3 times.

[30 sts]

Row 7 Purl.

Row 8 (Bottom edge) Purl.

Rows 9 to 19 Starting on a WS purl row, work in st st.

Row 20 (K2, kfb) 5 times, (kfb, K2) 5 times. [40 sts]

Rows 21 to 27 Starting on a WS purl row, work in

st st.

Row 28 (K2, k2tog) 9 times, K1, k2tog, K1. [30 sts]

Row 29 Purl.

Row 30 (K3, k2tog) 5 times, K2, k2tog, K1. [24 sts]

Row 31 Purl.

Row 32 (K2, k2tog) 5 times, K1, k2tog, K1. [18 sts]

Row 33 Purl.

Row 34 (K1, k2tog) 5 times, k2tog, K1. [12 sts]

Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten.

ICING

Cast on 10 sts using 3mm needles and Yarn D.

Row 1 (WS) Purl.

Row 2 (Kfb) 10 times. [20 sts]

Row 3 Purl.

Row 4 (K1, kfb) 5 times, (kfb, K1) 5 times. [30 sts]

Row 5 Purl.

**Row 6 K6, turn, leaving rem sts on LH needle and cont on this set of 6 sts only. [6 sts]



Rows 7 to 12 Starting on a WS purl row, work in st st.

Row 13 P1, (p2tog) twice, P1. [4 sts]

Cast off.

With RS facing, rejoin Yarn D to next 6 sts on LH needle and work from **. Cont in this manner until all sts have been worked and 5 sections of icing have been made in total.

CHERRY

Cast on 7 sts using 3mm needles and Yarn E.

Row 1 (WS) (Pfb) 7 times. [14 sts]

Rows 2 to 5 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st

Row 6 (K2tog) 7 times. [7 sts]

Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten.

CUP

Cast on 12 sts using 3mm needles and Yarn C.

Row 1 (WS) Purl.

Row 2 (K1, kfb) 3 times, (kfb, K1) 3 times. [18 sts]

Row 3 Purl.

Row 4 (K2, kfb) 3 times, (kfb, K2) 3 times.

[24 sts]

Row 5 Purl.

Row 6 (K3, kfb) 3 times, (kfb, K3) 3 times.

[30 sts]

Row 7 Purl.

Row 8 (K2, kfb) 5 times, (kfb, K2) 5 times.

[40 sts]

Row 9 Purl.

Row 10 (Bottom edge) Purl.

Row 11 Purl.

Rows 12 to 22 (K1, P1) 20 times.

Cast off in rib.

MAKING UP

With fastened-off yarn end of Cake, sew seam halfway. With cast-on yarn end, work a gathering thread along cast-on edge and draw it up tightly. Sew base seam halfway and stuff. Thread Yarn A and insert needle from opening and bring it out at centre of base panel. Pierce through Cake back and forth once more to secure thread in place

and flatten base. Close rem seam. With cast-on yarn end of Cup, work a gathering thread along cast-on edge and draw it up tightly. Sew seam as far as cast-off edge and encase Cake. Attach lcing to Cake. Using fastened-off yarn end of Cherry, sew seam, stuffing as you go. Attach Cherry to top of Icing.

CHOCOLATE HEART CUPCAKE

Work as for Cherry Cupcake, using Yarn E.

CUP

Work as for Cherry Cupcake, using Yarn F.

ICING

Cast on 12 sts using 3mm needles and Yarn B.

Row 1 (RS) Purl.

Row 2 (K1, kfb) 3 times, (kfb, K1) 3 times. [18 sts]

Row 3 Purl.

Row 4 (K2, kfb) 3 times, (kfb, K2) 3 times.

[24 sts]

Rows 5 to 6 Starting on a WS purl row, work in st st

Cast off.

HEART

FIRST HALF

Cast on 4 sts using 3mm needles and Yarn G.

Row 1 P1, (pfb) 3 times. [7 sts]

Break yarn and leave sts on a holder.

SECOND HALF

Work as given for First Half, do not break yarn.

Row 2 (Joining) K5, k2tog, with RS facing and working across First Half sts, k2tog, K5. [12 sts]

Row 3 Purl.

Row 4 (K1, k2tog) twice, (k2tog, K1) twice.

[8 sts]

Row 5 Purl.

Row 6 (K2tog) 4 times. [4 sts]

Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten.

MAKING UP

Make up Cake and Cup as given for Cherry





Cupcake, Using cast-on varn end of Icing, work a gathering thread along cast-on edge and draw it up tightly. Sew seam, stuffing as you go, and attach Icing to Cake. Fold sides of Heart toward each other and sew seam at centre. Attach Heart to Icing. Using Yarn B, embroider French knots on Cake for sprinkles.

ICE CREAM

CONE

Cast on 12 sts using 3mm needles and Yarn A. Row 1 (WS) Purl.

Row 2 (K1, kfb) 3 times, (kfb, K1) 3 times. [18 sts] Row 3 Purl.

Row 4 (Bottom edge) Purl.

Rows 5 to 17 Starting on a WS purl row, work in

Row 18 (K2, kfb) 3 times, (kfb, K2) 3 times. [24 sts]

Rows 19 to 23 Starting on a WS purl row, work in st st.

Row 24 (K3, kfb) 3 times, (kfb, K3) 3 times. [30 sts]

Row 25 Purl.

Row 26 (Top folding edge) Purl.

Row 27 Purl.

Row 28 (Ridge) Purl.

The previous RS becomes the WS from this point on.

Rows 29 to 33 Starting with a RS knit row, work in st st

Cast off

CREAM

Cast on 12 sts using 3mm needles and Yarn B.

Row 1 (WS) Purl.

Row 2 (K1, kfb) 3 times, (kfb, K1) 3 times. [18 sts]

Row 3 Purl

Row 4 (K2, kfb) 3 times, (kfb, K2) 3 times. [24 sts]

Row 5 Purl.

Row 6 (K3, kfb) 3 times, (kfb, K3) 3 times. [30 sts]

Row 7 Purl.

Row 8 (K2, kfb) 5 times, (kfb, K2) 5 times. [40 sts]





Rows 9 to 15 Starting on a WS purl row, work in st st.

Row 16 (K2, k2tog) 9 times, K1, k2tog, K1. [30 sts]

Row 17 Purl.

Row 18 (K2tog) 15 times. [15 sts]

Row 19 Purl

Row 20 (Kfb) 15 times. [30 sts]

Rows 21 to 27 Starting with WS purl row, work in st st.

Row 28 (K1, k2tog) 9 times, k2tog, K1. [20 sts]

Row 29 Purl.

Row 30 (K2tog) 10 times. [10 sts]

Row 31 Purl.

Row 32 (Kfb) 10 times. [20 sts]

Rows 33 to 39 Starting with a WS purl row, work in st st.

Row 40 (K2tog) 10 times. [10 sts]

Row 41 Purl.

Row 42 (K2tog) 5 times. [5 sts]

Row 43 Purl.

Row 44 K2tog, K1, k2tog, [3 sts]

Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten

MAKING UP

Using cast-on yarn end of Cone, work a gathering thread along cast-on edge and draw it up tightly. Sew base panel and join sides tog. Fold top edge outward at folding line and stuff Cone. With

fastened-off yarn end of Cream, sew seam and stuff. Create definition by working a gathering thread along decrease rows. To shape Cream, pierce it with a threaded needle from any point along decrease row and bring it out from base. Repeat the process several times back and forth. Sew Cream to top edge of Cone.

MINI DOUGHNUT

MAKE 1 IN YARNS A/D AND 1 IN YARNS A/H

Cast on 20 sts using 3mm needles and Yarn A.

Row 1 (WS) Purl.

Row 2 (K1, kfb) 5 times, (kfb, K1) 5 times. [30 sts]

Row 3 Purl

Row 4 (K4, kfb) 3 times, (kfb, K4) 3 times.

[36 sts]

Rows 5 to 7 Starting on a WS purl row, work in st st.

Break Yarn A and join Yarn D or H.

Row 8 Knit

Row 9 (ridge) Knit.

Rows 10 to 13 Starting on a RS knit row, work in

Row 14 (K4, k2tog) 5 times, K3, k2tog, K1. [30 sts]

Row 15 Purl.

Row 16 (K1, k2tog) 9 times, k2tog, K1. [20 sts]

Row 17 Purl.

Cast off





MAKING UP

Sew short edges tog, using matching colours. Using cast-on or cast-off yarn end, sew inner edges tog, stuff Doughnut, and close seam. With colour of your choice, embroider short lines on top of Doughnut for sprinkles.

COCOA BISCUIT

Cast on 10 sts using 3mm needles and Yarn H.

Row 1 (RS) (Kfb) 10 times. [20 sts]

Row 2 Knit

Row 3 (K1, kfb) 5 times, (kfb, K1) 5 times. [30 sts]

Rows 4 to 8 Knit.

Join Yarn B. Carry Yarn H up side of work.

Rows 9 to 10 Knit.

Break Yarn B and cont with Yarn H.

Rows 11 to 16 Knit.

Row 17 (K1, k2tog) 9 times, k2tog, K1. [20 sts]

Row 18 Knit.

Row 19 (K2tog) 10 times. [10 sts]

Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten

MAKING UP

Prepare two circles of cardboard, 4.5cm in diameter. With fastened-off yarn end sew seam up to edge of Biscuit. Encase cardboard circles and sew opposite side panel. Work a gathering

thread along cast-on edge and draw it up tightly. Pierce Biscuit from centre to centre to flatten it.

FILLED BISCUIT

BISCUIT

MAKE1IN YARNS A/E/A AND 1 IN YARNS G/H/G

Cast on 10 sts using 3mm needles and Yarn A or G.

Row 1 (RS) (Kfb) 10 times. [20 sts]

Row 2 Knit.

Row 3 (K1, kfb) 5 times, (kfb, K1) 5 times. [30 sts] Rows 4 to 8 Knit.

Join Yarn E or H. Carry Yarn A or G up side of work

Rows 9 to 10 Knit.

Break Yarn E or H and cont with Yarn A or G.

Rows 11 to 14 Knit.

Row 15 (K3, k2tog) 5 times, K2, k2tog, K1.

[24 sts]

Row 16 Knit.

Row 17 (K2, k2tog) 5 times, K1, k2tog, K1. [18 sts]

Cast off purlwise.

TOP FILLING MAKE 1 IN YARN E AND 1 IN YARN H

Cast on 6 sts with 3mm needles.

Row 1 (WS) (Pfb) 6 times. [12 sts]

Row 2 Knit.

Row 3 (P1, pfb) 3 times, (pfb, P1) 3 times. [18 sts]

Row 4 Knit

Row 5 (P2, pfb) 3 times, (pfb, P2) 3 times. [24 sts]

Row 6 Knit.

Row 7 (P3, pfb) 3 times, (pfb, P3) 3 times. [30 sts]

Rows 8 to 10 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st.

Row 11 (P3, p2tog) 5 times, P2, p2tog, P1.

Break varn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten.

MAKING UP

Prepare a circular piece of cardboard with diameter 4cm. With cast-on yarn end of Top Filling, work a gathering thread along cast-on edge and draw it up firmly. Sew sides tog, enclose cardboard circle and pull fastened-off yarn end tightly at back of cardboard. The knitted piece does not cover entire cardboard. Secure knitted Top Filling to cardboard. With cast-on yarn end of Biscuit, work a gathering thread along cast-on edge and draw it up tightly. Sew seam up to edge and encase Top Filling. Using cast-off yarn end, secure both Top Filling and Biscuit as you create a heart-shaped opening.

STRIPY SWEET

RODY

MAKE 1 IN YARNS B/C AND 1 IN YARNS B/E

Cast on 9 sts using 3mm needles and Yarn B. Row 1 (WS) (Pfb) 9 times. [18 sts]

Join Yarn C or E. Carry unused yarns up side of work

Rows 2 to 3 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st.

Change to Yarn B.

Rows 4 to 5 Starting on a RS knit row, work in

Change to Yarn C or E.

Rows 6 to 7 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st.

Break Yarn C or E and cont with Yarn B.

Rows 8 to 9 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st.

Row 10 (K2tog) 9 times. [9 sts]

Break varn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten.

SIDE PIECE MAKE 1 IN YARN C AND 1 IN YARN E

Cast on 6 sts using 3mm needles.

Row 1 (RS) Knit.

Row 2 K1, (k2tog) twice, K1. [4 sts]

Row 3 K1, k2tog, K1. [3 sts]

Row 4 Knit.

Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten

MAKING UP

With fastened-off yarn end, sew seam and stuff.







Work a gathering thread along cast-on edge and draw it up tightly to close. Attach Side Pieces.

MACARON

MAKE 1 IN YARNS D/B/D AND 1 IN YARNS F/B/F)

Cast on 10 sts using 3mm needle and Yarn D or F.

Row 1 (WS) (Pfb) 10 times. [20 sts]

Row 2 Knit.

Row 3 (P1, pfb) 5 times, (pfb, P1) 5 times. [30 sts] Rows 4 to 10 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st.

Row 11 (Ridge) Knit.

Join Yarn B. Carry Yarn D or F up side of work.

Rows 12 to 13 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st.

Break Yarn B. Cont with Yarn D or F.

Row 14 Knit

Row 15 (Ridge) Knit.

Rows 16 to 22 Starting on a RS knit row, work in

Row 23 (K1, k2tog) 9 times, k2tog, K1. [20 sts] Row 24 Purl.

Row 25 (K2tog) 10 times. [10 sts]

Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten.

MAKING UP

Prepare two circular pieces of cardboard with diameter 4.5cm. With the fastened-off yarn end, sew seam halfway. With cast-on yarn end, work a gathering thread along cast-on edge and draw it up tightly. Insert cardboard circles into knitted piece, adding stuffing between circles as well as at top and bottom of Macaron, Close seam. Pierce centre of Macaron from one end to the

other and gently pull thread to flatten Macaron.

MINI CHOCOLATE CAKE

CAKE

Cast on 10 sts using 3mm needles and Yarn H.

Row 1 (WS) Purl.

Row 2 (Kfb) 10 times. [20 sts]

Row 3 Purl.

Row 4 (K1, kfb) 5 times, (kfb, K1) 5 times. [30 sts]

Row 5 Purl.

Row 6 (Bottom edge) Purl.

Rows 7 to 16 Starting on a WS purl row, work in st st.

Row 17 (Top edge) Knit.

Row 18 Knit.

Row 19 (P3, p2tog) 5 times, P2, p2tog, P1. [24 sts]

Row 20 Knit.

Row 21 (P2, p2tog) 5 times, P1, p2tog, P1. [18 sts]

Row 22 Knit.

Row 23 (P1, p2tog) 5 times, p2tog, P1. [12 sts] Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten

ICING

Cast on 10 sts using 3mm needles and Yarn B.

Row 1 (WS) (Pfb) 10 times. [20 sts]

Row 2 Knit.

Row 3 (P1, pfb) 5 times, (pfb, P1) 5 times. [30 sts]

Row 4 Knit

Row 5 (Edge) Knit.

Rows 6 to 15 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st

Row 16 (K1, k2tog) 9 times, k2tog, K1. [20 sts]

Row 17 Purl.

Row 18 (K2tog) 10 times. [10 sts]

Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten.

CHOCOLATE STICK

Cast on 8 sts using 3mm needles and Yarn B. Rows 1 to 6 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st. Cast off.

CHOCOLATE STRIP

With Yarn G and 3mm crochet hook, make 15 ch. Fasten off.



WAFER

Cast on 6 sts using 3mm needles and Yarn A.

Row 1 (WS) Knit.

Row 2 (K1, kfb) twice, kfb, K1. [9 sts]

Row 3 Knit.

Row 4 (K2, kfb) twice, K1, kfb, K1. [12 sts]

Rows 5 to 7 Knit.

Row 8 (Picot) K2, (yo, k2tog) 4 times, yo, K2. [13 sts]

Row 9 Knit.

Cast off purlwise.

CHERRY

Work as given for Cherry Cupcake.

MAKING UP

With fastened-off yarn end of Cake, sew top panel and halfway along side seam. With cast-on yarn end, work a gathering thread along cast-on edge and draw it up tightly. Sew rem side seam, stuffing as you go. Pierce Cake from top to bottom to flatten base. Using fastened-off yarn end of Icing, sew seam halfway and stuff. With cast-on yarn end, work a gathering thread along cast-on edge and draw it up tightly. Close rem seam. Pierce Icing from top to bottom as for Cake. Sew Icing to Cake. Seam and stuff Cherry and attach it to Icing. Sew sides of Chocolate Stick, wrap it with Chocolate Strip and secure Strip to Stick, Sew Stick to Icing, Fold Wafer at picot row and oversew edge to Wafer. Fold piece in half vertically and stitch panels tog. Attach Wafer to Icing.

STRAWBERRY CREAM SCONE SCONE

Cast on 10 sts using 3mm needles and Yarn A.

Row 1 (WS) Purl.

Row 2 (Kfb) 10 times. [20 sts]

Row 3 Purl.

Row 4 (K1, kfb) 5 times, (kfb, K1) 5 times. [30 sts]

Row 5 Purl.

Row 6 (Bottom edge) Purl.

Rows 7 to 11 Starting on a WS purl row, work in stst

Row 12 (Ridge) Purl.

Join Yarn E. Carry Yarn A up side of work.

Rows 13 to 14 Purl

Break Yarn E. Cont with Yarn A.

Row 15 Purl

Row 16 (Ridge) Purl.

Rows 17 to 21 Starting on a WS purl row, work in

Row 22 (Top edge) Purl.

Row 23 Purl.

Row 24 (K3, k2tog) 5 times, K2, k2tog, K1.

[24 sts]

Row 25 Purl.

Row 26 (K2, k2tog) 5 times, K1, k2tog, K1.

[18 sts]

Row 27 Purl

Row 28 (K1, k2tog) 5 times, k2tog, K1. [12 sts] Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten

CREAM

Work as for Mini Chocolate Cake Icing, using Yarn D

STRAWBERRY

Cast on 7 sts using 3mm needles and Yarn E.

Row 1 (WS) (Pfb) 7 times. [14 sts]

Rows 2 to 4 Starting on a RS knit row, work in st st.

Row 5 (K2tog) 7 times. [7 sts]

Row 6 Purl.

Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten

BLUEBERRY (MAKE 2)

Cast on 8 sts using 3mm needles and Yarn F.

Row 1 (WS) (P2tog) 8 times. [4 sts]

Break yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull tight to fasten

MAKING UP

Assemble Scone body as given for Mini Chocolate Cake. Seam Strawberry, stuff, and attach it to Cream. Stitch ends of each Berry tog and attach to Cream.
