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

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

Editor's Choice

TEAM SOFTIE

This month Sara's following the Clover hype to find out if their Soft Touch range is as good as people say. (Spoiler alert: it is!)

A hook is just a hook, right? Wrong! I challenge you to go out there and find THE ONE – be it wood, metal, plastic, straight, ergonomic... there are just so many choices!

And one of those choices is the Soft Touch range from Clover. Like their popular Armour range, Soft Touch boasts an ergonomic plastic handle that's designed to minimise hand pain. But what makes Soft Touch different is the rubber thumb grip and a wider, shorter handle. If you prefer a smaller, lighter hook and a pencil grip then Soft Touch could be the one for you.

Renowned for their tapered metal points for smooth insertion, the Soft Touch range runs as small as 0.5mm, so you can stitch with surgical precision. And if that sounds like an optical challenge, don't panic! The hook sizes are large-printed and easy to read against that lush gold handle. Better yet, they're available to buy singularly, so you don't have to commit to a whole set if you're still on the fence.

I know I'm not the first to say that crocheting with Clover hooks is a lovely experience. Not only are they aesthetically pleasing, but they're specifically designed to prevent fatigue and keep you stitching for longer. So here's to one more row... and another... aaaaand another.



STUCK ON YOU

Keep your notes and lists organised with a matcha cake fridge magnet, complete with cream and a strawberry. A set would make a cute gift for a sweet-toothed friend.



FULL STEAM AHEAD

"I remember growing up and having this classic rice cooker with pink flowers all over it," Amy says. "As soon as you heard the 'pop!', you knew that meant delicious food was on its way."



KIMBAP BUNTING

With fluffy rice, hearty protein and colourful veg, Amy has fond memories of enjoying kimbap as an after-school snack

- Hobbii Friends Cotton 8/8 (100% cotton, 50g/75m), 1 ball of each: Pink Berry Smoothie (54), Sunflower (24), Hunter Green (116), White (01), Black (124)
- A 2.75mm (US C/2) hook
- 1 sheet of stiffened white felt 23x30cm
- Hot glue gun
- 5 red pompoms

TENSION

Tension is not critical, but it may affect the yarn quantities required

MEASUREMENTS

Each Kimbap measures approx 7.5cm (3in) in diameter

ABBREVIATIONS

invisible join Finish last st of round, fasten off leaving a 15cm tail. Thread the tail onto a darning needle and insert into the top of the second st of the round, working from RS to WS. Turn so WS is facing, insert needle down the centre of the final st of the round, pull so the loop sitting around the top of the first st matches the tension on the round, weave in end

NOTES

Pattern is worked in rounds with RS facing throughout. Change colour on the final yrh of st before colour change is indicated. Leave unused colour on the WS. When picking up the colour on the next round, it can be carried across the WS as this will be backed with felt.

KIMBAP BUNTING KIMBAP (MAKE 5)

Using Pink Berry Smoothie, make a magic loop. **Round 1 (RS)** Ch1 (does not count as st) 6dc in loop, ss to first st. [6 sts]

Round 2 Ch1 (counts as st from here to end), dc in st at base of ch-1, 2dc in next st, change to Sunflower, 2dc in next 2 sts, change to Hunter Green, 2dc in next 2 sts, change to Pink Berry Smoothie, ss to first st. [12 sts]

Round 3 Ch1, 2dc in next st, 1dc, 2dc in next st, change to Sunflower, (1dc, 2dc in next st) twice, change to Hunter Green, (1dc, 2dc in next st) twice, change to Pink Berry Smoothie, ss to first st. [18 sts]

Round 4 Ch1, dc in next st, 2dc in next st, 2dc, 2dc in next st, change to Sunflower, (2dc, 2dc in next st) twice, change to Hunter Green, 2dc, 2dc in next st, 2dc, (dc, ss) in next st, change to White, ss to first st. [24 sts]

Round 5 (Working in fl throughout) Ch1, 2dc, 2dc in next st, (3dc, 2dc in next st) 5 times, ss to first st. [30 sts]

Round 6 Ch1, dc, 2dc in next st, (4dc, 2dc in

next st) 5 times, 2dc, ss to first st. [36 sts] Change to Black.

Round 7 Ch1, ss in bl of each st around. Invisible join and weave in all ends.

TO FINISH

Trace around Kimbap onto the felt and cut out 5 circles.

Using a hot glue gun, attach a felt circle to the WS of each Kimbap.

Cut a 120cm length of White. Thread the pompoms onto the length of White, and spread them out evenly. Glue a Kimbap between each pompom.

Cut a small square of white felt and glue to the back of the Kimbap to cover where they are glued to the yarn strand.

BAO CUSHION

Bao zi means "little package" and is made with fluffy bread and a filling. Amy ate these when visiting her grandparents in Taiwan

- Hobbii Honey Bunny Big (100% polyester, 300g/120m), 1 ball of **Yarn A** White (01)
- Hobbii Friends Cotton 8/8 (100% cotton, 50g/75m), a small amount of each: Yarn B White (01), Yarn C Charcoal (123)
- A 7mm (US K/10½ or L/11) hook
- Fabric glue
- 2 safety eyes, 22mm
- Toy stuffing
- Poly pellets and a mesh pouch (optional to make this a weighted cushion)

TENSION

Tension is not critical, but it may affect the yarn quantities required

MEASUREMENTS

Cushion measures approx 27x23cm ($10\frac{1}{2}$ x9in)

ABBREVIATIONS

invisible join Finish last st of round, fasten off leaving a 15cm tail. Thread the tail onto a darning needle and insert into the top of the second st of the round, working from RS to WS. Turn so WS is facing, insert needle down the centre of the final st of the round, pull so the loop sitting around the top of the first st matches the tension on the round, weave in end For a full list, see page 78

NOTES

Cushion is worked using the amigurumi method. Work stitches continuously in a spiral without closing off each round with a slip stitch. It may help to use a stitch marker in the first stitch of each round, moving it up as you work. If you are making this as a toy for a child under 36 months, do not use safety eyes. Instead, embroider eyes using black stranded cotton.









BAO CUSHION

Using Yarn A, make a magic loop.

Round 1 Ch1, 8dc in loop. [8 sts]

Round 2 2dc in each st around 8 times. [16 sts]

Round 3 (1dc, 2dc in next st) 8 times. [24 sts]

Round 4 (1dc, 2dc in next st, 1dc) 8 times. [32 sts]

Round 5 (3dc, 2dc in next st) 8 times. [40 sts] **Round 6** (2dc, 2dc in next st, 2dc) 8 times.

Round 7 (5dc, 2dc in next st) 8 times. [56 sts] **Round 8** (3dc, 2dc in next st, 3dc) 8 times. [64 sts]

Round 9 (7dc, 2dc in next st) 8 times. [72 sts] Rounds 10-24 Dc in each st around. Fasten off with invisible join.

TO MAKE UP

For the assembly, the designer has created a video for a similar project she has made. You can view the video here: www.youtube.com/watch?v=SrRYV6xKP2c&t=28s

Cut a length of Yarn B, approx 60cm long. Thread onto a darning needle and tie the end to the Yarn A tail, to secure on the WS. Insert needle through st from Round 21 and weave back to WS one st over, *skip 8 sts, insert back to RS at next st and weave back to WS one st over; rep from * until you have 8 pleats forming. Leave strand attached to close up later.

Secure safety eyes over Rounds 13-14, approx 9 sts apart, with a pleat centred between eyes. Using Yarn C, embroider a single stitch for the mouth and shape down using a small amount of fabric glue.

Stuff with toy filling and pellets if making a weighted cushion.

Pick up the strand of Yarn A to finish closing the top. First make sts between the pleats to close the top fully. Then thread Yarn A through the fl of central st at protruding point of each pleat and pull tight to cinch the top.

Weave in ends.

PINEAPPLE BUN EARBUD POUCH

Use eyeshadow and hairspray to recreate the crumbly golden texture of Amy's pineapple bolo bun

- Hobbii Friends Cotton 8/8 (100% cotton, 50g/75m), 1 ball of each: Lemon (23), Nougat (09)
- A 3mm (US C/2 or D/3) hook
- Light brown stranded cotton
- Yellow felt, 10x10cm
- Fabric glueStitch markers
- Golden brown eyeshadow, brush applicator,

TENSION

Tension is not critical, but it may affect the yarn quantities required

MEASUREMENTS

Pouch measures approx 10cm (4in) in diameter

ABBREVIATIONS

invisible join Finish last st of round, fasten off leaving a 15cm tail. Thread the tail onto a darning needle and insert into the top of the second st of the round, working from RS to WS. Turn so WS is facing, insert needle down the centre of the final st of the round, pull so the loop sitting around the top of the first st matches the tension on the round, weave in end For a full list, see page 78

NOTES

Pattern is worked using the amigurumi method. Work stitches continuously in a spiral without closing off each round with a slip stitch. It may help to use a stitch marker in the first stitch of each round, moving it up as you work. The Pineapple Bun is made in 2 parts, which are sewn together.

PINEAPPLE BUN EARBUD POUCH

Using Lemon, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, 6dc in loop. [6 sts]

Round 2 2dc in each st around. [12 sts]

Round 3 (1dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [18 sts]

Round 4 (1dc, 2dc in next st, 1dc) 6 times. [24 sts]

Round 5 (3dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [30 sts] Round 6 (2dc, 2dc in next st, 2dc) 6 times. [36 sts]

Round 7 Dc in each st around.

Round 8 (5dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [42 sts]

Round 9 Dc in each st around.

Round 10 (6dc, 2dc in next st) 3 times, ss in next st, ch6, ss in next st, 4dc, 2dc in next st, 6dc, 2dc in next st, 6dc, dc in next st, change to Nougat, ss in same st as last dc.

[48 sts, 1 ch-6 loop]

Round 11 Ss in bl of each st around. Invisible join.

DETAILS

Refer to the image as a guide.

Using 2 strands of light brown stranded cotton, embroider 4 long horizontal lines and 4 long vertical lines. Secure each intersection with a

Trace the bun circumference onto the yellow felt and cut the circle out.

Using fabric glue, secure the felt onto the WS of the Top.

BOTTOM

Using Nougat, make a magic loop.

Rounds 1-6 As Rounds 1-6 of Top. [36 sts]

Round 7 (5dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [42 sts]

Round 8 (3dc, 2dc in next st, 3dc) 5 times, 3dc,

2dc in next st, 2dc, ss in last st. [48 sts] Round 9 Dc in bl of each st around.

Round 10 Dc in each st around.

Round 11 23dc, ss in next st, ch34, ss in next st,

Fasten off, leaving a 30cm tail.

TO MAKE UP

Using the Nougat tail, sew the Top to the bottom working through the bl only. Leave the central 12 sts with ch-sp loops at the centre unjoined for the opening.

Using golden brown eyeshadow and a brush, gradually build up pigment on each of the squares. Set the colour in place by spraying with hairspray.

Tiny stitches imitate this refreshing dessert that's infused with matcha powder, filled with cream and topped with fresh fruit ■ Hobbii Friends Cotton 8/6 (100% cotton,

50g/105m), 1 ball of each: White (01), Pistachio (108), Pomegranate (41)

- A 2.75mm (US C/2) hook
- A 1.75mm (US 5 steel) hook
- Scissors
- Fabric glue
- Superglue (the magnet will not adhere with hot glue)
- Round magnet, 1cm

TENSION

Tension is not critical, but it may affect the yarn quantities required

MEASUREMENTS

Magnet measures approx 3x3cm (11/4x11/4in)

NOTES

Magnet is made in 4 separate parts, which are glued together at the end. Each part is worked in rows.

MATCHA ROLL CAKE MAGNET CAKE

Using a 2.75mm hook and Pistachio, ch25.

Row 1 Dc in second ch from hook, dc in each ch across, turn. [24 sts]

Rows 2-7 Ch1 (counts as the first dc), dc in each st to end, turn.







Fasten off, leaving a long tail. Whipstitch the 2 long edges together.

CREAM FILLING

Using a 1.75mm hook and White, ch21.

Row 1 Dc in second ch from hook, dc in each ch across, turn. [20 sts]

Row 2 Ch1 (counts as the first dc), dc in each st to end.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail.

CREAM TOPPING

Using a 1.75mm hook and White, ch12.

Row 1 (RS) 3dc in second ch from hook, 3dc in each ch across.

Twist the Topping into a tight curl and ss into st to secure.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail.

STRAWBERRY

Using a 1.75mm hook and Pomegranate, ch2. **Row 1** (3-tr cl, ch1, ss) in second ch from hook. **Fasten off**.

Tie the yarn tails into a knot and cut them short.

TO MAKE UP

Lay the Cream Filling on top of the Cake so that the corners are aligned on the short edge without the yarn tails. Use fabric glue to secure the 2 parts together and then roll them into a spiral. Use the yarn tail from the Cake to sew through the piece several times to secure the spiral shape in place.

Using fabric glue, secure the Strawberry on top of the Cream Topping. Next, glue the Topping onto the Cake.

Using superglue, secure the Magnet onto the back of the Matcha Roll Cake.

RICE COOKER BAG CHARM

Steamed rice is a staple in East Asian cuisine. Add embroidery floral details to recreate the rice cooker from Amy's childhood

- Hobbii Friends Cotton 8/6 (100% cotton, 50g/105m), 1 ball of each: White (01), Silver (118)
- Stranded cotton in: light pink, coral, light green, light yellow, red, orange, silver
- A 1.75mm (US 5 steel) hook
- A stitch marker
- Metal wire
- Wire cutters
- Fabric glue
- Hot glue gun
- Toy stuffing

TENSION

Tension is not critical, but it may affect the yarn quantities required

MEASUREMENTS

Bag charm measures approx 5x4cm (2x1½in)



ABBREVIATIONS

invisible join Finish last st of round, fasten off leaving a 15cm tail. Thread the tail onto a darning needle and insert into the top of the second st of the round, working from RS to WS. Turn so WS is facing, insert needle down the centre of the final st of the round, pull so the loop sitting around the top of the first st matches the tension on the round, weave in end For a full list, see page 78

NOTES

Pattern is worked using the amigurumi method. Work stitches continuously in a spiral without closing off each round with a slip stitch. It may help to use a stitch marker in the first stitch of each round, moving it up as you work. Bag Charm is worked from the top down. The Lid Handle and the embroidered details are added before closing up the piece.

RICE COOKER BAG CHARM BUTTON

Using White, ch4.

Round 1 (RS) Dc in second ch from hook, dc in next ch, 3dc in last ch, turn to work down opposite side of foundation ch, dc in next ch, 2dc in last ch. [8 sts] Invisible join.

Tie the tails together on the WS and trim. Refer to the image when embroidering. Using red and orange stranded cotton, embroider the small lines on the button for lights. Using silver stranded cotton, embroider a line beneath the orange and red lights.

RICE COOKER

Using White, make a magic loop.

Round 1 Ch1 (does not count as st), 8dc in loop. [8 sts]

Round 2 2dc in each st around. [16 sts]

Round 3 (1dc, 2dc in next st) 8 times. [24 sts]

Round 4 (1dc, 2dc in next st, 1dc) 8 times. [32 sts]

Round 5 (3dc, 2dc in next st) 8 times [40 sts]

Round 8 Dc in each st to last st. ss in last st.

Round 9 Dc in bl of each st around.

Place live loop on marker.

HANDLE

Count 10 sts from last st and place marker in line with st between Rounds 6-7. Mark the opposite side with another marker. These show position of handle.

Cut 8cm of wire and insert wire from the outside in, bending 2cm on the inside of the lid. Work into the same st and weave White yarn from the outside in. Leave a 2cm tail. Using a hot glue gun, secure the wire and yarn tail on the WS. Wrap yarn tightly around the metal handle and leave no visible gaps until you have 2cm of wire remaining. Cut the yarn and leave a 2cm tail. Bend the wire so that it is curved and insert both the wire and the yarn tail into the second marked st. Secure the ends on the WS with the hot glue gun.







RICE COOKER CONT

Place live loop back on hook.

Rounds 10-19 Dc in each st around.

Place live loop on marker so you can sew on the Button and work the embroidery. The marker will be positioned at the back of the rice cooker. Work the embroidery on the front as shown in the image.

Using fabric glue, attach the Button over Rounds 13-17.

Using the stranded cotton, embroider the flowers and buds.

Using a single strand of green stranded cotton, embroider the stems.

Place live loop on hook.

Round 20 (3dc, dc2tog) 8 times [32 sts] **Round 21** (1dc, dc2tog, 1dc) 8 times [24 sts] Stuff as you work.

Round 22 (1dc, dc2tog) 8 times [16 sts] **Round 23** (Dc2tog) 8 times. [8 sts]

Fasten off.

Thread tail through fl of final 8 sts and pull tight to close. Weave in ends.

Turn so WS is facing, insert needle down the centre of the final st of the round, pull so the loop sitting around the top of the first st matches the tension on the round, weave in end For a full list, see page 78

NOTES

Parts of this pattern are worked using the amigurumi method. Work stitches continuously in a spiral without closing off each round with a slip stitch. It may help to use a stitch marker in

the first stitch of each round, moving it up as you work.

The Boba Cup is worked from the base up and is made in 3 separate parts.

BOBA STORAGE CUP

CUP

Using a 2.75mm hook and Nougat, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, 6dc in loop. [6 sts]

Round 2 2dc in each st around. [12 sts]

Round 3 (Dc in next st, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [18 sts]

Round 4 (Dc in next 2 sts, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [24 sts]

Round 5 (Dc in next st, 2dc in next st, dc in next 2 sts) 5 times, dc in next st, 2dc in next st, dc in next, ss in next st. [30 sts]

Round 6 Dc in bl of each st around.

Rounds 7-8 Dc in each st around.

Round 9 (9dc, 2dc in next st) 3 times. [33 sts] Trace the base of the Cup onto both the mesh sheet and white felt. Cut out the 2 circles and glue the mesh circle onto the inside of the Cup base. Next, glue the felt circle over it.

Rounds 10-12 Dc in each st around.

Round 13 (10dc, 2dc in next st) 3 times. [36 sts]

Rounds 14-18 Dc in each st around.

Round 19 (11dc, 2dc in next st) 3 times. [39 sts] **Rounds 20-22** Dc in each st around.

Invisible join and weave in end.

LID

Using a 2.75mm hook and White, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, 6dc in loop. [6 sts]

Round 2 2dc in each st around. [12 sts]

Round 3 (1dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [18 sts]

Round 4 (1dc, 2dc in next st, 1dc) 6 times.

[24 sts]

Round 5 (3dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [30 sts]

Round 6 (2dc, 2dc in next st, 2dc) 6 times.

[36 sts]

Round 7 (5dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [42 sts]

Round 8 (Working in fl only) (3dc, 2dc in next st, 3dc) 5 times, 3dc, 2dc in next st, 2dc, ss into the last st. [48 sts]

Invisible join and weave in end.

STRAW

Using a 2.75mm hook and Candyfloss, make a magic loop.

Round 1 Ch1, 6dc in loop, ss in bl of first st. [6 sts]

Round 2 Ch1 (counts as first st), dc in bl of each st around.

Rounds 3-7 Dc in each st around.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail.

Lightly stuff the Straw with yarn scraps. Sew the end of the Straw to the centre of the RS of the Lid, working through the bl only.

Trace the Lid onto both the mesh sheet and white felt. Cut out the 2 circles and glue the mesh circle to the inside of the Lid. Next, glue the felt circle over it.

TAPIOCA PEARLS (MAKE 10)

Make 5 in each shade of brown stranded cotton.

Using a 1.75mm hook, make a magic loop. **Round 1** Ch1, 8dc in loop. [8 sts]

Invisible join.

Tie the end to the beg tails to secure and trim tails.

Using the image as a guide, glue to the Cup.

TO FINISH

Using Black felt, cut out 2 small circles for the eyes and a small curved line for the mouth. Glue the facial features onto the Cup.



With cool cotton and a loose, airy drape, this casual but pretty T-shirt is a joy to make and wear on scorching summer days.

NOTES

T-shirt is made up of Front and Back. Front and Back begin with a strip of 6 Squares. Rows are worked across the base of the Squares for the Body and top of the Squares for the Shoulders. The Front and Back are sewn together before the Sleeve Cuffs, Neckline and Hem are added. When working in stripes, you can carry the unused yarns up the side of your work. Make sure you hide these on the WS when sewing the pieces together.

Model is wearing a size M.

You can adapt the length of the Top by working additional rows on the Body; this may affect the yarn quantities required.

T-SHIRT SQUARES (MAKE 12)

Make 6 in each colourway. Colourway 1 is

written first with colourway 2 in brackets. Using a 4mm hook and Yarn B (Yarn B), make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch3 (counts as tr throughout), tr in loop, ch1, (2tr in loop, ch1) 5 times ss to top of beg ch-3, turn. [12 sts, 6 ch-1 sps]

Fasten off.

Join Yarn C (Yarn D) in any ch-1 sp.

Round 2 (WS) Ch3, (tr, ch1, 2tr, ch2) in same sp, (2tr, ch1, 2tr, ch1) in each ch-1 sp around, s to top of beg ch-3, turn. [24 sts, 12 ch-1 sps]

Fasten off.

Join Yarn D (Yarn C) in any ch-1 sp.

Round 3 Ch3, 2tr in same sp, ch1, (3tr, ch1) in each ch-1 sp around, ss to top of beg ch-3, turn. [36 sts, 12 ch-1 sps]

Fasten off.

Join Yarn A (Yarn A) in any ch-1 sp.

Round 4 Ch3, (2tr, ch3, 3tr) in same ch-sp, 3htr in next 2 ch-sps, *(3tr, ch3, 3tr) in next ch-sp, 3htr in next 2 ch-sps; rep from * twice more, ss to top of beg ch-3, turn. [48 sts, 4 ch-3 sps]

Fasten off Size S only.

Fasten off Sizes L and 2XL only.

SIZES M AND XL ONLY

Next round Ch1 (does not count as st throughout), *dc in each st to ch-3 sp, (dc, ch3, dc) in ch-sp; rep from * around to end, ss to beg dc. [- (56: -: 68: -) sts, 4 ch-3 sps]

Fasten off.

JOIN SQUARES

Make 2 strips by whipstitching 6 Squares together, alternating colourways.

BACK BODY

Using a 4mm hook, join Yarn D in corner to work across long edge of strip.

Row 1 (RS) Ch1, work 83 (95: 103: 115: 119) dc evenly across edge, turn.

[83 (95: 103: 115: 119) sts]

Row 2 (WS) Ch3, tr in next 2 sts, (ch1, skip 1 sts, tr in next 3 sts) rep to end, turn.

Row 3 Ch3, *tr in each tr to ch-1 sp, ch1, skip ch-sp; rep from * to end, turn.

Change to Yarn B.

Row 4 Ch4 (counts as tr, ch1, throughout), skip next st, (tr in next tr, spiked tr, tr in next tr, ch1, skip 1 tr) rep across to final st, tr in final st, turn. **Row 5** Ch4, skip next ch-sp, *tr in each st to ch-1 sp, ch1, skip ch-sp; rep from * to end, turn.

Change to Yarn C.

Row 6 Ch3, *spiked tr, tr in next st, ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next st; rep from * across to final 2 sts, spiked tr, tr in final st, turn.

Row 7 Ch3, *tr in each tr to ch-1 sp, ch1, skip ch-sp; rep from * to end, turn.

Change to Yarn D. Continue to change colour every 2 rows in sequence set.

Rep Rows 4-7 until Body measures approx 36 (37: 40: 41: 43)cm, ending on either a Row 5 or Row 7 rep. To make the top longer, work to your desired measurements minus 8cm to allow for Shoulders and Hem.

Fasten off.

SHOULDERS

Using a 4mm hook, join Yarn C in corner of Squares to work across opposite long edge. Work as Rows 1-7 of Body, changing to Yarn B at end of Row 3, and Yarn D at end of Row 5. **Fasten off**.

FRONT BODY

Work as Body for Back.

SHOULDERS

Using a 4mm hook, join Yarn C in corner of Squares to work across top edge.

Row 1 (RS) Ch1, work 83 (95: 103: 115: 119) dc evenly across edge, turn. [83 (95: 103: 115: 119) sts] **Row 2 (WS)** Ch3, tr in next 2 sts, (ch1, skip 1 sts, tr in next 3 sts) rep to end, turn.

Row 3 Ch3, *tr in each tr to ch-1 sp, ch1, skip ch-sp; rep from * to end, turn.

Change to Yarn B.

Row 4 Ch4, skip next st, (tr in next tr, spiked tr, tr in next tr, ch1, skip 1 tr)rep across to final st, tr in final st, turn.

Fasten off.

LEFT SIDE SHAPING

Row 5 Ch4, skip next st, (tr in next 3 sts, ch1, skip ch-sp) 7 (7: 8: 9: 9) times, tr in next st, turn leaving rem sts unworked. [31 (31: 35: 39: 39) sts] Change to Yarn D.

Row 6 Ch3, *spiked tr, tr in next st, ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next st; rep from * across to final 2 sts, spiked tr, tr in final st, turn.

Row 7 Ch3, *tr in each tr to ch-1 sp, ch1, skip ch-sp; rep from * to end, turn.

Fasten off.

RIGHT SIDE SHAPING

Skip 21 (33: 33: 37: 41) sts from Row 3 for neck space and join Yarn B in next st.
Rep Rows 5-7 of Left Side Shaping.

Fasten off.

TO MAKE UP

Whipstitch the Front to Back at shoulders. Join sides leaving 17 (18: 20: 22: 24)cm gap for armhole.

HEM

Using a 3.5mm hook, join Yarn A in the side seam at base.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, dc in each st and ch-sp around, ss to beg dc, turn. work 1dc in

Rounds 2-3 Ch1, dc in each st around, ss to beg dc, turn.

Fasten off.

NECKBAND

Using a 3.5mm hook, join Yarn A in shoulder seam to work around neck opening.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, dc in each st and 2dc in each row-end around, ss to beg dc.

Work continues in rows.

Row 2 (RS) Ch6, dc in second ch from hook, dc in next 4 ch, ss in next 2 sts from Round 1, turn. [5 dc, 2 ss]

Row 3 Skip 2 ss, dc in bl of next 5 dc, turn. [5 dc] Row 4 Ch1, dc in bl of next 5 dc, ss in next 2 unworked sts from Round 1, turn. Rep Rows 3-4 until all sts from Round 1 have been worked into.

With WS facing, ss final row to base of Row 2.

Fasten off.



You can adjust the length of the top by working more or fewer rows on the body



The striped section is enhanced with texture by working stitches in spiked treble crochet

SLEEVES (MAKE 2)

Using a 3.5mm hook, join Yarn A in underarm seam to work armhole opening.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, dc evenly around armhole opening, ss to beg dc.

Work continues in rows.

Row 2 (RS) Ch6, dc in second ch from hook, dc in next 4 ch, ss in next 2 sts from Round 1, turn. [5 dc, 2 ss]

Row 3 Skip 2 ss, dc in bl of next 5 dc, turn. [5 dc] Row 4 Ch1, dc in bl of next 5 dc, ss in next 2 unworked sts from Round 1, turn.

Rep Rows 3-4 until all sts from Round 1 have been worked into.

With WS facing, ss the final row to the base of Row 2.

Fasten off.

TO FINISH

Weave in all ends and block to the measurements listed.

Round 7 (Dc in next 5 sts, 2dc in next st) 8 times. [56 sts]

Round 8 (Dc in next 6 sts, 2dc in next st) 8 times. [64 sts]

Round 9 (Dc in next 7 sts, 2dc in next st) 8

times. [72 sts]

Round 10 (Dc in next 8 sts, 2dc in next st) 8 times. [80 sts]

Rounds 12-20 Dc in each st around.

Round 27 Dc in each st around.

Round 28 (Dc in next 5 sts, dc2tog) 8 times. [48 sts]

Round 29 (Dc in next 4 sts, dc2tog) 8 times. [40 sts]

Round 30 (Dc in next 3 sts, dc2tog) 8 times. [32 sts]

Round 31 Dc in each st around.

Round 32 (Dc in next 2 sts, dc2tog) 8 times. [24 sts]

Round 33 (Dc in next st, dc2tog) 8 times. [16 sts]

Round 34 (Dc2tog) 8 times. [8 sts]

Fasten off.

Thread tail through fl of final 8 sts and pull tight to close.



SNOUT

Using Yarn A, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, 5dc into loop. [5 sts]

Round 2 2dc in each st around. [10 sts]

Round 3 (Dc in next st, 2dc in next st) 5 times. [15 sts]

Round 4 Dc in each st around.

Round 5 (Dc in next 2 sts, 2dc in next st) 5 times. [20 sts]

Round 6 2dc in next 5 sts, 10dc, 2dc in next 5 sts. [30 sts]

Rounds 7-8 Dc in each st around. **Fasten off**.

Stuff the Snout and pin to the Hedgehog so that the increase on Round 6 sits at the top. Once happy with the position, sew in place. Using black stranded cotton, embroider the nose.

EARS (MAKE 2)

Using Yarn A, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, 4dc into loop. [4 sts]

Round 2 (Dc in next st, 2dc in next st) twice.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail.

Sew the Ears 2 rounds above the Snout and approx 18 sts apart.

Using black stranded cotton, embroider the eyes. Using white stranded cotton, embroider a highlight on each eye.

LEGS (MAKE 4)

Using Yarn A, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, 6dc into loop. [6 sts]

Round 2 2dc in each st around. [12 sts]

Round 3 Dc in bl of each st around.

 $\textbf{Round 4} \ \mathsf{Dc} \ \mathsf{in} \ \mathsf{each} \ \mathsf{st} \ \mathsf{around, ss} \ \mathsf{in} \ \mathsf{beg} \ \mathsf{dc}.$



Before stitching the legs in the final position, make sure the hedgehog can stand up

Fasten off, leaving a long tail. Stuff Legs and sew to the base of the Hedgehog, making sure it stands before securing.

FLOWERS (MAKE 32)

Using Yarn B, make a slip knot.

Round 1 (RS) *Ch3, 2dc in last ch from hook, ch3, ss in ch at base of dc; rep from * twice



Use straight stitches with stranded cotton to embroider eyes and a nose

Fasten off.

Pin the Flowers over the top and sides of the Hedgehog. Once happy with the position, sew in place using the tails.

Weave in any rem ends.

SIMPLE STEPS HOW TO DECREASE IN DOUBLE CROCHET (DC2TOG)



1 Start by inserting the hook under the top 2 loops of the next stitch on the previous row. Begin to work a double crochet stitch in the usual way, working yrh and pull loop through (2 loops on hook).



2 Without finishing the first dc, begin the next dc by inserting the hook in the next stitch on the previous row.
Again, work yrh and pull loop through (3 loops on hook).



3 Now complete both dc stitches together by working yrh and pull this loop through all 3 loops on the hook.



4 This is how the completed dc2tog should look. You will have neatly decreased by 1 stitch. On subsequent rows, you can simply work a stitch into the top of the dc2tog stitch as usual.

Bobbles and coloured squares add a fun retro trim to plain jeans. Transform a pair of flares, bootcut or even shorts with this fun hack.

NOTES

Jeans have been embellished with Squares around the hem on each leg. Our jeans had a hem circumference of 48cm, so we've made 6 Squares for each leg. Measure the circumference on your jeans and divide the number by 8 to get an approx number of Squares you will need for each leg. Round this number down, eg: if your leg circumference is 43cm then you would need to make 5 Squares. Instructions are included to increase the measurements slightly if needed.
Squares are worked in 2 colourways.

JEANS SQUARES

Using Cumulonimbus (Cumulus), make a magic ring.

Round 1 (RS) Ch3 (counts as tr throughout), 2tr in loop, (ch2, 3tr in loop) 3 times, ch2, ss to top of beg ch-3. [12 sts, 4 ch-2 sps]

Fasten off.

Join Circumcumulus (Cirrus) in any ch-2 sp. **Round 2 (RS)** Ch3, (tr, ch2, 2tr) in same sp, 3tr, *(2tr, ch2, 2tr) in ch-2 sp, 3tr; rep from * twice more, ss to top of beg ch-3. [28 sts, 4 ch-2 sps] **Fasten off**.

Join Altocumulus (Altostratus) to tr before any ch-2 sp.

Round 3 Ch1 (does not count as st throughout), *1dc, ss in ch-2 sp, 1dc, skip 2 sts, (3tr, ch2, 3tr) in next st, skip 2 sts; rep from * 3 times, ss to first dc. [32 sts, 4 ch-2 sps]

Fasten off.

Join Stratus (Cirrostratus) to first st.

Round 4 Ch3, *tr in ch-2 sp from Round 3, tr in next dc, tr in next 3 tr, (2tr, ch2, 2tr) in ch-2 sp, tr in next 3 tr, tr in dc; rep from * 3 times more omitting final tr on last rep, ss to top of beg ch-3. [52 sts, 4 ch-2 sps]

Fasten off.

Join Cirrus (Cumulonimbus) in any st. To increase the size of your Squares work treble stitches in the next round instead of half trebles.

Round 5 Ch2 (does not count as st throughout), *htr in each st to ch-2 sp, (htr, ch2, htr) in ch-sp; rep from * around to end, ss to top of first htr. [60 sts]

Fasten off and weave in ends.

Sew the Squares together to form a two loops to fit around legs of jeans.

UPPER EDGING

Join Cirrocumulus to any st along the top. **Round 1 (RS)** Ch1, *dc in each st to ch-2 sp, dc in ch-sp, dc2tog same ch-sp and next ch-sp, dc in next ch-sp; rep from * around to end (make sure you've worked a multiple of 4 sts, adding

increases if needed), ss to beg dc. [108 sts] **Round 2** Ch1, (skip 1 st, 5tr in next st, skip 1 st, ss in next st) repeat to end.

[27 5-tr groups, 135 sts]

Fasten off.

LOWER EDGING

Join Cirrocumulus in any st along lower edge. **Round 1 (RS)** Ch1, *dc in each st to ch-2 sp, dc in ch-sp, dc2tog same ch-sp and next ch-sp, dc in next ch-sp; rep from * around to end (make sure you've worked a multiple of 4 sts, adding increases if needed), ss to beg dc. [108 sts] **Fasten off**.


Join Circumcumulus in any st.

Round 2 (RS) Ch1, 2dc in first st, *ch4, 3-tr cluster in third ch from hook, ch2, ss in ch at base of cl, ch2, skip 3 sts, 2dc in next st; repeat from * to end, ss to beg dc.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

TO FINISH

Pin the Upper Edging to the hem of your jeans. Once happy with the position, sew in place using Cirrocumulus.



Beachy coral hues, airy chain spaces and thin, tan-worthy straps – it must be summer time! This is one to stitch for the hottest days.

NOTES

Top is made up of 2 Panels. Each Panel is worked in rows throughout, then seamed together, with the seams sitting down the centre of the front and back. A Neckband is worked to form a tie closure at the back.

SUMMER TOP PANELS (MAKE 2)

Ch4, ss in last ch from hook to form a loop. **Row 1 (RS)** Ch3 (counts as tr throughout), 2tr in loop, (ch2, 3tr in loop) twice, turn. [9 sts, 2 ch-2 sps]

Row 2 (WS) Ch3, 2tr in st at base of ch-3, *tr in each st to ch-2 sp, (2tr, ch2, 2tr) in ch-sp; rep from * once more, tr in each st to final st, 3tr in final st, turn. [21 sts, 2 ch-2 sps]

Rows 3-4 As Row 2. [45 sts, 2 ch-2 sps]
Row 5 Ch3, 2tr in st at base of ch-3, *(ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next st) rep across to ch-2 sp, (2tr ch2, 2tr) in ch-sp, tr in next st; rep from * once more, (ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next st) rep across to final st, 3tr in final st, turn. [57 sts, 2 ch-2 sps]
Rep Rows 2-5 another 2 (3: 3: 4: 4) times.

[13 (17: 17: 21: 21) rows worked in total] [153 (201: 201: 249: 249) sts] Rep Row 2 another 3 (1: 3: 1: 3) times.

[16 (18: 20: 22: 24) rows worked in total] [189 (213: 237: 261: 285) sts]

SIZES S, L AND 2XL ONLY

Next row Ch4 (counts as tr, ch1), skip next st, *tr in next st, (ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next st) rep across to ch-2 sp, (2tr, ch2, 2tr) in ch-sp; rep from * once more, (ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next st) rep to end, turn. [197 (-: 245: -: 293) sts]

Next row Ch3, tr in each st and ch-1 sp to ch-2 sp (2tr, ch2, 2tr) in ch-2 sp; rep from * once more, tr in each st and ch-1 sp to end, turn. [205 (-: 253: -: 301) sts]

Rep last row twice more. [20 (-: 24: -: 28) rows worked in total] [221 (-: 269: -: 317) sts]

Fasten off.



Leave an opening at the back seam and work the tie fastening along with the neckband



As the seams are on the front and back, the centre of each panel sits below the underarm

SIZES M AND XL ONLY

Next row Ch3, tr in each st and ch-1 sp to ch-2 sp (2tr, ch2, 2tr) in ch-2 sp; rep from * once more, tr in each st and ch-1 sp to end, turn.

[- (221: -: 269: -) sts]

Rep last row once more. [- (229: -: 277: -) sts]

Next row Ch4, skip next st, *(tr in next st, ch1, skip 1 st) rep across to ch-2 sp, (2tr, ch2, 2tr) in ch-sp; rep from * once more, tr in next st, ch1, skip 1 st) rep across to end, turn.

[- (237: -: 285: -) sts]

Next row Ch3, tr in each st and ch-1 sp to ch-2 sp (2tr, ch2, 2tr) in ch-2 sp; rep from * once more,

Row 2 Dc in second ch from hook, dc in each ch and st to end. [216 (220: 224: 228: 232) sts]



SIMPLE STEPS HOW TO SEW SEAMS




1 Sewing with a tapestry needle is the regular and neat way to join seams. Place pieces of crochet WS together and oversew them as above, using a tapestry needle.



2 To slip stitch a seam, place the crochet pieces RS together. *Insert hook through both edge stitches, yrh, pull through to complete 1 slip stitch; rep from *, keeping the work fairly loose.



3 For a dc seam, place the crochet pieces RS together, or WS together for a visible seam. Work as for slip stitch seam, using double crochet instead of slip stitch.



4 A useful variation on the dc seam, the dc and chain seam is used when you need less bulk and/or greater flexibility in the seam. Work as for the dc seam, but work 1 dc and 1 chain alternately.





Paintbox Yarns Cotton DK (100% cotton, 50g/125m)1 ball of each:

Yarn A Candyfloss Pink (450)

Yarn B Pistachio Green (425)

Yarn C Bubblegum Pink (451)

Yarn D Banana Cream (421)

With blushing cheeks and pretty lashes, these happy fruits add a calming dash of pastel to baby's bedroom.

NOTES

Parts of this pattern are worked using the amigurumi method. Work stitches continuously in a spiral without closing off each round with a slip stitch. It may help to use a stitch marker in the first stitch of each round, moving it up as you work.

Be mindful when stuffing to achieve the perfect shape for each piece of fruit.

PFAR

Using Yarn B, make a magic ring.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, 6dc into ring. [6 sts]

Rounds 2-3 Dc in each st around.

Round 4 2dc in each st around. [12 sts]

Round 5 (1dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [18 sts]

Rounds 6-7 Dc in each st around.

Round 8 (2dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [24 sts]

Rounds 9-10 Dc in each st around.

Round 11 (3dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [30 sts]

Rounds 12-13 Dc in each st around.

Round 14 (4dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [36 sts]

Round 15 (5dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [42 sts]

Rounds 16-21 Dc in each st around.

Round 22 (5dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [36 sts]

Round 23 (4dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [30 sts]

Round 24 (3dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [24 sts] Stuff as you go.

Round 25 (2dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [18 sts]

Round 26 (1dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [12 sts]

Round 27 (Dc2tog) 6 times, ss in beg st. [6 sts] **Fasten off**.

Thread tail through fl of final 6 sts and pull tight to close.

STALK

Using Yarn C, ch9.



Each fruit is worked in the amigurumi technique, then finished with embroidery

Row 1 Ss in second ch from the hook, then in each st across.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail.

LEAF

Using Yarn C, ch9.

Row 1 Dc in second ch from the hook, dc in each ch across, turn. [8 sts]

Row 2 Ch1, 1tr, 2tr in next 2 sts, 1tr, 1htr, 1dc, 2ss, ch2, turn to work down the opposite side of foundation ch, 2ss, 1dc, 1htr, 1tr, 2tr in next 2 sts, 1tr, ss into side of Row 1.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail.

CHEEKS (MAKE 2)

Using Yarn C, make a magic ring.

SIMPLE STEPS HOW TO EMBROIDER FACIAL FEATURES



1 Thread the chosen yarn colour onto a tapestry needle. Insert the needle from the back of the head through to where you want to place the facial feature. In this example we are embroidering a mouth.



2 Embroider the desired shape. For the mouth, we have worked a straight stitch and anchored it one row down with a small stitch.



3 Once you are happy, insert the needle back through to the back of the head, through the same space where you began in Step 1.



4 Make sure that the 2 strands of yarn are protruding from the same space. Make a small knot with the strands of yarn and weave them back into the head.



Work cute, sleepy faces with embroidery stitches using black stranded cotton



For the cherries, make one stalk for the pair and sew the leaves halfway along it

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, 4dc into ring, ss in the first dc. [4 sts]

Fasten off, leaving a long tail.

TO MAKE UP

Thread the Stalk through the top of the Pear. Position the Leaf at the top of the Stalk and sew in place.

Sew the Cheeks onto the Pear. Using black stranded cotton, embroider the eyes and mouth.

CHERRIES (MAKE 2)

Using Yarn A, make a magic ring.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1 (does not count as st throughout), 6dc into ring. [6 sts]

Rounds 2-3 Dc in each st around.

Round 4 2dc in each st around. [12 sts]

Round 5 (1dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [18 sts]

Round 6 (2dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [24 sts] **Round 7** (3dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [30 sts]

Rounds 8-14 Dc in each st around.

Round 15 (3dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [24 sts] Stuff as you go.

Round 16 (2dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [18 sts]

Round 17 (1dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [12 sts]

Round 18 (Dc2tog) 6 times. [6 sts]

Fasten off.

Thread tail through fl of final 6 sts and pull tight to close.

STALK

Using Yarn B, ch21.

Row 1 Ss in second ch from the hook, ss in each ch across

Fasten off, leaving a long tail.

Attach a long tail of Yarn B to the opposite end of the Stalk

LEAVES (MAKE 2)

Using Yarn B, work as Leaf on Pear.

CHEEKS (MAKE 4)

Using Yarn C, work as Cheeks on Pear.

TO MAKE UP

Thread the ends of the Stalk through each Cherry, working from the top. Sew the Leaves to the centre of the Stalk.

Sew the Cheeks in place.

Using black stranded cotton, embroider eyes and mouth.

APPLE

Using Yarn C, make a magic ring.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, 6dc into ring. [6 sts]

Rounds 2-3 Dc in each st around.

Round 4 2dc in each st around. [12 sts]

Round 5 (1dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [18 sts]

Round 6 (2dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [24 sts]

Round 7 (3dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [30 sts]

Round 8 (4dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [36 sts] **Round 9** (5dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [42 sts]

Rounds 10-13 Dc in each st around.

Round 14 (5dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [36 sts]

Rounds 15-16 Dc in each st around.

Round 17 (4dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [30 sts]

Rounds 18-19 Dc in each st around.

Round 20 (3dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [24 sts] Stuff as you go.

Round 21 (2dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [18 sts]

Round 22 (1dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [12 sts]

Round 23 (Dc2tog) 6 times. [6 sts]

Fasten off.

Thread tail through fl of final 6 sts and pull tight to close.

STALK

Using Yarn B, work as Stalk on Pear.

LEAF

Using Yarn B, work as for Leaf on Pear.

CHEEKS (MAKE 2)

Using Yarn A, work as Cheeks on Pear.

TO MAKE UP

Thread the Stalk through the top of the Apple. Position the Leaf at the top of the Stalk and sew in place.

Sew the Cheeks onto the Apple.

Using black stranded cotton, embroider the eyes and mouth.

BANANA

Using Yarn F, make a magic ring.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, 6dc into ring. [6 sts]

Round 2 Dc in bl of each st around.

Round 3 Dc in each st around.

Change to Yarn D.

Round 4 2dc in each st around. [12 sts]

Rounds 5-6 Dc in each st around.

Round 7 (1dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [18 sts]

Rounds 8-9 Dc in each st around.

Round 10 (2dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [24 sts]

Rounds 11-21 Dc in each st around.

Round 22 (2dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [18 sts]

Rounds 23-24 Dc in each st around.

Round 25 (1dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [12 sts]

Stuff as you go.

Rounds 26-27 Dc in each st around. Change to Yarn F.

Round 28 (Dc2tog) 6 times. [6 sts]

Round 29 Dc in each st around.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail.

Thread tail through fl of final 6 sts and pull tight to close.

CHEEKS (MAKE 2)

Using Yarn C, work as Cheeks on Pear.

TO MAKE UP

Thread tail from Banana onto a darning needle and pull through the centre of Banana from base to top, pull to create slight curve to the Banana and secure with a few sts.

Sew the Cheeks in place.

Using black stranded cotton, embroider the eyes and mouth.

HANGING CHAINS (MAKE 2)

Using Yarn E, ch100.

Row 1 Ss in second ch from hook, ss in each st across.

Fasten off.

Attach the ends of one chain to the hoop. Attach the other chain in the same way so the cross over one another at the centre. Using Yarn E, attach a piece of fruit to the end of each Hanging Chain, where it's attached to the hoop.

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CREATURE COMFORTS

Author of *Amigurumi Critters*, Amy Ting is a master maker of creatures big and small! She shares the secrets of creating crochet you can cuddle or fit in the palm of your hand

ome love crochet for its texture, some for the patterns it can create, but for an ever-growing chunk of avid crocheters it's the sculptural effects 3D that get them hooked.

Amy Ting certainly falls into the latter category, confessing that she was 'mind-boggled' when she was first exposed to amigurumi back in high school.

Many years later, going through a rough time at work, Amy picked up a hook in an attempt to decompress. "After my first couple of very wonky crochet projects, I got the hang of 'sculpting' yarn into different shapes and sizes," she recalls. "It didn't take long before I jumped into designing my own patterns."

CROCHET GOES LARGE

Giant amigurumi is something Amy has become well-known for, even though it wasn't

her original intention: "They just happened to attract a lot more attention over my micro creations and I continued to build on that." Her first giant patterns were her Giant Bee and Giant Panda. As they took off on Pinterest, it sparked her to create more.

"For jumbo crochet, it's satisfying to see how quickly they work up!" she enthuses. "A cuddle-sized creation only takes a couple of hours. Making things proportional was a learning curve at first. Because of the way chenille yarn is constructed, it's not very forgiving if frogging it a bunch of times, which loften have to do during the design process."

To create her 'critters', whether big or small, Amy has an organic approach. Instead of sketching her ideas, she jumps straight into building the vision she has in her mind's eye. Most creations take about one or two prototypes until she's satisfied with them. Riding on a wave of the increasing popularity of amigurumi, Amy felt it was time to realise her dream to become a crochet book author. "I had initially begun reaching out to different publishers about three years ago. To my dismay, I received multiple rejections." This setback only spurred Amy to keep on sharpening her design skills. A while later, an email popped up from an acquisition editor and Amy's dreams became a reality. "I couldn't believe my eyes and I truly thought I was being pranked or something."

Amy worked with her editor to create a book about animals for all crochet levels, and so the journey of making *Amigurumi Critters* began. You can tell it was a labour of love for Amy, whose enthusiasm for the project is truly contagious! "One thing I believe really allowed me to run far was all the creative freedom I was granted. It truly felt empowering and exciting











to know that she believed in my designs and my vision. I'm forever grateful!"

The process of coming up with 25 designs for the book was something of a rollercoaster. Patterns can take Amy anywhere from two days to two weeks to develop. "I wouldn't be able to come up with anything for a couple of weeks at a time! Other times, the inspiration would hit me out of nowhere like a violent storm and I could pump out three different patterns within the same week."

CULTURAL CONNECTIONS

Amy is thankful to live in the San Francisco Bay Area of the US, where the artist scene is rich and lively. Inspiration has in the past come from her own heritage, especially her early designing days.

"As immigrants, my parents did the best they could to get us to assimilate so that we didn't have to experience the struggles that they did, especially when it came to language. Because of that, I didn't really grow up proud of my identity and had little interest in learning the languages," Amy explains. "Yet I still felt 'too Asian to be American', but 'too American to be Asian'."

Her design focus was therefore initially based on her Korean-Taiwanese heritage and culture - an influence you'll see in this issue's collection on page 14. "I created popular foods that I enjoyed eating whenever I visited Taipei like boba (sweet milk tea with tapioca pearls) and steaming hot baozi (fluffy buns packed with savoury pork and chives). I wanted my daughter's play kitchen to not only include

adorable crocheted burgers and ketchup, but also bok choy and soy sauce, you know?"

Another example of this came with a character that has been included in her book. Gertrude the Grumpy Chick was originally designed for Amy's first CAL, back when she was still relatively new to designing. "I wanted her to embody a grumpy/cute Korean grandma. You know, the kind who nags at you about everything but who will always make

sure you leave with a smile and a full belly. Gertrude eventually came to be my logo and the beloved mascot of curiouspapaya."

COMPLETELY HOOKED

Working from home, Amy converted a bedroom into her craft space, which has revolutionised her creativity. "I got rid of everything 'greige' and filled it with things that made me happy. Life's too short to be boring!" She has favourite yarns to work with, namely Hobbii's cotton yarns "because of the huge array of colours and because of the crisp stitch definition it makes. I favour 'yarning under' with my amigurumi, and this yarn works up very structurally sound." For jumbo creations, Hobbii's chenille yarns are her go-to choice.

Her favourite tools include her Clover Amour hooks and her metal darning needles. "I use a 2.75 mm hook for all 25 patterns in *Amigurumi* Critters," she explains. "I intentionally made each animal in the book small enough to fit into the palm of my hand, and so creating tiny details requires me to use tools that give precise and consistent results. The pointy heads of Clover hooks make a HUGE difference in my work."

As for what's next for Amy? "I'm excited for the release of my very first crochet book, of course! I definitely hope to start working on my next one as soon as I can. I'm also planning to expand my YouTube channel with a lot more video tutorials. Perhaps this year will be filled with more wearables and accessories!" **Written by Lucy Evans**

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



Work stitches in a continuous spiral without closing off each round with a ss. It may help to use a marker in the first stitch of each round, moving it up as you work.

SQUARE A (MAKE 12)

Work 1 Square in each colour sequence listed. 1: Yarn A Jade Gravel, Yarn B Cantaloupe. 2: Yarn A Orchid, Yarn B Deep Cerise. 3: Yarn A Fiery Orange, Yarn B Blossom. 4: Yarn A Deep Cerise, Yarn B Orange. 5: Yarn A Jade Gravel, Yarn B Fiery Orange. 6: Yarn A Blossom, Yarn B Coral. 7: Yarn A Cantaloupe, Yarn B Orchid. 8: Yarn A Orchid, Yarn B Jade Gravel. 9: Yarn A Deep Cerise, Yarn B Fiery Orange. 10: Yarn A Coral, Yarn B Cantaloupe. 11: Yarn A Blossom, Yarn B Orange. 12: Yarn A Deep Cerise, Yarn B Jade Gravel.

Using Yarn A, make a magic ring. Round 1 (RS) Dc in loop, ch3 (counts as tr, ch2), (3tr in loop, ch2) 3 times, 2tr in loop, ss to first ch of begin ch-3 to join. [12 sts, 4 ch-2 sps] Fasten off.

Work cont in rows across 2 sides of Round 1. Row 2 Using Yarn B, beg tr in any ch-2 sp, tr in next 3 sts, (2tr, ch2, 2tr) in ch-2 sp, tr in next 3 sts, tr in last ch-2 sp. [12 sts]

Fasten off.

Row 3 Using Yarn A, beg tr in first st, tr in each st to ch-2 sp, (2tr, ch2, 2tr) in the ch-2 sp, tr in each st to end. [16 sts]

Fasten off

Rows 4-9 As Row 3, changing between Yarns A and B every row. [40 sts] Work around entire Square for next round.

Round 10 Using Yarn B, (standing dc, ch2, dc) in first st, dc in each st to ch-2 sp, (dc, ch2, dc) in ch-sp, dc in next 19 sts, (dc, ch2, dc) in next st, 19dc down edge to unworked ch-2 sp from Round 1, (dc, ch2, dc) in ch-sp, 19dc evenly across next edge, ss to beg dc. [84 sts] Fasten off, leaving a long tail.

SQUARE B (MAKE 1)

Square B will sit at the centre of the Bag base. Using Jade Gravel, make a magic loop. Round 1 (RS) As Round 1 of Square A. [12 sts, 4 ch-2 sps]

Fasten off.

Round 2 Using Blossom, beg tr in any ch-2 sp, (tr, ch2, 2tr) in same ch-sp, *tr in each st to ch-2

sp, (2tr, ch2, 2tr) in ch-sp; rep from * around to end, ss to top of beg tr. [28 sts, 4 ch-2 sps]

Fasten off.

Rounds 3-5 As Round 2, changing between Jade Gravel and Blossom every round. [76 sts, 4 ch-2 sps]

Fasten off.

Round 6 Join Blossom with a standing dc in any ch-2 sp, ch2, dc in that same sp, dc in each st to next ch-sp, (dc, ch2, dc) in ch-sp; rep from * around to end, ss to beg dc. [84 sts]

Fasten off, leaving a long tail.

Using a mattress stitch seam, join the Squares together using the Diagram for placement.

HANDLES

Join Deep Cerise with a standing dc in ch-2 sp as shown with red star on Diagram.

Round 1 Ch2, dc in same sp, *dc in next 21 sts, dc3tog over 3 ch-sps, pm in last st, dc in next 21 sts**, (dc, ch2, dc) in next ch-sp; rep from * 3 times more ending final rep at **. [180 sts, 4 ch-2 sp]

Round 2 *Dc in each st to ch-2 sp, (dc, ch2, dc) in ch-sp, dc to 1 st before marker, dc3tog, move $marker \ to \ last \ st; rep \ from \ * \ around \ to \ end.$ Round 3 *Dc in each st to ch-sp, dc in ch-sp, ch80, skip 43 sts, dc in next ch-sp, remove marker from skipped sts, dc in each st to 1 st before next marker, dc3tog; rep from * once more, dc in each st to end. [90 sts, 2 ch-80 sps] Round 4 *Dc in each st and ch to 1 st before marker, dc3tog, move marker to last st; rep from * once more, dc in each st to end. [246 sts] Round 5 *Dc in each st to 1 st before marker, dc3tog, move marker to last st; rep from * once more, dc in each st to end, ss to beg dc. [242 sts]

Fasten off.

Join Cantaloupe with a standing dc in first st. **Round 6** As Round 5. [238 sts] Fasten off.

Join Deep Cerise with a standing dc in first st. Rounds 7-8 *Dc in each st to 1 st before marker, dc3tog, move marker to last st; rep from * once more, dc in each st to end. [230 sts] Fasten off and weave in ends.

You can make the tray in any colours you like, but golden yellow and dark purple are the go-to for working up an appetite!

Round 3 Ch1, *dc in each st to ch-2 sp, (dc, ch2, dc) in ch-sp; rep from * around to end, ss to beg dc. [48 sts, 4 ch-2 sps]

Rounds 4-5 As Round 3. [64 sts, 4 ch-2 sps] **Fasten off** Yarn A.

[72 sts, 4 ch-2 sps]

[128 sts, 4 ch-2 sps] Fasten off Yarn C.

Join Yarn A in first st across either short side. **Round 8** Ch1, 9dc, ch8, skip 8 sts, 60dc, ch8, skip 8 sts, 51dc, ss to beg dc. [120 sts, 2 ch-8 sps] **Round 9** Ch1, 9dc, 8dc in ch-sp, 60dc, 8dc in ch-sp, 51dc, ss to beg dc. [136 sts]

Round 10 Ch1, dc in each st around, ss to beg dc. **Fasten off** Yarn A.

Join Yarn C in first st across either short side. **Round 11** Ch1, 9dc, 10 spiked dc in ch-8 sp from Round 8, 60dc, 10 spiked dc in ch-8 sp from Round 8, 51dc, ss to beg dc. [140 sts]

Round 12 Ss in each st around. **Fasten off** and weave in all ends.

TO FINISH

With RS facing, ss across the foundation chain at centre of Base to reinforce.

Spray with starch and leave to dry.

There is a table showing the colourways used on each Square. Change colour on the final yrh of row. Work over yarn tails to reduce the number of ends you need to weave in. When working the Squares and Border, increases are worked into the corner dtr. If you find it difficult to differentiate between a tr and dtr, place a marker in the dtr, moving the marker up as you go.

BLANKET

MITRED SQUARES (MAKE 25)

Work in colour sequence listed in table, using Old Lace for the final 3-4 rows.

Ch4, ss in last ch from hook to form a loop. **Row 1 (RS)** Ch2 (counts as tr throughout), (tr, dtr, 2tr) into loop, turn. [5 sts]

Row 2 Ch2, tr in next tr, (2tr, dtr, 2tr) in dtr, tr in next 2 tr, turn. [9 sts]

Row 3 Ch2, tr in each tr to corner dtr, (2tr, dtr, 2tr) in dtr, tr in each tr to end, turn. [13 sts]
Rows 4-25 As Row 3. [101 sts at end of Row 25]

TO MAKE UP

Arrange the Squares in a 5x5 formation, with Squares 1-5 on the first row, Squares 6-10 on the second, and so on.

Using Old Lace, ss the Squares together.

Border is worked across the left-hand side and

Row 2 (WS) Ch2, tr in each tr to dtr, (2tr, dtr, 2tr) in dtr, tr in each st to end, turn.

Rows 3-4 As Row 2.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

SIMPLE STEPS HOW TO WORK A SLIP STITCH SEAM



1 First, make sure you fasten off, weave in ends and block pieces. Place pieces RS together. Insert hook into the first stitch on both pieces. Make a slip knot and place it onto the hook.



2 Pull the slip knot through both stitches to bring it to the front. Now insert hook into the second stitch of both layers and work a slip stitch. Work a slip stitch in the third stitches of both layers.



3 Continue working slip sts along the edge, as far as you need to. Fasten off, weave in ends, open out the seam and lightly press from the WS.



4 From the RS, the slip stitch seam forms an 'invisible' join (see above). It forms a firm, flat seam that doesn't give much stretch. It's best to use a matching yarn.

A gentle but striking ombre blend calls to mind summer sunsets and fruity cocktails. Tuck into a yummy yarn cake to get started.

NOTES

Shawl is worked in rows throughout. We worked the yarn from centre out to create colour scheme pictured.

Before you begin, cut 26 lengths of yarn from start of cake, approx 40cm long. This will be used to make the tassels at the end.

SHAWL

Ch314.

Row 1 Dc in second ch from hook, dc in each ch across, turn. [313 sts]

Row 2 Ch4 (counts as tr, ch1 throughout), skip next st, (tr in next st, ch1, skip 1 st) repeat to last 2 sts, ch1, tr in last st, turn. [157 tr, 156 ch-1 sps] Count ch-1 sps as a st in next row.

Row 3 Ch3, 3tr in st at base of ch-3, (tr7tog, 7tr in the next st) 38 times, tr7tog, 4tr in last st, turn.

Rows 4-43 Repeat Rows 2-3.

Row 44 Repeat Row 2.

Row 45 Ch1, dc in each st and ch-sp across. [313 sts]

Fasten off.

TO FINISH

Using the lengths of yarn cut before you began, attach 13 to each corner on Row 1 with a lark's head knot.

Cut 26 lengths of yarn from where you fastened off and attach 13 strands in same way to the corners on the final row. Trim the tassels to desired length.

Weave in any ends.

SIMPLE STEPS HOW TO WORK A LARK'S HEAD KNOT



1 Follow the instructions in the pattern, or try this method. Cut 2 pieces of yarn, twice as long as you want the tassel/fringe to be. Fold in half.



2 Insert hook through the edge of the fabric, where you want the first tassel/fringe to be placed. Place centre of folded yarn over the hook and pull through the fabric.



3 Pull the yarn to make a small loop next to the fabric. Pass the ends of the yarn lengths through this loop and pull tight to secure.



4 Repeat from step 1 to make more tassels or fringe sections. Finally, trim to your desired length for a neat finish.



Prochet on the curriculum

Crochet improves problem-solving skills, determination and self-confidence. So why aren't crafts given more priority at school?

ack in March, the UK Government published its Curriculum and Assessments Review Interim Report, laying out some of the findings that will guide changes planned to make schooling more effective for a wider range of learning styles, and potentially shifting the emphasis from traditional academic subjects such as English, Maths and Science.

As the UK education system undergoes the biggest curriculum review in decades, we look into what is, and isn't, happening in schools.

A VITAL SKILL SET

Paul Truan, a primary school teacher and Design and Technology (DT) lead at St Peter's Primary School in South Gloucestershire, guides implementation of the DT curriculum for a cluster of six schools. This includes textiles and yarn crafts for around 900 pupils.

"Each school organises it differently," he explains. "Some do weekly sessions throughout a term, while others spend a week or two focusing on textiles every afternoon."

DT was known as Craft, Design and Technology (CDT) until the introduction of the National Curriculum in 1989. It must be provided by schools in Key Stages 1 (ages five to seven), 2 (ages seven to 11) and 3 (ages 11 to 14), and among the optional subjects which schools offer at Key Stage 4 (ages 14 to 16).

"In Key Stage 1, lower Key Stage 2 and upper Key Stage 2, pupils complete a textiles 'design and make task' where they follow a design process, developing technical and practical knowledge through deciding what to make, designing, planning and making," Paul says.

Each projects lasts six to eight hours in total. "When designing the DT curriculum, we choose projects based on the knowledge and skills that children need to ensure progression across the school," Paul says. "As a result, they benefit from gaining aptitudes like creativity and fine motor skills."

Crochet designer Lindsay Weston agrees that crochet helps children develop positive characteristics. "I think it fosters patience, concentration and imagination. It's brilliant for mental health as you have to give it your total concentration. Also, in this time of an abundance of screens, it's a great alternative to playing on a tablet or watching TV."

Designer, author and workshop leader Dedri Uys sees crochet as providing a vital respite from our busy modern world. "I think we live in an era when kids find it tricky to concentrate," she says. "When they're learning to crochet they fully engage with whoever is teaching them and are completely focused."

Crochet also naturally helps to focus a scattered mind. "It offers calm and a respite from the noise in their minds," Dedri remarks.

"For my youngest, who is quite energetic, it's like a mindfulness practice."

ATANGLED ISSUE

For its Curriculum and Assessments Review Interim Report, the UK Government polled Key Stage 4 learners and their parents, asking, "Which, if any, of the following areas would you have liked your child to spend more time on between Year 7 and 11?"

More than 30 per cent of the parents polled suggested more time should be spent on Design and Technology, along with 19 per cent of Key Stage 4 learners. It shows how much parents and pupils feel the curriculum needs to shift to incorporate more hands-on skills.

Things are even more complicated in the US, where founder of the American Crochet Association, Salena Baca, is keen for crochet to become an intrinsic part of American schooling. Salena attended high school in Georgia, USA, where Art (which crafts are included under) tends to be an elective, meaning pupils can choose not to learn any Art subjects at all. "The lessons were self-guided and we could choose to learn drawing or crochet," she recalls. "My youngest is currently in high school, and Art electives are pottery and drawing."

While crochet can be learnt at any age, there are distinct advantages to starting

young. "Kids tend to come more as a blank slate," says Dedri. "They approach it as a game, they have some fun, they get frustrated, have a break, and come back when they're ready to continue. Grown ups don't always know when to hit pause," she adds. "Children have fewer hang-ups, more openness to exploring and learning – if they get it wrong they don't feel they're stupid. Their identity isn't tied up in it. There's less to unlearn and relearn."

Dedri's three sons Pieter, Jaco and Xander each asked to learn crochet when they were around seven years old. "They were intrigued by the craft they always saw me doing," she says. "Then when they were each around ten years old, they had a craft class at their primary school. This was carried out at lunchtimes with a particular teacher. You need someone with the passion to inspire the kids."

ONE STITCH AT A TIME

Dedri was seven when her dad's mum taught her to crochet. "When I finally managed it, I thought, 'Great, I can do this.' I remember running up to show my mum with such pride. It's about self-acceptance and recognising that you can sit down and make a pattern one stitch at a time, and feeling, 'I've achieved something, I'm OK and actually I'm quite kickass."

For young people who take to crochet, the advantages are unbeatable. "They gain patience and resilience when they make a mistake and have to undo what they've done," Dedri says. "They learn three-dimensional

problem-solving. The steps are just reachable enough to keep you motivated."

Lyla, aged 12, was using online tutorials to teach herself to crochet when she spotted a lunchtime crochet club at school, led by a crochet-loving science technician and a pair of Year 12s. "We started with quite a few people taking part but some dropped out when they found it hard," Lyla says. She kept going because, as she puts it, "As soon as you learn to do a foundation chain it all just kind of follows."

She's learnt to overcome a lot of challenges through persistence. "I was working on a project but then the stitches didn't add up and everything looked wonky – I had to go back and undo almost everything and redo it, which was really frustrating, but it was worth it."

Crochet has also taught Lyla the value of delayed gratification. "It can be difficult to keep going with one project, because you find yourself wanting to start a new one, but I remind myself how good it will feel when I finish. That's really rewarding."

EVERY CHILD IS DIFFERENT

It's important to remember that not every child will relish crochet the way you do. "I've taught both my kids how to crochet," says Salena. "My oldest picked it up right away at around five years old and still crochets today. My youngest gave it a few tries and has completely lost interest."

Lindsay had a similar experience. "None of my three children have the slightest interest in

crochet. I tried to teach them, but it wasn't really for them, sadly." Even Lindsay herself took a while to get hooked on crochet. "I was probably around 11 years old when I first crocheted, although I didn't stick with it. I picked up a hook again seriously when I was expecting my third child 14 years ago."

Dedri is fortunate to come from a family of keen crocheters and crafters, and is passionate about this international and intergenerational community. "I love that my aunties in South Africa will send a photo of something they've made. There are threads that connect you and make you feel the world isn't as big."

Salena is also a strong believer that crochet provides lifelong rewards. "Crochet offers kids a great way to build community," she says. "No matter where life has taken me around the world, crochet has always helped me connect with new friends. Crochet is a constant source of connection and comfort wherever I go."

For Lyla, it's all about learning something that's both enjoyable and challenging. "My friends and I will sit out in the sunshine and crochet and chat," she says. "I just love crochet and how it works. For me it's really fun."

ABBREVIATIONS

loop st Wrap working yarn around the index finger on your yarn holding hand, insert hook in next st, yrh with 2 strands below loop on finger and draw through st, yrh and pull through all loops on hook, remove loop from finger For a full list, see page 78 This colourful piñata is too cute to break apart! Instead, keep a tight tension, fill with stuffing and jazz up a child's bedroom or nursery.

NOTES

Piñata is made up of separate pieces, which are sewn together.

Loop stitches are worked with the WS facing so that the loops will sit on the RS when finished.

PIÑATA

LEG ONE (MAKE 2)

Using a 3.5mm hook and Yarn A, ch10.

Row 1 (RS) Dc in second ch from hook, dc in each ch to end, turn. [9 sts]

Row 2 Ch1 (does not count as st throughout), loop st in each st across, turn.

Row 3 Ch1, 2dc in first st, dc in each st to end, turn. [10 sts]

Row 4 Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn.

Rows 5-6 Rep Rows 3-4. [11 sts]

Change to Yarn B.

Rows 7-12 Rep Rows 3-4. [14 sts]

Change to Yarn C.

Rows 13-16 Rep Rows 3-4. [16 sts]

Fasten off, leaving a long tail.

LEG TWO (MAKE 2)

Using a 3.5mm hook and Yarn A, ch10.

Row 1 (RS) Dc in second ch from hook, dc in each ch to end, turn. [9 sts]

Row 2 Ch1 (does not count as st throughout), loop st in each st across, turn.

Row 3 Ch1, dc in each st to final st, 2dc in final st, turn. [10 sts]

Row 4 Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn.

Rows 5-6 Rep Rows 3-4. [11 sts]

Change to Yarn B.

Rows 7-12 Rep Rows 3-4. [14 sts]

Change to Yarn C.

Rows 13-16 Rep Rows 3-4. [16 sts]

Fasten off, leaving a long tail.

BODY BACK

Using a 3.5mm hook and Yarn C, ch52.

Row 1 (RS) Dc in second ch from hook, dc in each ch to end, turn. [51 sts]

Row 2 (WS) Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn. Change to Yarn D.

Row 3 Ch1, dc in each st across, turn.

Row 4 Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn.

Rows 5-8 Rep Rows 3-4.

Change to Yarn E.

Rows 9-14 Rep Rows 3-4.

Change to Yarn F.

Rows 15-20 Rep Rows 3-4.

Change to Yarn G.

Rows 21-26 Rep Rows 3-4.

Change to Yarn A.

Row 27 Ch1, dc in first 19 sts, dc2tog, turn, leaving remaining sts unworked. [20 sts]

Row 28 Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn.

Row 29 Ch1, dc in each st to last 2 sts, dc2tog,

turn. [19 sts]

Row 30 Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn.

Rows 31-32 Rep Rows 29-30. [18 sts]

Change to Yarn B.

Row 33 Ch1, 2dc in next st, dc in each st to last 2 sts, dc2tog, turn.

Row 34 Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn.

Row 35 Ch7, dc in second ch from hook, dc in each ch and st to last 2 sts, dc2tog, turn. [23 sts]

Row 36 Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn.

Rows 37-38 Rep Rows 29-30. [22 sts]

Change to Yarn C.

Rows 39-42 Rep Rows 29-30. [20 sts]

Row 43 Ch1, dc2tog, dc in each st to last 2 sts, dc2tog, turn. [18 sts]

Row 44 Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn.

Change to Yarn D.

Rows 45-50 Rep Rows 43-44. [12 sts]

Change to Yarn E.

Rows 51-54 Rep Rows 43-44. [8 sts]

Rows 55-56 Rep Rows 29-30. [7 sts]

Change to Yarn F.

Rows 57-62 Rep Rows 29-30. [4 sts]

Fasten off and weave in ends.

Sew a Leg One to the back and a Leg Two to the front end of the Body. You can use the image as a guide.

BODY FRONT

Using a 3.5mm hook and Yarn C, ch52.

Row 1 Dc in second ch from hook and in each st to end, turn. [51 sts]

Row 2 Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn. Change to Yarn D.

Row 3 Ch1, dc in each st, turn.

Row 4 Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn.

Rows 5-8 Rep Rows 3-4.

Change to Yarn E.

Rows 9-14 Rep Rows 3-4.

Change to Yarn F.

Rows 15-20 Rep Rows 3-4.

Change to Yarn G.

Rows 21-26 Rep Rows 3-4.

Fasten off.

Join Yarn A in 31st st across.

Row 27 Ch1, dc2tog, dc in each st to end, turn. [20 sts]

Row 28 Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn.

Rows 29-32 Rep Rows 27-28. [18 sts]

Change to Yarn B.

Row 33 Ch1, dc2tog, dc in each st to last st, 2dc in last st, turn.

Row 34 Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn. Row 35 Ch1, dc2tog, dc in each st across, ch7, dc in second ch from hook, dc in next 5 ch, turn. piece so RS facing once again and ss into 6dc, turn.

Row 36 Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn. [23 sts]

Rows 37-38 Rep Rows 27-28. [22 sts] Change to Yarn C.

Rows 39-42 Rep Rows 27-28. [20 sts]

Row 43 Ch1, dc2tog, dc in each st to last 2 sts, dc2tog, turn. [18 sts]

Row 44 Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn. Change to Yarn D.

Rows 45-50 Rep Rows 43-44. [12 sts] Change to Yarn E.

Rows 51-54 Rep Rows 43-44. [8 sts]

Rows 55-56 Rep Rows 27-28. [7 sts]

Change to Yarn F.

Rows 57-62 Rep Rows 27-28. [4 sts]

Fasten off.

Sew a Leg One to the front and a Leg Two to the back end of the Body. You can use the image as a guide.

EYES (MAKE 2)

OUTER EYE

Using a 2.5mm hook and Yarn H, ch2.

Round 1 (RS) 6dc in second ch from hook.

Round 2 (RS) 2dc in each st around, ss to beg dc. [12 sts]

Fasten off.

PUPIL

Using a 2.5mm hook and Yarn I, ch2.

Round 1 (RS) 6dc in second ch from hook, ss to beg dc.

Fasten off.

Sew the Pupil to the Outer Eye.

Referring to the image as a guide, sew an Eye to the Front and Back.

GUSSET

Gusset is used to join the 2 parts together. The Gusset is mase in four Panels.

PANEL A

Using a 3.5mm hook and Yarn A, ch14. Row 1 (WS) Dc in second ch from hook, dc in each ch to end, turn. [13 sts]

Row 2 (RS) Ch1, dc in each st across, turn.

Row 3 Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn.

Rows 4-15 Rep Rows 2-3.

Rows 16-21 Rep Rows 2-3 using Yarn B.

Rows 22-27 Rep Rows 2-3 using Yarn C.

Rows 28-33 Rep Rows 2-3 using Yarn D.

Rows 34-39 Rep Rows 2-3 using Yarn E.

Rows 40-45 Rep Rows 2-3 using Yarn F.

Rows 46-51 Rep Rows 2-3 using Yarn G.

Rows 52-57 Rep Rows 2-3 using Yarn A.

Rows 58-69 Rep Rows 2-3 6 times in Yarn B.

Rows 70-93 Rep Rows 22-45.

Fasten off.

PANEL B

Using a 3.5mm hook and Yarn A, ch14. Row 1 (RS) Dc in second ch from hook, dc in each ch to end, turn. [13 sts]

Row 2 (WS) Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn.

Row 3 Ch1, dc in each st across, turn.

Row 4 Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn.

Rows 5-6 Rep Rows 3-4.

Rows 7-12 Rep Rows 3-4 using Yarn B.

Rows 13-18 Rep Rows 3-4 using Yarn C.

Rows 19-24 Rep Rows 3-4 using Yarn D.

Rows 25-30 Rep Rows 3-4 using Yarn E.

Rows 31-36 Rep Rows 3-4 using Yarn F.

Rows 37-72 Rep Rows 3-4 using Yarn G.

Rows 73-78 Rep Rows 3-4 using Yarn A.

Rows 79-108 Rep Rows 7-36.

Rows 109-112 Rep Rows 3-4 using Yarn F. Fasten off.

PANEL C

Using a 3.5mm hook and Yarn A, ch14.

Row 1 (WS) Dc in second ch from hook, dc in each ch to end, turn. [13 sts]

Row 2 (RS) Ch1, dc in each st across, turn.

Row 3 Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn.

Rows 4-15 Rep Rows 2-3.

Rows 16-21 Rep Rows 2-3 using Yarn B.

Rows 22-43 Rep Rows 2-3 using Yarn C. Cont with Yarn C

Row 44 Ch1, dc in each st across.

Fasten off.

PANEL D

Using a 3.5mm hook and Yarn A, ch14.

Row 1 (RS) Dc in second ch from hook, dc in each ch to end, turn. [13 sts]

Row 2 (WS) Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn.

Row 3 Ch1, dc in each st across, turn.

Row 4 Ch1, loop st in each st across, turn.

Rows 5-6 Rep Rows 3-4.

Rows 7-12 Rep Rows 3-4 using Yarn B.

Rows 13-16 Rep Rows 3-4 using Yarn C.

Fasten off.

Holding a strand of each colour, wrap around the cardboard 10 times. Cut a long piece of Yarn G and thread it under the yarn at the top of the



Make a multicoloured tail by working a chunky tassel using all nine yarn shades



The body is worked in loop stitch, which involves wrapping yarn around your finger

cardboard. Secure tightly with several knots. Slide scissors underneath the yarn on other end of cardboard and cut. Cut another long piece of Yarn G and tie a quarter of the way down from the top. Wrap yarn around the tassel a few times and secure tightly with several knots. Trim the ends of the tassel to neaten.

TO MAKE UP

Work all joining using a whipstitch. Sew the end of Panel A to the end of Panel B. Sew the beginning of Panel B to the beginning of Panel C. Sew the end of Panel C to the end of Panel D. Sew the beginning of Panel D to the beginning of Panel A. You will now have a loop to fit around the edges of the Front/Back. Pin the Gusset to the Back, matching the row colours. Begin with the large section of purple that will sit at the top of the Body to make sure you get the correct position. Once happy with the placement, sew in place.

Sew the opposite side of the Gusset to the Front and sew together, stuffing firmly before completing the join.

Using Yarn I, embroider the nostrils. To define the neck and ears, embroider 2 small stitches below the neck and ear areas, using matching yarn and gather the fabric. Sew the Tail to the back of the Piñata.

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
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

ROW 4 Ch1, dc in first 4 sts, (5-tr cl in next st, dc in next 3 sts) rep to final st, dc in final st, turn.

ROW 5 As Row 3.



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HOW DO I COMBINE GRANNY SQUARES?

Brush up on your technique with our simple guide...

Arranging your granny squares together can sometimes happen naturally and easily – other times, it can be a bit harder. For example, when you have granny squares in different sizes and colours, it can be trickier to put them together in a layout that looks visually appealing.


This is when a little bit of maths and science can really help with our artistic choices – specifically, the Fibonacci

sequence can be really handy. It's a simple series of numbers: 0, 1, 1, 2, 3, 5, 8, 13, 21 and so on infinitely! Basically, you just start with 1, then add 1, then just add together the previous two numbers in the sequence. You can use Fibonacci numbers to help you plan what sizes of squares to make and how to put them together to create eye-catching effects. Let me show you more...

HOW DO I START PUTTING SQUARES TOGETHER?

Here's how to start combining squares...


Step 1 The simplest way to arrange your granny squares is to make them all the same size and then put them together in a grid formation like this. The '1' doesn't represent the square's measurements (they don't have to measure 1x1cm!) - the '1' just represents the fact that all the squares are the same size, which might be 10x10cm or 12x12cm or whatever you like. Even with a simple layout like this, there's still huge scope to create interest with different colours, motifs and shapes. Step 2 To go one step beyond and create a simple square layout using Fibonacci, just take two numbers from the sequence: 1 and 2. The '1' should still represent whatever size square you've made, such as 10x10cm - but the '2' squares should be twice as big as the '1' squares, such as 20x20cm. You can keep a simple grid layout, but alternate a '2' square with four '1' squares. You'll break up the simplicity of the all-1s layout and add more geometric interest. You can still play with colour and appliquéd motifs in this layout, and even create extra interest with your joining colour. See right for just one example of how to do this.




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
It's easy to come up with other arrangements...



Here's how to use the Fibonacci numbers to create more layouts with your squares: **Step 1** Let's keep the 1s and 2s from the previous layout but change their arrangement to create mini rectangles that tessellate together. This will give the '2' squares more visual weighting and make them look more dominant – try using the '1' squares to complement and enhance the '2' squares, like this layout. Or contrast with them!



Step 2 Now let's add another square so we have 1, 2 and 3. Your '1' might measure 5x5cm, '2' would measure 10x10cm, and '3' would measure 15x15cm. Combine them into mini rectangles and tessellate them together again. The large '3' squares will probably look the most dominant, but you can counteract this by using a brighter colour for the 1s so they catch the eye more. This arrangement opens up more creative possibilities for your squares.



Step 3 Let's keep the 1, 2 and 3 squares from the previous layout but change their arrangement to create a combination of '1' and '2' squares to match the size of the '3' squares. This layout uses more '1' squares to create the potential for a more interesting geometric arrangement. You can also use colour to enhance the layout – we've used shades of pink for the '3' squares, a muted pink for some '1' squares, and purple for the '2' squares and some '1' squares.

Have a play and see what arrangements you can come up with using Fibonacci and some interesting colours – the creative possibilities are endless!

Emerald isle

Add a little warmth and a lot of style to your outfit with this sophisticated neckerchief by Sara Huntington

This elegant and wonderfully wearable neckerchief is worked back and forth in rows and finished with a sweetly feminine ruffle.

NOTES

Neckerchief is worked in rows throughout. A ruffled edge is worked at the end.

NECKERCHIEF

Ch12.

Row 1 (WS) Tr in fourth ch from the hook, 2tr in the next ch, tr in the next 2 ch, 3tr in the next ch, tr in the next 2 ch, 2tr in the final 2 ch, turn. [15 tr]

Row 2 (RS) Ch3, tr in st at the base of ch-3, 2tr in the next st, tr in each st to 3-tr group, FPtr around next tr, 3tr in the next tr, FPtr in the next tr, tr in each st across to the last two sts, 2tr in final 2 sts, turn. [21 sts]

Row 3 Ch3, tr in st at the base of ch-3, 2tr in the next st, tr in each st across to 3-tr group, tr in next tr, 3tr in next tr, tr in next tr, tr in each st to the last 2 sts, 2tr in the next 2 sts, turn. [27 sts] Repeat Rows 2-3 until the work measures approx 30cm (12in) from Row 1 to the central 3-tr group in the last row worked, ending with a WS row.

Do not fasten off.

FRILL

Row 1 (RS) Ch1 (does not count as st throughout), 3dc into each st across, turn. Rows 2-6 Ch1, dc into each st across, turn. Fasten off.

TO FINISH

Weave in all ends. Block the Neckerchief gently to size.



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Crochet essentials



Over the next few pages, you'll find simple step-by-step guides to many useful stitches and techniques that you'll use every time you pick up a hook

HOLDING THE HOOK

Try these methods and see which works best



PENCIL METHOD Hold the hook like a pencil, in your right hand (if you're right-handed), about 3-5cm from the hooked end. If your hook has a flat area, you'll find it comfortable to hold it here.



KNIFE METHOD
Hold the hook between your thumb and forefinger, about 3-5cm from the hooked end, resting the end of the hook against your palm. This will give you lots of control.

HOLDING THE YARN

Even tension results in even stitches



METHOD ONE
Pass the ball end of the yarn
between the little finger and
third fingers of your left hand
(if you are right-handed), then
behind the third and middle
fingers, over your index finger.



METHOD TWO
Loop the ball end of the yarn
loosely around the little finger
of your left hand, then take it
over the third finger, behind
the middle finger and over
your index finger.

MAKING A SLIPKNOT The first loop on the hook



1 Hold the tail of the ball of yarn in your left hand and drape the yarn clockwise over the top of it to form a loose, circular loop.



2 Hold the loop between left thumb and forefinger, then insert the crochet hook through the centre of the loop from front to back.



3 Catch the ball end of the yarn with the hook and pull it back through the centre of the loop, taking the yarn through with it.



4 Pull both ends of the yarn to tighten the knot, then pull just the ball end to tighten the loop so it's close to the hook, but not touching it.

CHAIN STITCH Use this stitch to make your foundation chain



1 Hold the hook in your right hand, and both the yarn end and the working yarn in your left hand. Move the hook under and over the yarn to wrap it around anticlockwise.



2 Pull the hook towards the slipknot, catching the yarn in the hook, and pulling it through the slipknot loop. This forms your first chain (ch) stitch. Repeat steps 1 and 2 to form a chain length.



3 This is what your row of chains will look like. Hold the chain with your left hand near the hook, to keep the tension. Keep going until you have the number of chains that's stated in your pattern.

How to count chains



Each chain or loop counts as one stitch. Never count your first slipknot or the loop on the hook (called the working loop). So that you can be accurate, make sure the chain is not twisted and that the front is facing you.

YOUR GUIDE

SLIP STITCH (ss)


This stitch has no height - often used to join rounds



1 You can make a slip stitch in any chain or stitch, to join it to the working loop on the hook. To make a slip stitch, simply insert the hook into the stitch indicated, from front to back.



2 Catch the ball end of the yarn with the hook, so the yarn wraps anticlockwise around it (yarn round hook, or yrh).



3 Gently pull the hook, and the yarn wrapped around it, back towards the 2 loops on the hook. Draw the yarn through both the loops on the hook.



4 This will finish the stitch and you'll see how the slip stitch has joined the working loop to the chain or stitch you inserted the hook into. You can also use slip stitch to form a neat edging.

DOUBLE CROCHET (dc) US term: single crochet

One of the key stitches in crochet, doubles are simple, compact stitches that form a dense fabric



1 To make a double crochet stitch, insert the hook under the top 2 loops of the next stitch on the previous row.



2 Wind the yarn around the hook (yrh).



3 Pull the yarn through the stitch, giving you 2 loops on your crochet hook.



4 Yarn round hook again, then pull the yarn through both loops. There's your double crochet made and you'll have one loop left on the hook, ready to do the next stitch.

HALF TREBLE CROCHET (htr) US term: half double crochet

A handy stitch that's between double and treble crochet in size, and it looks slightly looser than double crochet



1 To make a half treble crochet stitch, work to where you want the htr and then wind the yarn round the hook (yrh).



2 Insert the hook under the top 2 loops of the next stitch in the previous row. Wrap yarn around the hook again (yrh).



3 Pull the yarn through the stitch only (3 loops on hook).



4 Yarn round hook again, pull the yarn through all 3 loops. You've made a half treble crochet. Continue working htr into next and following sts to the end of the row.

YOUR GUIDE

TREBLE CROCHET (tr) US term: double crochet

One of the most popular stitches in crochet, this simple stitch is twice as high as a double crochet stitch



1 To work a treble crochet, start by winding yrh and then insert the hook under the top 2 loops of the stitch on the previous row.



2 Wrap the yarn around the hook (yrh) and pull the yarn through the stitch only.



3 You will now have 3 loops on the hook. Yrh again, and draw the yarn through just the first 2 loops on the hook.



4 You will now have 2 loops on the hook. Yrh again and draw the yarn through the remaining loops on the hook. Your treble crochet is complete.

WORKING IN ROWS

Follow these simple rules to construct crochet fabric



1 The first row is made by working across the foundation chain from right to left. At the end of the chain or row, turn the work so that the yarn is behind the hook.



2 For the next row, first make the turning chain for the stitch you're about to work (see opposite). Now work the next stitch into the top of the stitches on your first row, missing the first stitch.

WORKING STITCHES INTO A RING

To make circles, tubes and other shapes



1 Make a foundation ring and work the t-ch (3ch for treble sts). Work a treble st as usual, but insert hook into centre of ring. For treble sts, yrh, insert hook into ring.



2 Finish the treble, as usual (yrh, pull yarn through ring, yrh, pull yarn through first 2 loops, yrh, pull yarn through 2 loops). Work more sts into the ring as needed.

DOUBLE TREBLE CROCHET (dtr) US term: treble crochet

This is a stitch regularly used as an elongated version of the treble (described above). It's worked in a very similar way to the treble, as follows:

- 1 Make a foundation chain. Skip 4ch, *yrh twice, and insert the hook under the top loop of the next ch.
- 2 Yrh, pull the yarn through the ch loop only (4 loops on hook).
 3 Yrh and pull the yarn through 2 loops only (3 loops on hook).

Yrh and pull the yarn through 2 loops only (2 loops on hook).

4 Yrh and pull the yarn through the remaining 2 loops. Repeat from * to make more dtr sts.

5 To make the next row of dtr, turn work and ch4. This turning chain counts as the first dtr in a new row. Skip first st at the base of the t-ch, work 1dtr under the top 2 loops of the second stitch in the previous row; continue to the end of the row.

TRIPLE TREBLE CROCHET (ttr) US term: double treble crochet

This is one of the longest standard crochet stitches and is mainly used in fancy stitch patterns. It's taller than a double treble crochet stitch (described left) and is worked in a very similar way, as follows:

1 Make a foundation ch. Skip 5 ch, *yrh 3 times, insert hook under top loop of next ch.



Tension is not critical, but it might affect the yarn quantities required

MEASUREMENTS

Bag measures approximately 23cm (9in) tall

ABBREVIATIONS

bead st (o/r) Change to a 2mm hook, place either an orange (o) or a red (r) bead on hook, insert hook in st indicated, yrh and pull through st, yrh and pull through bead and all loops on hook, change back to a 4mm hook

For a full list, see page 78 of Simply Crochet magazine Hot pink and orange beads zigzag across this miniature cotton pouch. Keep your tension tight so the bag maintains its shape.

NOTES

In this pattern stitches are worked continuously in a spiral without closing off each round with a slip stitch. It may help to use a stitch marker in the first stitch of each round, moving it up as you work.

There is a Chart on page 6, which you can refer to when working the beaded section. Each white square represents a dc st, red square represents a bead st (r) and orange square represents a bead st (o). The Chart is repeated 3 times on each round. The first 2 rounds of the Chart have been written out to guide you.

BEADED BAG

Using Natural, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1 (does not count as st), 8dc in loop. [8 sts]

Round 2 (RS) 2dc in each st around. [16 sts] **Round 3** (Dc in next st, 2dc in next st) 8 times. [24 sts]

Round 4 (Dc in next st, 2dc, dc in next st) 8 times. [32 sts]

Round 5 (Dc in next 3 sts, 2dc in next st) 8 times. [40 sts]

Round 6 (Dc in next 2 sts, 2dc, dc in next 2 sts) 8 times. [48 sts]

Round 7 (Dc in next 5 sts, 2dc in next st) 8 times. [56 sts]

Round 8 (Dc in next 3 sts, 2dc, dc in next 3 sts) 8 times. [64 sts]

Round 9 (Dc in next 7 sts, 2dc in next st) 8 times. [72 sts]

Round 10 (Dc in next 4 sts, 2dc, dc in next 4 sts) 8 times. [80 sts]

Round 11 (Dc in next 9 sts, 2dc in next st) 8 times. [88 sts]

Round 12 (Dc in next 5 sts, 2dc, dc in next 5 sts) 8 times. [96 sts]

Round 13 Dc in each st around.

BEADED SECTION

Round 14 *Bead st (o), dc in next 15 sts, bead st (r), dc in next 15 sts; rep from * twice more.

Round 15 *Dc in next 2 sts, bead st (o), dc in next 11 sts, bead st (r), dc in next 3 sts, bead st (r), dc in next 11 sts, bead st (o), dc in next st; rep from * twice more.

Round 16 *Dc in next 4 sts, bead st (o), dc in next 7 sts, bead st (r), dc in next 7 sts, bead st (r), dc in next 3 sts; rep from * twice more.

Rounds 17-22 Cont in patt set using the Chart for bead placement.

Rounds 23-40 Dc in each st around.

Round 41 Dc in bl of next 14 sts, dc in next 67 sts, dc in bl of next 15 sts.

Round 42 Dc in each st around.

Round 43 Ch1 (does not count as st



When adding beads into the fabric, change to a smaller hook to work the bead stitch



Begin the bag at the bottom with a magic loop and work in rounds up to the top edge

throughout), (tr in next 3 sts, ch1, skip next st, tr in next 2 sts) 16 times. [80 sts, 16 ch-1 sps] **Round 44** (Dc in next 3 sts, dc in ch-sp, dc in next 2 sts) 16 times. [96 sts]

Round 45 Dc in each st around, ss in next st. **Fasten off** and weave in ends.

FLAP

Join Natural to first unworked fl of Round 40. **Row 1 (RS)** Dc in next 29 fl, turn. [29 sts]

Rows 2-14 Ch1, dc in each st across, turn.

Row 15 Ch1, dc in next 14 sts, bead st (o), dc in next 14 sts, turn.

Row 16 Ch1, dc in each st across, turn.

Row 17 Ch1, dc in next 12 sts, bead st (r), dc in next 3 sts, bead st (r), dc in next 12 sts, turn.

Row 18 Ch1, dc in each st across, turn.

Row 19 Ch1, dc in next 10 sts, bead st (o), dc in next 7 sts, bead st (o), dc in next 10 sts.

Row 20 Ch1, dc in each st across, turn.

Row 21 Ch1, dc2tog, dc in next 10 sts, bead st

(r), dc in next 3 sts, bead st (r), dc in next 10 sts, dc2tog, turn. [27 sts]

Row 22 Ch1, dc2tog, dc in next 23 sts, dc2tog, turn. [25 sts]

Row 23 Ch1, dc2tog, dc in next 10 sts, bead st (o), dc in next 10 sts, dc2tog, turn. [23 sts]

Row 24 Ch1, dc2tog, dc in next 19 sts, dc2tog, turn. [21 sts]

Row 25 Ch1, dc2tog, dc in next 17 sts, dc2tog, turn. [19 sts]

Button loop is made over next round. You can adapt the length of the ch to fit the button you are using.

Row 26 Ch1, dc2tog, dc in next 7 sts, (dc, ch8, dc) in next st, dc in next 7 sts, dc2tog. [18 sts]
Fasten off and weave in ends.

DRAWSTRING

Holding 2 strands of Natural together and leaving a long beg tail, ch92.

Fasten off leaving a long tail.

Starting at the front of the Bag, thread the drawstring through the holes created over Round 43.

Thread 3 beads onto the yarn tails at each end and secure with a knot. Fray the strands of the yarn and cut to required length.

Pull the Bag closed and knot the strings. Sew a button to the centre front of the bag, in line with the button loop.

STRAP

Using Natural, ch201.


Row 1 (RS) Working in the bl of the ch, dc in second ch from hook and each of next 199 ch, turn. [200 sts]

Rows 2-3 Ch1, dc in each st across, turn. **Fasten off** and weave in ends.

Sew ends of Strap to sides of the Bag.







SIMPLE STEPS HOW TO DECREASE IN DOUBLE CROCHET (DC2TOG)



1 Start by inserting the hook under the top 2 loops of the next stitch on the previous row. Begin to work a double crochet stitch in the usual way, working yrh and pull loop through (2 loops on hook).



2 Without finishing the first dc, begin the next dc by inserting the hook in the next stitch on the previous row.
Again, work yrh and pull loop through (3 loops on hook).



3 Now complete both dc stitches together by working yrh and pull this loop through all 3 loops on the hook.



4 This is how the completed dc2tog should look. You will have neatly decreased by 1 stitch. On subsequent rows, you can simply work a stitch into the top of the dc2tog stitch as usual.

ABBREVIATIONS

For a full list, see page 78 of Simply Crochet magazine Double crochet makes an excellent fabric for working embroidery stitches – even a slip stitch seam can be embellished to perfection.

NOTES

Wall Hanging consists of 9 plain Squares. Squares are embellished with embroidery patterns.

There are Charts on page 9 for you to refer to when working the embroidery.

WALL HANGING

SQUARES (MAKE 9)

Using Black, ch29.

Row 1 (RS) Dc in second from hook and in each ch to end, turn. [28 dc]

Rows 2-32 Ch1 (does not count as st), dc in each st to end.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

EMBROIDER AND JOIN

Using the Charts, embroider the patterns shown using matching yarn colour.
Using Black, ss the Squares together in a 3x3 formation.

TABS (MAKE 5)

Using Black, ch9.

Row 1 (RS) Dc in second ch from hook, dc in each ch to end, turn. [8 dc]

Row 2 Ch1, dc in each st to end, turn. Rep Row 2 until Tab measures 12cm.

Fasten off.

Fold Tab in half and sew evenly along the top.

TO FINISH

Using Ecru, sew a running stitch detail over each of the ss seams at the front, as shown in the images.



Hanging tabs are worked separately and sewn, evenly spaced, along the top



Each square features a different embroidery pattern using back stitch or running stitch

SIMPLE STEPS HOW TO MAKE A BACK STITCH



1 Secure yarn at back of fabric and bring needle to front of fabric . Push needle into the fabric 1 hole to the left ...




2 Bring needle up from back to front of fabric, 2 holes to the right . Then insert the needle back into fabric 1 hole to the left of there .



3 This will join up stitches and start forming a line.



4 Repeat from step 2, moving horizontally, vertically or diagonally, to create a line as long as you need it to be.

The necklace is easy to construct – tie knots, thread beads and buttons, and glue flowers!



Cheerful daisies, beads and buttons make a super sweet statement. Pair with a solid colour outfit to make those petals pop!

NOTES

One of the original colours used in this project has been discontinued, so we have listed an alternative. The colours are a close match but may vary slightly to those pictured.

NECKLACE FLOWERS (MAKE 8)

Using Yarn A, ch5, ss in first ch to make a ring. **Round 1 (RS)** Ch1 (does not count as st), 10dc into the ring, ss to the first dc to join. [10 sts] **Round 2** *Ch3, skip next dc, ss into the next dc; repeat from * 4 times more. [5 ch-3 sps] **Fasten off**.

Change to Yarn B.

Round 3 (Ss, ch1, htr, tr, htr, ch1, ss) in each ch-sp around.

Fasten off and weave in all ends.

TO MAKE UP

Tie a knot in leather thread 20cm from one end. *From other end thread on (1 white button, 1 yellow button, 1 bead, 1 yellow button, 1 white button). Tie a firm knot just after the last button. Leave a gap of 8cm, then tie next knot; rep from * along until you have 5 'button and bead' sections.

Glue 2 Flowers WS together in the centre of each 8cm gap, with the thread sandwiched between them. Press firmly or weigh down until glue dries.

Finish the Necklace by tying the two loose ends of the leather cord into a knot to make a loop.

MEASUREMENTS

Cushion measures 42x42cm (161/2x161/2in)

ABBREVIATIONS

Tfs (Tunisian foundation stitch)

Loop on hook counts as first st, *insert hook in next ch, yrh and pull up a loop, leave loop on hook

Tss (Tunisian simple stitch) Loop on hook counts as first st, *insert hook through bar on next st from right to left, yrh and pull up a loop, leave loop on hook

RetP (Return Pass) Yrh and draw through first loop on hook, *yrh and draw through 2 loops on hook; rep from * until 1 loop remains on hook For a full list, see page 78 of Simply Crochet magazine

A dark background makes the floral details pop on this stunning cushion, with a delicate frilly border for added prettiness.

NOTES

Cushion is worked in Tunisian simple stitch. Each row of Tunisian crochet is made up of a Forward Pass (FwdP) and Return Pass (RetP); you do not turn the work at all, so you will be working from the RS throughout. When working the final Tss on the FwdP, work through both loops at edge of fabric. The cross stitch design is added to one Panel using the Chart on page 13 as a guide. Once both pieces have been blocked they are crocheted together over the cushion pad using double crochet and picot edging.

CUSHION

PANEL (MAKE 2)

Using a 5.5mm Tunisian hook and Yarn A, ch64. Foundation row Tfs in second ch from hook, Tfs in each ch across to end (64 loops on the hook), RetP across. [64 sts]

Rows 1-62 Tss in each st across, RetP.

Row 63 Ss in each st to end.

Fasten off and weave in ends. Using Yarn B, C, D, E and F, add cross stich design to one panel to make the Front.

TO MAKE UP

Block both Panels to measurements listed. Place Panels together with RS facing out and work next round through both Panels to join. Using a 4.5mm hook, join Yarn B in any corner. Row 1 Ch1, (3dc in corner, 63dc across to next corner) 4 times inserting cushion pad before working final side, ss to first dc. [264 sts]




Panels are joined with a seam around the outside and finished with a decorative border

Row 2 Ch1, *(1dc, ch5, 1dc, ch5, 1dc, ch5, 1dc) in next st, 1dc in next 5 sts; repeat from * around, ss to first st.

Fasten off.





ABBREVIATIONS

picot Dc, ch3, ss into top of dc iust worked

Combine crochet, cross stitch and tassels in this beautifully lightweight tee, worked in luxurious natural fibres.

NOTES

Tee is worked in one piece, starting at the Back hem and finishing at the Front hem. When you reach the shoulders, the piece is divided to work each side of the neckline separately, then rejoined at the base of the neckline to work the rest of the Front to the hem in one piece. Sleeves are integrated into the Body by adding extra sts at each side to increase the row length. Read the neckline increase section carefully, as you will need to decrease for the end of the armholes during this section, unless you are working the largest size.

The surface decoration in Yarn B is added afterwards; you can add it as you work if you prefer, or complete it all in one go once the main Tee is finished. You might want to bear in mind that it will be harder to rip your work back if you work the surface decoration as you go along. Hold Yarn B double for all sizes.

TEE

FIRST SIDE (BACK)

Using Yarn A, ch93 (99: 105: 113: 119: 125: 131)

Foundation row (RS) Dc into second ch from hook and each ch to end.

[92 (98: 104: 112: 118: 124: 130) sts]

Row 1 Ch3 (counts as tr throughout), tr in each st to end, turn.

Rows 2-4 Ch1 (does not count as st throughout), dc in each st to end, turn. Rows 1-4 set pattern.

Repeat (Rows 1-4) 15 (15: 16: 16: 17: 17: 17) more times. Work should measure approx 32 (32: 34: 34: 36: 36: 36)cm.

ARMHOLE

Continuing in pattern as set:

Next row Ch3, tr in each st to end, ch20 (20: 22:

22: 24: 24: 26) for one sleeve, turn.

Next row Ch1, dc in second ch from hook and in each st to end, ch20 (20: 22: 22: 24: 24: 26) for second sleeve, turn.

[132 (138: 148: 156: 166: 172: 182) sts]

Work Rows 3 and 4 of pattern.

Repeat (Rows 1-4) a further 8 (8: 9: 9: 10: 10: 11) times.

Work 1 extra row of dc placing a marker each end of this row to indicate shoulder fold, do not fasten off.

DIVIDE FOR NECKLINE FIRST SIDE

With RS facing and starting on a Row 2 of patt, work 46 (49: 53: 57: 61: 64: 68) sts, turn leaving remaining sts unworked.

INCREASES AT NECKLINE EDGE

Work a WS row in patt as set. Place a marker in the end of this row to mark Row 1 of the increase section.

Work a RS row in patt as set, increasing in the last st of the row at the neckline edge by working 2 sts into the last st.

SIZES 8, 10, 12, 14, 16 & 18


Continue in pattern, increasing on every RS row, so that there are a total of 20 (20: 21: 21: 22: 22: -) increase rows. At the same time decrease the stitches at the end of the armhole by leaving the last 20 (20: 22: 22: 24: 24: -) sts of the row unworked, on Row 35 (35: 39: 39: 43: 43: -) of the increase section.

There will be a total of 40 (40: 42: 42: 44: 44: 46) rows from the beginning of the increase

Work another WS row on these sts.

SIZE 20 ONLY

Continue in pattern, increasing on every RS row, so that there are a total of 23 increase rows, or 46 total rows from the beginning of the increase section.

To make this pattern easier to follow, we've colour-coded the sizing instructions - simply follow the relevant column.

Work another WS row, leaving the last 26 sts unworked for the armhole shaping.

SECOND SIDE (FRONT)

Leaving 40 (40: 42: 42: 44: 44: 46) sts unworked for the neckline, rejoin the yarn to the next st with RS facing, ch1, dc in each st to end, turn. [46 (49: 53: 57: 61: 64: 68) sts]

INCREASES AT NECKLINE EDGE

Work a WS row in patt as set, marking the end of the row as Row 1 of the increase section.

SIZES 8, 10, 12, 14, 16 & 18

Work the increases at the neckline edge by working 2 sts in the first st of the next RS row and every following RS row until there are a total of 20 (20: 21: 21: 22: 22: -) increase rows. AT THE SAME TIME decrease the stitches at the end of the armhole by leaving the last 20 (20: 22: 22: 24: 24: -) sts of the row unworked, on Row 36 (36: 40: 40: 44: 44: -) of the increase section.

Work another WS row on these sts.

JOINING AFTER NECKLINE

SIZES 8, 10, 12, 14, 16 & 18

Rejoin the yarn with RS facing on the first st of the first side and work a row in patt across both sides of the Front to join into one piece. [92 (98: 104: 112: 118: 124: -) sts]

SIZE 20 ONLY

Rejoin the yarn with RS facing on the first st of the first side and work a row in patt across both sides of the Front to join, leaving the last 26 sts unworked for the armhole shaping, turn. [130 sts]

ALL SIZES

Cont in patt until work measures same as back ending on a Row 2.

Fasten off.

TO FINISH

Join side seams and underarm seams in one.

NECK EDGING

With 2 strands of Yarn B held together, slip stitch evenly around the neckline edge, working an even number of sts.

Next round (Dc in next st, picot in next st) around, ss to first st.

Fasten off.

SLEEVE EDGING

Work as for neckline edging.

CROSS STITCH BLOCKS

The embroidery is worked with 2 strands of Yarn B held together over 3 consecutive treble rows. The first block on the sample image is



on the second tr row up from the hem with a gap of 3 patt reps in between. You can alter the position of these blocks to suit and according to the size you are making:

On the first and third rows of treble, ss surface crochet into the treble stitches around.
On the second row of tr, work cross stitches over every alternate treble stitch around.

TASSELS

Make as many Tassels as you like or use the images as a guide.

Make a Tassel by cutting a length of Yarn B 180cm long and fold in half 5 times. Take a doubled strand of Yarn B approx 20cm long, and thread through the top loops of all the folds of yarn. Use one of the strands to tie the yarn together tightly and leave the ends for attaching the Tassel. Use the other end of yarn to bind around the top of the Tassel about 0.5cm from the top. Fasten off the ends securely and weave them into the top of the tassel. Cut through the folded ends of yarn at the bottom of the Tassel.

Attach the Tassels by threading the ends through the ss row, tie and weave in ends. Weave in all ends neatly.

For a full list, see page 78 of Simply Crochet magazine Forget a handbag – what you need is a *glam* bag! Hook an embellished clutch that will take you from day to night effortlessly.

NOTES

The Flap is made from individual Square and Triangle motifs and is sewn to the main part of the Bag.

When working with 2 colours in a round, change colour in the last yrh of the previous st. Carry the unused yarn across the top of the stitches, enclosing it as you work.

BEADED BAG

FLAP

SQUARES (MAKE 3)

Using a 2.5mm hook and Yarn A, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch3 (counts as tr throughout), 7tr into loop, ss to top of beg ch-3. [8 sts]

Fasten off

Round 2 Join Yarn B to any stitch, ch3, (tr, dtr, ch1, dtr, 2tr) in st at base of ch-3, 2tr in next st, *(2tr, dtr, ch1, dtr, 2tr) in next st, 2tr in next st; rep from * twice more, ss to top of beg ch-3. [36 sts]

Fasten off.

Round 3 Join Yarn C in any ch-1 sp, *(dc, htr, dc) in corner ch-sp, dc in next 8 sts; rep from * 3 times more, ss to first dc. [44 sts]

Fasten off.

BEADED FLOWERS

Thread all beads onto Yarn D.

Using a 2mm hook and Yarn D, work in surface crochet around the posts of the tr sts in Round 1 as follows:

Ss around first tr, (ch1, pull 9 beads to hook, ch1, ss around next tr, ch1, ss around next tr) 4 times,

ss to first st.

Fasten off securely.

Each time you join the yarn to a Square to make a Flower, join in the same position on each Square.

TRIANGLES (MAKE 3)

Using a 2.5mm hook and Yarn A, ch4. **Row 1** 4tr in fourth ch from hook. [5 sts] **Fasten off**.

Row 2 Join Yarn B in top of beg ch-3 of Row 1, ch4 (counts as dtr), (dtr, 2tr) in st at base of ch-4, 2tr in next st, (2tr, dtr, ch1, dtr, 2tr) in next st, 2tr in next st, (2tr, 2dtr) in next st. [19 sts]

Fasten off.

Round 3 Join Yarn C in top of beg ch-4, ch2 (counts as htr) dc in st at base of ch, dc in next 8 sts, (dc, htr, dc) in ch-sp, dc in next 8 sts, (dc, htr) in last dtr, ch4, dc around post of tr in Row 1, ch2, dc in starting ch, ch2, dc around post of tr in Row 1, ch4, ss to top of beg ch-2. [38 sts]

BEADED FLOWERS

Using a 2mm hook and Yarn D, using the remaining beads, work in surface crochet around the posts of the tr sts in Round 1 as follows:

Ss around the second stitch from Row 1, (ch1, pull 9 beads to hook, ch1, ss over next gold tr, ch1, ss over next gold tr) twice.

Fasten off securely.

JOIN TO MAKE FLAP

Join the Squares and Triangles with a 2.5mm hook and a ss seam in Yarn A, working in back loops only with RS facing. Join into a Triangle shape as shown in the image.





EDGING

Using a 2.5mm hook and Yarn A, htr around the 3 edges of the flap, working 1 htr in each st and each ss seam, (htr, tr, htr) in the central point, 3htr in each of the 2 top corners, ss to first st.

Fasten off.

MAIN BAG

Using a 2.5mm hook and Yarn C, ch50. **Round 1** Tr in fourth ch from hook (skipped ch count as tr), tr in each ch to last st, 6tr in last st, working in the opposite side of the foundation ch, tr in each st to last st, 5tr in last st, ss to top of beg ch-3. [102 sts]

Rounds 2-4 Ch2 (counts as htr throughout), htr in each st around, ss to top of beg ch-2.

Fasten off.

Rounds 5-6 Join in Yarn B, ch1 (does not count as st throughout), dc in in each st around, mark the first st of the round with a marker.

Turn work inside out to work with WS facing for next round.

Round 7 Ch1, dc in first st, move stitch marker to this st, dc in next 4 sts, change to Yarn A 4-tr cl in next st, (5dc in Yarn B, 4-tr cl in next st in Yarn A) repeat around, ss to first dc with Yarn B, turn back to RS.

Fasten off Yarn A.

Rounds 8-9 With Yarn B, ch1, dc in each st around.

Fasten off.

Round 10 Join Yarn C, ch2, htr in each st around, ss to top of beg ch-2.

Round 11 Ch1, dc in each st around, ss to first dc. **Round 12** Join Yarn A, ch2, htr in each st around, ss to top of beg ch-2.

Round 13 With Yarn C, ch1, dc in each st around, ss to first dc.

Round 14 Join Yarn B, ch1, dc in every stitch, ss to first dc.

Fasten off.

Rounds 15–28 With Yarn C, ch2, htr in each st around, ss to top of beg ch-2.

Fasten off.

JOIN THE FLAP TO THE BAG

Fold the Bag flat and mark the 2 stitches at the fold, making sure that there are 50 sts between the markers on each side.

Align the Flap with the top back of the Bag, RS together. With the front of the Bag facing, using a 2.5mm hook and Yarn C, join the 2 pieces with a dc seam. Continue working dc around the Flap with 3dc in the point of the flap, ss to first dc.

Fasten off.

STRAP

With 2.5mm hook and Yarn C, ch84.

Row 1 Tr in fourth ch from hook and in each ch to end, turn. [82 sts]

Bring each end of the row together to form a loop.

Row 2 Ch1 (does not count as st throughout), 3dc through both layers of the row ends to join, turn.

Row 3 Ch1, dc through each st of last row and 3 sts from top end of main bag to join.

Fasten off.

EDGING

With Yarn A, dc around one edge of the strap and repeat for the other side.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

TO FINISH

Stitch magnetic clasp in place underneath the centre point of the Flap. Weave in all ends.

SIMPLE STEPS HOW TO STRING BEADS ONTO YOUR YARN



1 Cut a small length of sewing cotton, thread one end through the eye of a sewing needle, pull through and knot the ends together.



2 Now take the end of the yarn and pass it through the centre of the circle you made out of sewing cotton.



3 Carefully pass the sewing needle through a group of around 4 beads, gently moving them over the sewing cotton and then...



4...move the beads gently down onto the yarn. Repeat from step 3 with more beads to string the number you need onto the yarn.

ftr (foundation tr) *Yrh, insert hook in loop at base of last st, yrh and pull up a loop, pull through one loop on hook (loop will sit at base of Ftr), (yrh and pull through 2 loops) twice For a full list, see page 78 of Simply Crochet magazine

This stunning necklace makes the perfect accessory for a romantic night out. Pair it with a simple frock and it'll be the star of the show.

NOTES

Necklace is made with the chainless foundation treble technique and is worked with what will be the WS facing you.

See Diagram below for the construction and stitches to join to.

NECKLACE

Thread 24 sequins onto the yarn.

Row 1 Ch3 (counts as stitch), ftr in third ch from hook, ftr pulling a sequin up to the hook before the last yrh of the tr, complete the tr enclosing the sequin, (ftr, ftr with sequin) 23 times, 2ftr. [51 sts, 24 sequins]

Fasten off

Thread 15 sequins onto the yarn.

Row 2 With the sequins from Row 1 on the underside, ss in base of 17th st from start of Row 1, ftr, skipping two sts from Row 1 and inserting hook in base of 14th st from start of Row 1, (ftr, ftr with sequin) 15 times, ftr, ss in 17th st from end of Row 1, ftr replacing the extra ch-1 with a ss into the 14th st from end of Row 1. [33 sts, 15 sequins]

Fasten off

Thread 11 sequins onto the yarn.

Row 3 Ss in base of fourth st from start of Row 1, ftr inserting hook in base of seventh st from start of Row 1, (ftr, ftr with sequin) 11 times, ftr, ss in ninth st from start of Row 2, ftr replacing the extra ch-1 with a ss in 12th st from start of Row 2.

Fasten off.

Thread 11 sequins onto the yarn.

Row 4 Follow the same principle to work a ftr joining in the 12th and the ninth sts from the end of Row 2, (ftr, ftr with sequin) 11 times, ftr, ss in seventh st from end of Row 1, ftr joining in fourth st from end of Row 4 as before.

Fasten off

Thread 13 sequins onto the yarn.

Row 5 Join a ftr in the 15th and 18th sts from start of Row 3, (ftr, ftr with sequin) 13 times, ftr, ss in third st from start of Row 4, ftr joining in sixth st from start of Row 4.

Fasten off.

TIES (MAKE 2)


Join yarn in end of Row 1, ch61, turn, ss in each ch, ss to base of ch.

Fasten off.

Repeat for opposite side.



Before beginning each row, thread the required number of sequins onto the yarn

- Button with 4 holes, 3cm diameter

Enclose the button in a circle of 'spokes' and work the petals around the circumference

You'll need good light to make this miniature beauty. You can use the finished button as a fastening, or as a brooch attached to a jacket.

NOTES

Brooch is worked in rounds with RS facing throughout.

FLORAL BROOCH

Round 1 Using Yarn A, insert the hook through one of the holes in the button, yrh and pull through a loop, take the hook to the top of the button, ss (so ss wraps around button), ch2, ss in same hole, ch3, *ss in next hole, ch2, ss in same hole, ch3; repeat from * twice more, ss into first ss to join. [8 ss, 4 ch-2 sps, 4 ch-3 sps]

Fasten off.

Round 2 Join Yarn B in any ch-sp, (ch3, 2tr, dtr, ch2, dtr, 3tr, ss) in same ch-sp, *(3tr, dtr, ch2, dtr,

3tr, ss) in next ch-sp; repeat from * 6 more times, ss in top of beg ch-3. [8 petals]

Fasten off.

Round 3 Join Yarn C in first tr of any petal group, ch1, dc in same st, *dc into next 3 sts, ss in ch-2 sp, picot, dc in next 5 sts (not including ss); repeat from * 7 more times omitting last dc, ss to first dc to join.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

TO FINISH

Sew button to garment using Yarn C.





- DMC Petra 3 (100% cotton, 100g/280m)1 ball of Yarn A Black (5310)
- Anchor Artiste Metallic (80% viscose, 20% metallised polyester, 25g/100m)
 ball of Yarn B Gold (0300)
- A 2.5mm (US B/1 or C/2) hook
- 26 round beads
- 9 teardrop beads
- Sewing needle that will pass through beads

For a full list, see page 78 of Simply Crochet magazine Channel your inner hippy with this eyecatching headpiece, complete with juicy bright beads and a whole lot of sparkle.

NOTES

Headdress is made in 2 strips of beaded crochet: Part 1 and Part 2. Part 2 is joined halfway along Part 1.

Thread the round beads onto Yarn A in order you would like them to appear; the last bead you thread will be the first bead you use.

HEADDRESS

PART 1

Row 1 (WS) Using Yarn A, ch2, *pull up bead to hook and ch1, picking up the yarn on the other side of the bead to secure, ch2, 5htr in loop behind the bead, ss to second ch from bead, 5htr in loop behind bead (on the other side to previously worked), ss to second ch from bead, ch3; rep from * until you have a total of 14 circles with beads at the centre, turn to RS.

Fasten off.

PART 2

Count 7 circles from the start of Part 1, join Yarn A in the next ch-1 sp and repeat Row 1 with the remaining 12 beads.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

EDGING

Thread teardrop beads onto Yarn B in the order you wish them to appear. Every time you are instructed to add teardrop beads, replace the dc in the ch-1 sp between circles with a ss, pull 3 teardrop beads up to the hook, ch1, ss into the same ch-1 sp.

Join Yarn B to the first ch of Row 1.

Row 2 Dc in same ch, *(dc in next st, 2dc in next



Thread the ties through the end of the top piece and make a bow to secure it in place

st, dc in next st, 2dc in next st, dc in next st), dc in ch-1 sp between circles; rep from * along one side of Part 1, adding teardrop beads after 4th, 7th and 10th circles.

When you have completed one side, repeat Row 2 instructions along the other side of Part 1 without adding teardrop beads.

Fasten off.

Rejoin Yarn B to Part 2 where it joins Part 1. Repeat Row 2 along one side of Part 2. When you reach the end, ch5, ss in end of Part 2 and continue pattern along the other side of Part 2. **Fasten off** and weave in ends.

TIES

Join Yarn A to one end of Part 1, ch61, ss in second ch from hook, ss in each ch along, ss to st at base of ch.


Fasten off.

Repeat on other end of Part 1.

TO WEAR

Thread each tie through loop at end of Part 1, then tie them together.

TENSION

20 sts over 19 rows to measure 10x10cm (4x4in) using a 4mm hook over dc st

MEASUREMENTS

Bag section measures approx 21x9cm (81/4x31/2in)

ABBREVIATIONS

For a full list, see page 78 of Simply Crochet magazine This handy bag is slim enough to pass as a belt, but still big enough for your phone, keys, cards and maybe even a hook or two!

NOTES

Bag section is worked in the round, in the back loops only, to create a striped effect. The Straps are attached to the Bag by working along the side, into the front loops.

One of the original colours used in this project has been discontinued, so we have listed an alternative. The colours are a close match but may vary slightly to those pictured.

BUMBAG

BAG

Using Yarn A, ch40.

Round 1 Ch2 (counts as a st throughout), 2dc in third ch from hook, dc in next 38 ch, 3dc in end ch, working other side of ch, dc in next 38 ch, ss [82 sts]

Round 2 (Working in bl only) Using Yarn B, ch2, 3dc in next dc, dc in next 40 sts, 3dc in next st, dc in next 39 sts, ss to first st to join. [86 sts] Change to Yarn C.

Round 3 (Working in bl only) Ch2, dc in each st around, ss to first st to join.

Repeat Round 3, 17 times more using the following colour sequence: Yarn B, D, E, B, A, E, B, C, B, D, E, B, A, B, D, B.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

TO MAKE UP

Sew the pompom fringe to the back side of the Bag across the bottom so the pompoms hang at the base. Sew the zip into place at Round 20.

STRAP 1

Join Yarn B to the fl on the top right corner of the bag (Round 19).

Row 1 Ch4 (counts as tr, ch1 throughout), *skip next row-end, tr in next row-end, ch1; rep from * another 7 times, tr in last row-end, turn. [10 tr]



Buy a readymade pompom trim and sew a length along the base of the bag



Fasten the straps with a pair of D-rings for easy adjustment – wear it loose or snug

Row 2 Ch4, *skip ch-1 sp, tr in tr, ch1; rep from * across, tr in last tr, turn.

Row 3 Ch4, *skip ch-1 sp, tr in tr, ch1; rep from * 6 times more, tr in next tr, turn leaving last st unworked. [9 tr]

Row 4 As Row 2.

Rows 5-12 Repeat Rows 3-4. [5 tr]

Rows 12-29 Repeat Row 2.

Rows 30-31 Ch3, tr in each st and ch-sp across. **Fasten off**

Position both the D-rings at the end of the strap, fold over and sew in place to secure.

STRAP 2

Join Yarn B in the top-left corner of the Bag and work as Strap 1.

Fasten off.

SIMPLE STEPS HOW TO ADD A ZIP AND LINING



1 Select a zip that closely matches the measurement of the opening.



2 Pin the zip to the WS of the work. Make sure the zip fastening is easily accessible from the RS.



3 Cut the lining to the measurements of the bag with a 1cm seam allowance around each edge. Sew up the side seams on the lining and place inside the bag, pinning it in place.



4 Sew through the zip and lining fabric to secure them in place. We've used a mattress stitch seam to create an invisible join.
